The Rivercrest FFA Chapter is observing National FFA Week, February 16-23 this week with a variety of activities and events.

The Rivercrest chapter has a total of 85 students enrolled in the various classes offered by the Ag Department. Among courses offered are welding; meat lab; drafting; plant and animal science; home improvement; landscape design; food technology; and equine science.

The FFA Quiz Team placed first in District competition this year and fifth in Area competition. They were questioned on parliamentary procedure and various FFA chapter subjects.

The FFA Sweetheart this year is Susan Tabb, daughter of Ray and Linda Tabb of Cuthand. FFA officers are: Galen Logan, president; Brad Ingram, vice-president; Tiffany Parish, secretary; B.J. Thompson, treasurer; Chad Martin, reporter; and Susan Tabb, Sentinel; and Danny Tabb, State Advisor.

FFA members all over the country will promote FFA, agricultural education and the food and fiber industry during National FFA Week, February 16-23.

This year's theme is FFA-Leader-

ship for a Growing Planet. During FFA Week and throughout the year, FFA chapters will pursue activities which show that they are leading the effort for a better environment. Planting trees, starting community recycling efforts and restoring mining areas are just a few of the initiatives planned by various chapters across the country.

The week also provides FFA members in thousands of chapters across the U.S., Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands the chance to create awareness of and support for agricultural education and the FFA. Public service announcements at the local, state and national levels will help spread the message.

Agricultural education classes stress hands-on experience in diverse areas of agriculture. FFA activities provide leadership development, career training and award incentives for young people.

Mark Timm, National FFA President from Fillmore, Ind., said FFA Week is an opportunity for members and communities to recognize achievements and activities available through FFA and agricultural education. This year's theme challenges FFA members to make a difference

in their communities; to think globally but act locally.

"We're young people trying to strike a balance between progressive agriculture and a healthy environment," Timm said. "As FFA members and students in agriculture classes, we are learning to wisely manage our resources, and gaining the leadership skills necessary to prepare for the diverse and challenging careers in agriculture."

Each year FFA week is held during the week of George Washington's birthday (traditional) to recognize his leadership and commitment to American agriculture. The National FFA Center is located on part of Washington's original Mt. Vernon estate near Alexandria, VA.

