Armed Forces Recruitment Slightly Up In Spite Of War

The ribbons of yellow or red, white and blue flutter in the breezes. Flags fly on pole and porch.

Most people want to show their support for U.S. Troops in the Persian Gulf War in some way. Others want to become U.S. Troops!

Calls to local recruiters revealed that on a local level recruitment is up very slightly.

Calls to the Dallas area branches of the service revealed that on a Nation-Wide level recruitment was up slightly.

Major Tracy of the U.S. Marines reported that "Nation wide we exceeded our goal for enlistments for the month of January."

The major continued that "generally January is a very good month to recruit."

"Many people have expressed the Gulf War is a primary motivation to their enlistment. Many others simply see the Marines as a means to advancing themselves and achieving goals."

Major Tracy also said that according to these figures people "certainly weren't avoiding enlistment because

of the fighting".

Petty Officer Alan Baribeau of the Dallas Navy Recruiting Office did not have national figures available. He did have figures for Northeast Texas, however.

He stated that in August through December of 1989 the Navy signed up 873, 103% of their goal for that time period. In the same time frame for 1990 they signed up 684 in the Northeast Texas area...114% of their goal. Although the numbers were down, the percentage was up. This was because Navy recruitment figures depend on how retention is going in the fleet. "If more are staying in we need to recruit less" Officer Baribeau said.

"Also," he said, "we recruited a higher quality of people. Our aptitude scores and number of high school graduates was way up."

As a "sidebar" to his statements he said that Petty Officer James Patterson, who is in the Paris Navy Recruiting office, was "one of our best people and we are lucky to have

him".

In January, he continued, the Navy's goal for this area was set at 107 and they actually recruited 108, so once more the Gulf War is not deterring people from joining up.

Mary Ann Phillips, Public Affairs officer for Army Recruiting in North and Central Texas, says that from October through December of 1990 enlistments are down from the previous year about 12%. However, she continues that inquiries are up.

"Many of these are people with prior military experience who because of one reason or another (age, etc.) aren't qualified". She also continued that there was a definite feeling of patriotism causing many to inquire. No figures were available for the month of January..

Sgt. William Perry of the Air Force reported that the Gulf crisis hasn't made much difference in their recruiting. "We are getting about a 200% upswing in inquiries" he did say. Perry continued that a feeling of intense patriotism was evident in these inquiries.

On Monday, February 11, Melissa Dodd attended the Red River County Soil and Water Conservation District's board meeting at City Hall in Clarksville. A portion of that meeting was devoted to announcing Soil and Water Conservation essay winners.

High school students from Red River County schools submitted essays up to 300 words in length on the subject "Soil and Water Conserva-

tion".

Students from Rivercrest who were invited to attend were Melissa Dodd, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sim Edd Dodd of Jothtown and Jerilyn Russell of Talco, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Russell.

Melissa was named first place winner and was awarded \$25.00 and Jerilyn received an Honorable Mention Certificate.

Lady Rebels Take Second In District

The Rivercrest Lady Rebels finished their season Tuesday night with a second place in District 17-AA.

They were defeated by the Leonard Lady Tigers 52-32 at Chisum Gymnasium.

Krista Weatherall was high score for the Lady Rebels with 21 points.

Jerilyn Russell was second with nine points.

For the Lady Tigers Jill Lewis had 30 points followed by Shelley Hallmark with 13.

The gym was packed with Rivercrest fans rooting for the girls, who had an excellent season under the direction of Velinda Arbuckle.

Williams Honored With Scholar Award

tives operates on the committee system in which all legislative matters are referred to committee for recommendation before coming to the floor for consideration and debate. Then, the action taken by the House through customary democratic processes becomes binding law. In addition, he is a committee member in the Financial Management Association at the TCU M.J. Neeley School of Business.

