It began with a mysterious phone call, encompassed a three weeks journey to do missionary work in the Ukraine, and isn't ended yet.

Geneva Norwood believes that God had a direct hand in her odyssey and that he was with her the whole trip.

It started back in May when the rioting in Los Angeles was going on.

Geneva, widowed eighteen months ago, was at her comfortable home in Cunningham when the phone rang.

A man's voice, speaking broken English informed her that he was calling from the Ukraine in Russia. The man was dialling numbers at random all across the U.S. as part of a survey to find out more about Americans, and specifically, what Americans felt about the riots.

Geneva says that she had a long, pleasant phone call with this man, who professed his Christianity, and was thrilled that she was also a Chris-

Somehow, when she went to bed that night, she couldn't get that call off her mind. There was something different about it, something that caused her to turn her thoughts to Russia, it's trials and the major changes which have rocked the country over the past year.

sionaries. Geneva said that there was no possible way ... that she wasn't financially able to do something like

The next hing she knew her church, the Life Tabernacle in Cunningham, had raised the money to send her on the journey! In a whirlwind she was getting her passport and making preparations to embark on the biggest adventure of her life.

Her family, always close, was horrified at first, worried for her safety and used to having their mother and grandmother right on hand. But Geneva said that she was never

worried.

"From the very first there was a peace about this that I can't explain." she smiles "I never worried about it a bit....I just knew it was something I was supposed to do"

On August 3 she flew to New Mexico to meet with Peggy White, and then they joined the other eight people in New York for the long, long flight to Prague, Czechoslovakia, where they spent two days.

The group then flew on to Kiev in the Ukraine, and continued by bus to Vanessa, a city of 500,000.

"The most wonderful thing" she states "is the numbers of young people anxious to come to the Lord'

They had music nightly. Before singing Geneva would tell the audi-

ence what she was saying (through interpreters) and they would then sing in Russian while she sang in English. The Russian music, she reports, was beautiful, even if she couldn't understand what they were saying. Several young black students at the Vanessa Medical School served as interpreters for the group of Americans. They were from Africa, and a more helpful, polite bunch of young men couldn't be found.

At the home where they took their meals all was spotlessly clean, if a little crowded. The floors were painted bright orange, and the walls white. The young family had a new bathroom, but most homes still use outdoor toilets. In the whole of Vanessa there are only 1000 phones.

When asked what these people need most economically she will say they need food, that the grocery stores are virtually empty, and that they need a new economic system to replace the one which has collapsed.

At stores there are no dressing rooms. Customers simply try on appear until the last day of her trip, things over their own clothes. Lin-

The day this small group of Americans left Vanessa they were seen off by a huge group from the church they had been ministering in. They were given all manner of gifts, lavish, hand made fur hats, peasant blouses, little favorable addition. things to eat on the bus ride to Kiev.

Tears were shed on both sides as the group waved for as long as the bus was in sight. Then they were out gone, left behind as the group began it's long journey home.

"I felt sad at first " this gray haired grandmother says "thinking about leaving them to such an uncertain future...but I know that God has started something and it will get finished"

Like a tiny stone thrown into a huge lake, the ten missionaries were a small splash ... but the ripples may well spread far and wide, hopefully marking a new beginning in relationships between two nations that are so different yet so much the same. For Geneva Norwood it was the

experience of a lifetime. The original phone call? Well, she will probably never know where it came from. Taken at face value it was completely disconnected from

tween the back of the throat and the middle ear. This tube provides drainage of the middle ear and also keeps the air pressure in the ear equalized.

In the infant, the tube is small and nearly horizontal. As a child grows and develops a longer neck, the eustachian tube assumes a more vertical position and is less likely to become chronically blocked. Drainage and ventilation can then occur more regularly.

Only the common cold occurs more frequently than otitis media among preschool age children. Twothirds of all children have at least one ear infection by age three, and one third have three or more infections. In addition, many children have clear fluid in the middle ear that goes undetected. It is this latter condition that may cause hearing loss significant enough to affect speech and language development.

Smoking and Emphysema

The best way to avoid getting emphysema, a chronic obstructive lung disease, is not to smoke. In few ailments is the cause and effect so clear. When cigarette smoke, containing more than 4,000 toxic chemicals, enters your body, it literally sticks to the walls of the small airways. Microscopic examination shows these chemicals eventually destroy lung tissue.

If smokers who do not have emphysema stop smoking before developing lung cancer, then their risk of contracting cancer after 2-5 years is much the same as that of nonsmokers

For a person with emphysema, smoking cessation does lead to certain improvements, but permanent tissue damage remains.