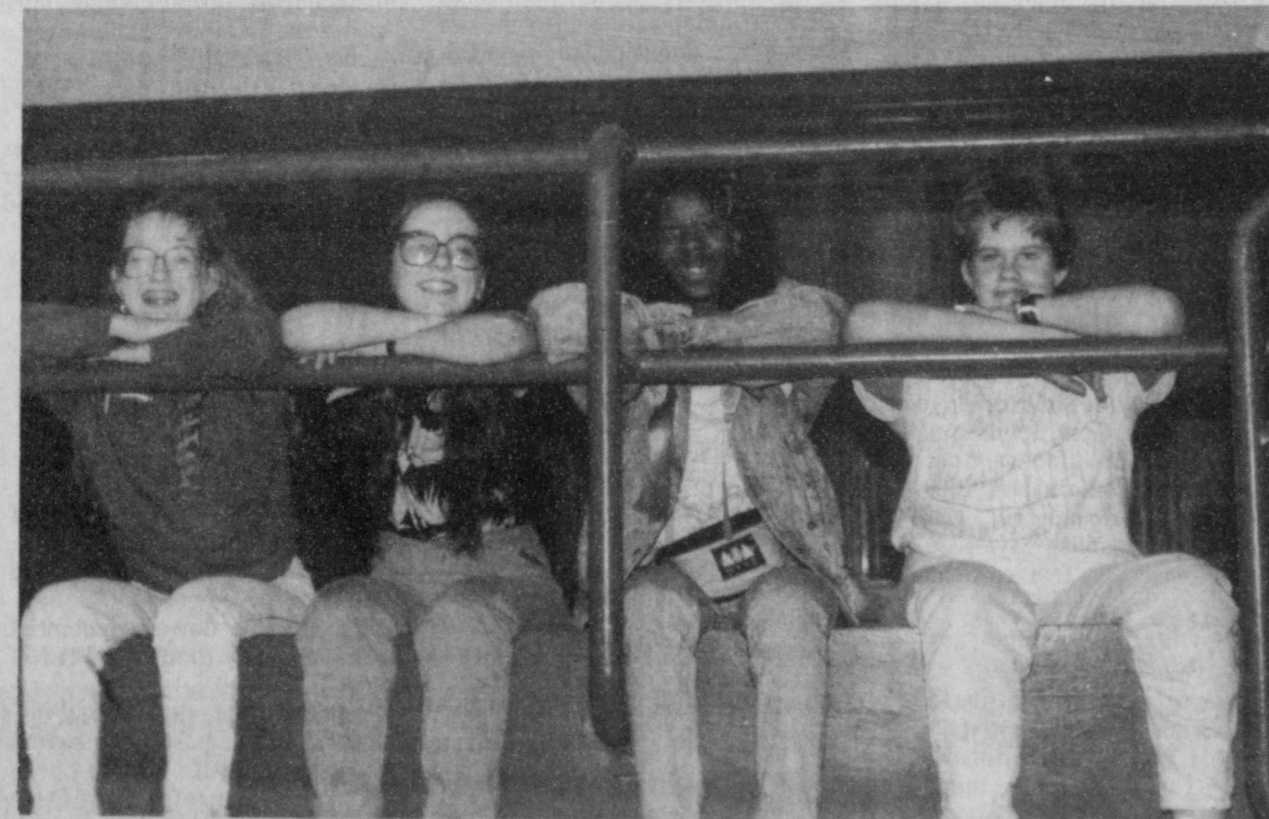

The Talco-Bogata C.I.S.D. Board of Trustees met recently in regular session.

The first order of business was to present Barbara Russell with the Teacher of Excellence Award, for her long term excellence in the teaching profession.

Ron Parker made a presentation to the board on the use of the Talco football field for Community Service projects. He will clean up the stadium before and after each event held for a community service event.

Bogata Principal, Jerry Teel, resigned effective at the end of the 1990-91 contract year.

Approval of minutes from the previous meeting was voted on and passed.

The financial report, payment of bills and budget change were presented, along with the tax report and adjustment.

Among items discussed were: a request from Alexander Frick for tax

The number of Certified Training Credit Hours completed by board members was announced.

In matters pertaining to personnel, evaluation of campus administrators and a report on the athletic off-season program was given.

The board adjourned.

She clips all casserole recipes she sees and tries them. One her family really enjoys is shared in this article a few weeks ago, Crock Pot Pot. She changed it up once and used deer meat instead of beef and it turned out delicious. She also enjoys cooking for the church dinners because she always likes to try new dishes and get new recipes.

Cindy works in her yard and raises a big garden. She does not do very much canning, but she loves to share her vegetables with family and friends.

Cindy is involved with many jobs at home. She is busy answering the phone for the Cunningham Fire Department and also has to answer a 2-way radio for the fire department. Cindy has chosen to share with readers her Saucepan Brownies, a favorite of her family. She learned of these brownies when she was a high school Homemaking student and has enjoyed the recipe all these years.

I asked Cindy to share the stew recipe that she prepared for the benefit. As you will notice, measurements are not listed, so you can just keep adding until the pot you want filled is full.

She is also sharing Breakfast Taquitas, Sweet and Sour Pork and Jackie's Cornbread.

Jackie's Cornbread
2 sticks margarine, melted
2 boxes Jiffy cornbread mix
10 oz. pkg. frozen chopped broccoli
1 small carton cottage cheese, small curd
4 eggs
1 onion, chopped
4 jalapenos, chopped
Cook broccoli and drain. Add to other ingredients and mix together. Bake in a 13"x9" cake pan, sprayed with Pam, at 350 for 40-45 minutes.