Epsilon Mu Chapter, Delta Kappa Gamma Meets

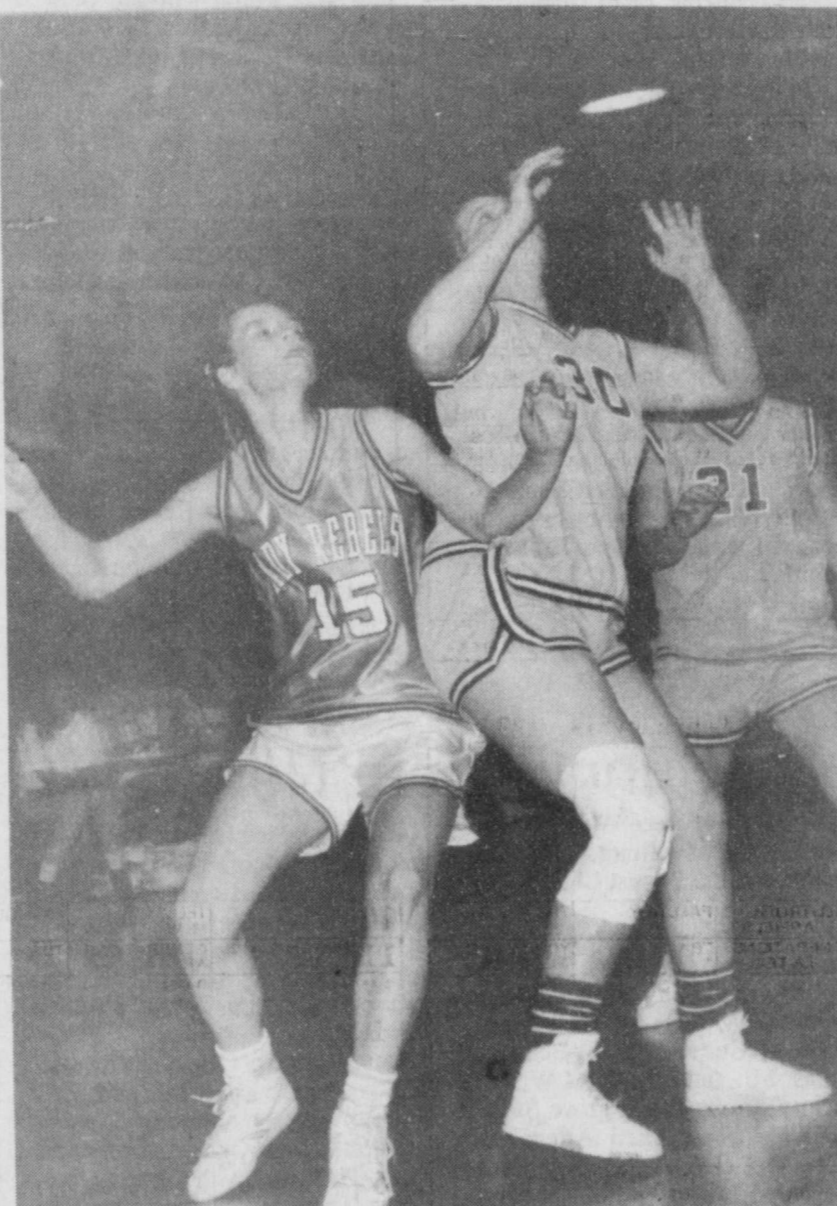

teachers of gifted and talented students in Elementary School, Clarksville. As Legislative Chairman, Toopie Wilkins, reported on recent legislative activities.