Sweet & Sour Pork
1 can 20 oz. Dole chunk pineapple
1 lb. pork shoulder, cubed
2 T vegetable oil
1 c. sliced carrots
1/2 c. chunk green bell pepper
1/4 c. plum jam
2 T red wine vinegar
2 T soy sauce
1 T corn starch
1/2 t ground ginger
Drain pineapple, reserving juice. Brown pork in oil. Cover; simmer 20 minutes, remove. Saute vegetables. Remove. Blend jam, reserved syrup, vinegar and soy sauce. Stir a little sauce into cornstarch and ginger. Add to skillet. Cook until mixture thickens. Stir in pork, vegetables, and pineapple.

Saucepan Brownies
1 c. sugar
1 stick butter
1 egg
3 T cocoa
3/4 c. flour

1/2 t. baking powder
1/2 t. vanilla
In a saucepan, combine butter (melt) and cocoa. Remove from heat; add sugar; then egg. Mix well, then add flour and baking powder. Add vanilla. Bake in greased and floured pan at 350 for 25 minutes.

Fry sausage, bacon
Break sausage and bacon into scrambled eggs.
Chop lettuce, tomatoes, onions, grate cheese. Warm flour tortillas. Add a little of all ingredients in flour tortillas and roll up. Pour picante sauce on this or just eat them plain.

Hamburger meat
Stew meat
Mixed vegetables
Green beans
Blackeyed peas
Potatoes
Onions
Tomato paste
Tomato sauce
Corn
Salt and pepper
Brown hamburger meat and drain. Cook stew meat and drain. Peel potatoes and onions and chop up into pot. Cook potatoes and onions in water until tender. Drain water. Add meats and other vegetables, salt and pepper to taste.


Methodist Children's Group Meets

Discovering How Our Blood Grows Old

An apparent cause of aging in red blood cells, and perhaps in all body cells, has been traced to oxygen-related compounds, a Texas A&M medical researcher has shown for the first time. The study also found that vitamin E deficiency causes premature aging in red blood cells. An increase in the amount of reactive, unpaired oxygen atoms and the effects of reaction-prone atoms that the increase creates have been singled out as one of the elements that trigger the aging process.

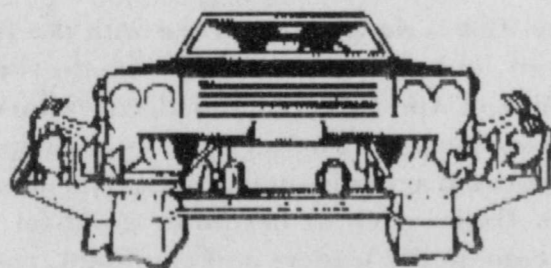

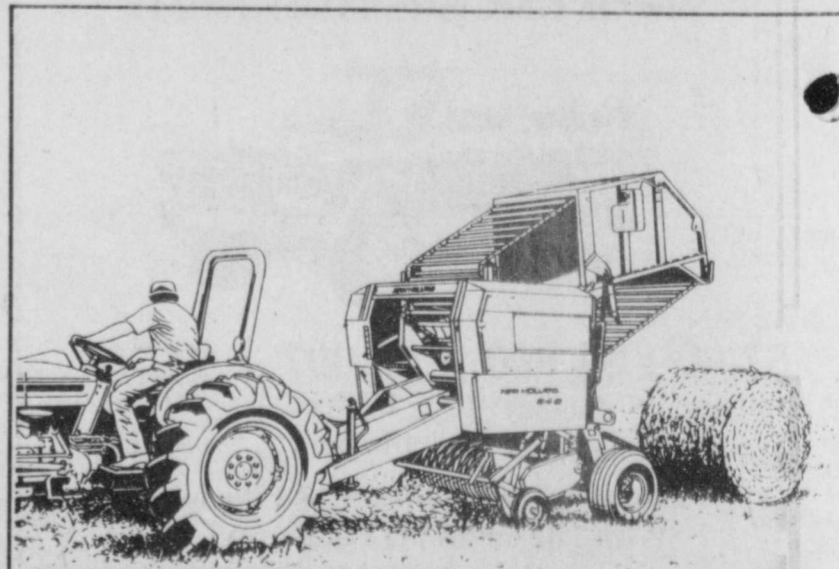

The Club met for a regular meeting on February 14 in the home of Roberta Anderson, with 13 members present. Lynn Barker served as co-hostess.

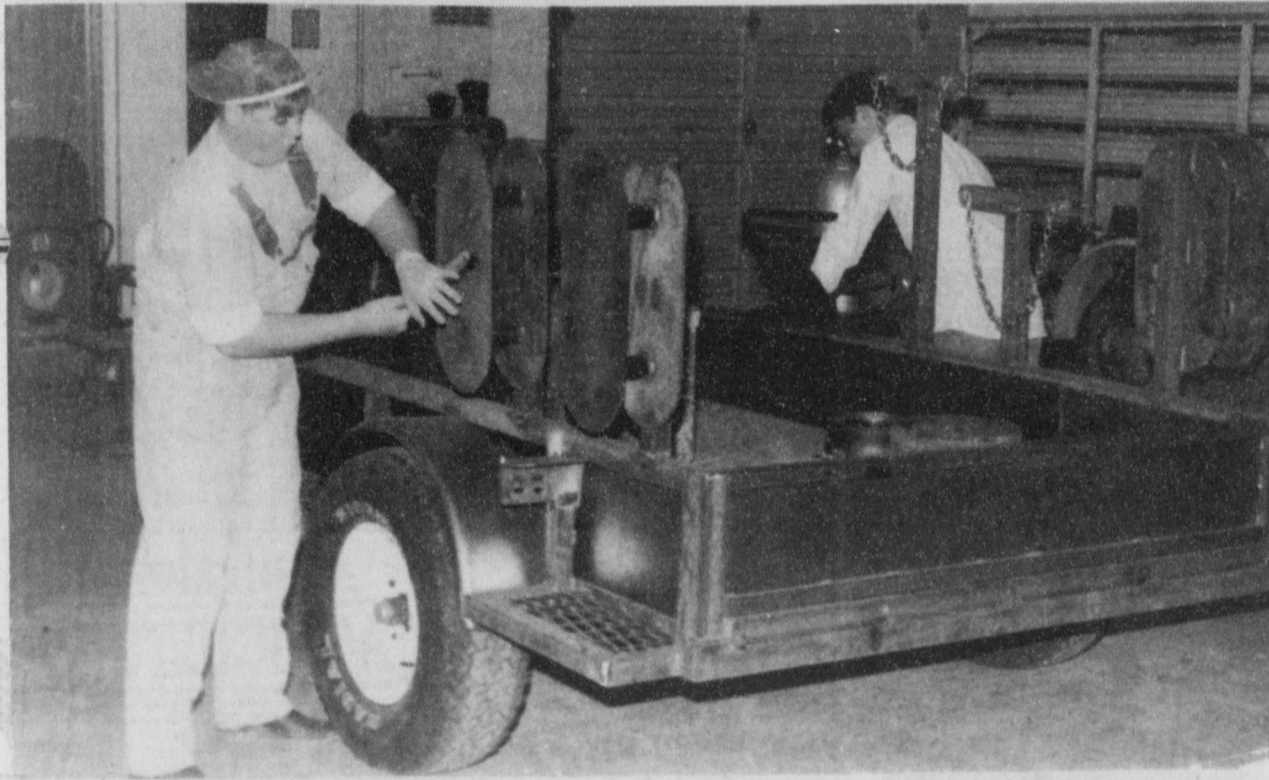
President Miriam Stephenson was in charge of the meeting, which opened with the usual Collect and Pledge to the flag.

Refreshments were served by Mrs. Anderson and Lynn Barker.

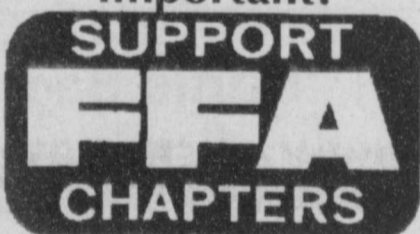

POINTS OF INTEREST

Since the Tax Reform Act of 1986, home mortgage interest is almost the only kind of nonbusiness interest that is still deductible (and even it has limits). Points paid by a buyer to acquire a principal residence are considered to be home mortgage interest. (A "point" is equal to 1% of the loan amount.)