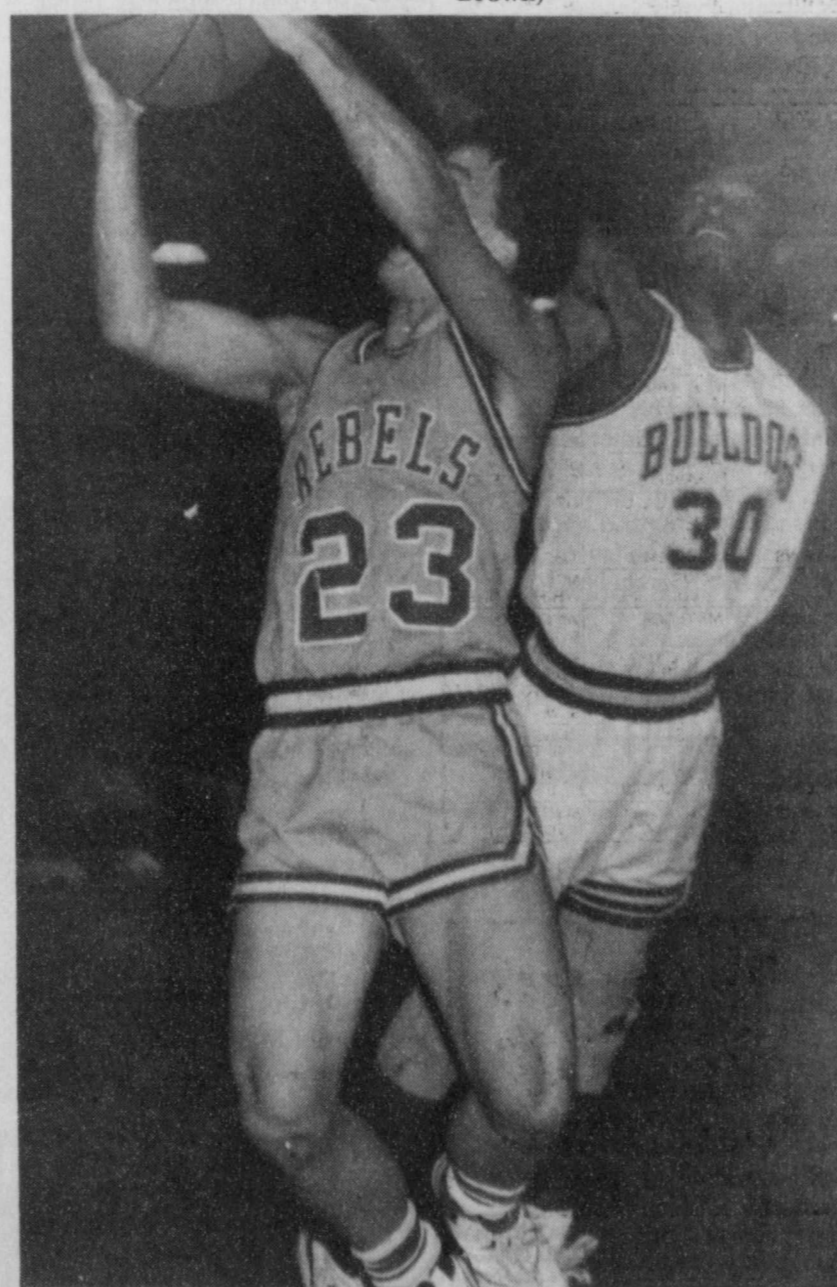

TAX TIPS

UNTAXED MONEY
Your social security account is like a savings account. Deposits made but not properly registered are no better than those not made in the first place. Errors can happen for a number of reasons including a change in marital status or a name change. Because the amount of your benefits depends upon how much has been deposited, you should periodically check your account balance.

It's simple to do. Just call the Social Security Administration (SSA) at its toll-free number 800-234-5772 and ask for Form 7004, "Request for Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement." The form is self-addressed and is easy to complete.

You should receive your "Personal Earnings and Benefits Estimate Statement" (PEBES) within six weeks after returning the completed request form. The PEBES will set out your entire earnings history and will show how much has been contributed to your account. Review the PEBES carefully to ensure that you have no zeros entered for years in which you have worked. Also look for other inaccuracies that reduce your account balance.

If you find a mistake in your account, call SSA at the toll-free number given on the PEBES itself. SSA will require acceptable documentation to correct the mistake, so you should have copies of W-2's, tax returns, or check stubs. A recent law change requires SSA to correct your account as far back as you can demonstrate a mistake has been made within the last three years.

The PEBES also provides useful estimates of how much your benefits will be upon your retirement. Even if you're a long way from retirement, review your account now, while you're more likely to have the necessary papers to document any mistakes in your balance. The sooner, the better.