However, the IRS now has a cross-check on the amount of deductible points which taxpayers claim on their returns. A new law requires mortgage companies to report this information both to the buyer and to the IRS on Form 1098.

The new rules apply only to financing provided after December 31, 1990. To be deductible by the buyer (and reportable on Form 1098), the points must be paid by the buyer for the purchase of a principal residence. The dollar amount paid must not be excessive when compared to what is normally charged as common to what is normally charged as common practice in the area.

Points paid for the following types of loans do not have to be reported by the mortgage company: home improvement, home equity or refinancing of a principal residence; loans to purchase or improve second homes, vacation homes, investment property or trade or business property. Such points may or may not be deductible by the borrower. Contact your tax advisor for assistance with these issues.

If you receive financing assistance via qualified mortgage bonds after December 31, 1990, new rules require your lender to report to the IRS your name, social security number and address of the property purchased.

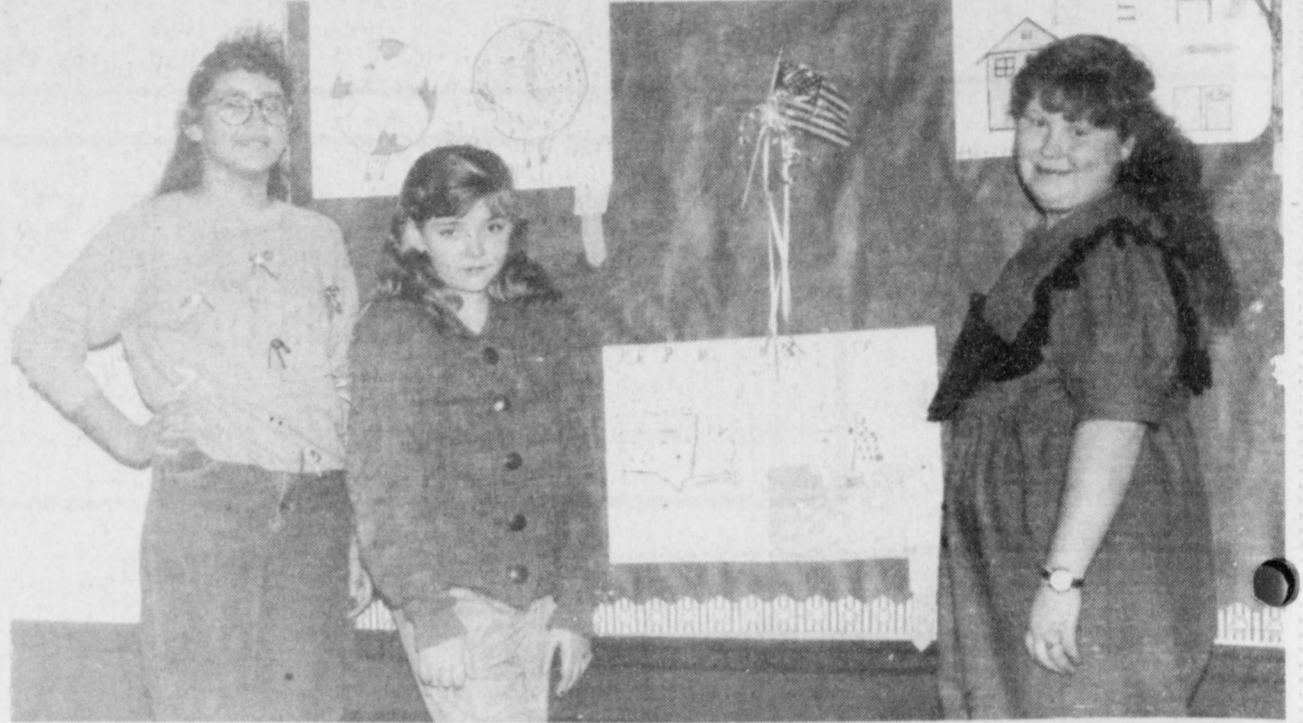