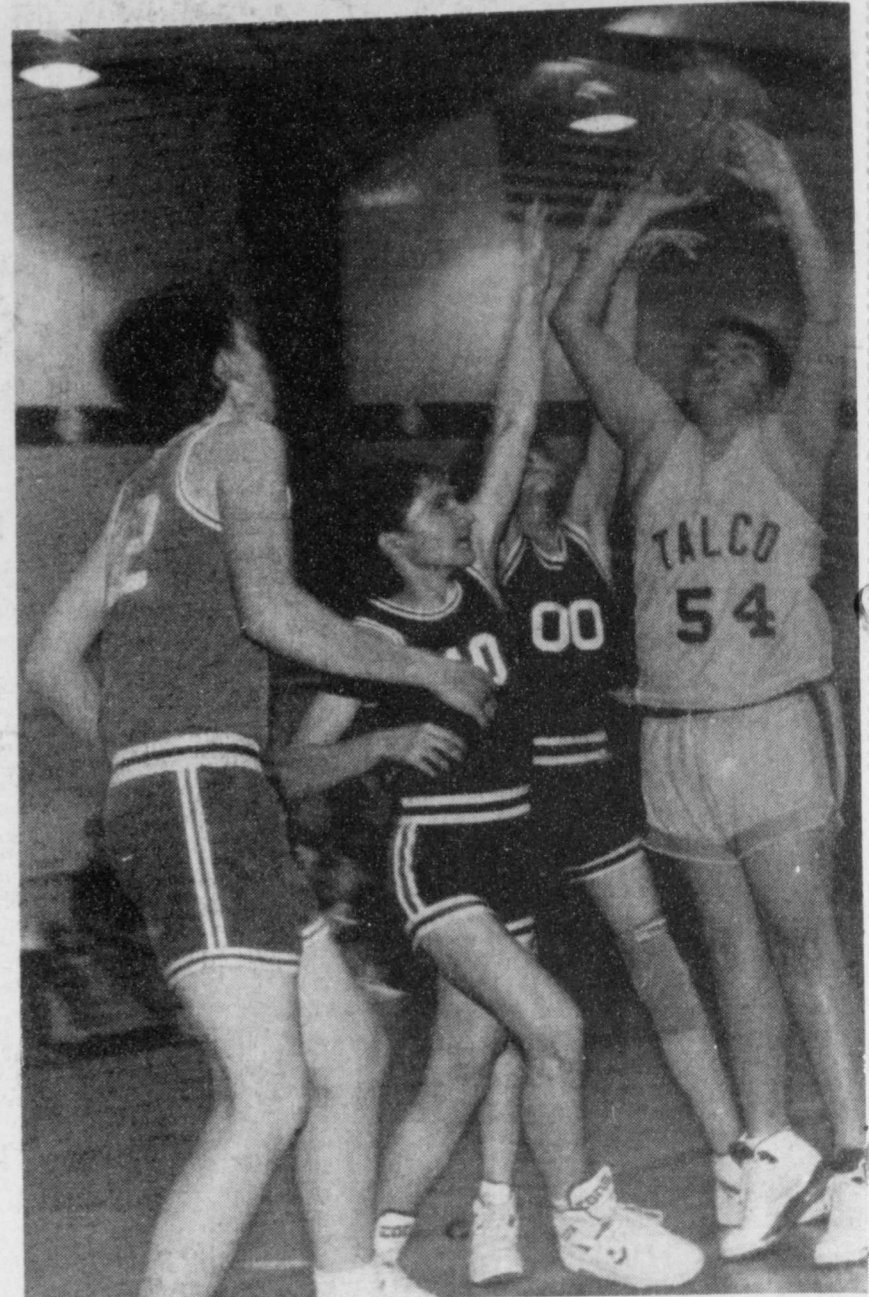

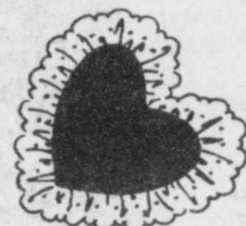
