

6 sprigs cilantro (optional)

strips 2 T. olive oil cajun seasoning 1/2 each green, yellow and red bell

pepper (cut in strips) medium onion, sliced 3/4 cups fresh sliced mushroom 1/2 can black olives, sliced

Season chicken strips with salt, pepper and garlic powder. Heat iron killet with olive oil until very hot Drop chicken strips into skillet and fry until done. May need more oil. Remove from pan and place peppers, onions, olives and mushrooms in skillet and stir fry briefly. Combine chicken and vegetables. Sprinkle lightly with cajun seasoning. Cover with 1/2 cup shredded Monterrey Jack cheese and sprinkle with parmesan. Hat until cheese is melted.

African Sweet Potato Salad 4 medium sweet potatoes, about 1 1/2

1/4 cup olive or vegetable oil 2 T. lemon juice 1/2 t. salt

1/4 t. pepper 1 medium green pepper, chopped 1 small onion, chopped 1 stalk celery, chopped

Heat cnough salted water to cover potatoes (1/2 t. salt to 1 cup water) to boiling. Add potatoes. Heat to boiling; reduce heat. Cover and cook until tender, 30-35 minutes; drain. Cool potatoes; slip off skins. Cube potatoes, place in glass or plastic bowl. Mix oil, lemon juice, salt and pepper; pour over pota-toes. Cover and refrigerate at least four hours. Stir in green peppers, onions and celery. Garnish with parsley.

Mexican Bread Pudding
1 cup packed brown sugar
1 1/2 cups water

2 T. margarine 1 t. ground cinnamon

1 t. orange peel, grated 5 cups 1/2" cubes toasted French bread 1/2 cup chopped blanched almonds or walnuts 1/2 cup raisins

1 tart apple, chopped 1 cup shredded Monterrey Jack or cheddar cheese (4 oz.)

Heat brown sugar, water, margarine, cinnamon and orange peel to boiling; reduce heat. Simmer uncovered 5 min-utes. Layer half the bread crumbs, nuts, raisins, apple and cheese in ungreased 1 1/2 qt. casserole; repeat. Pour hot syrup over top. Bake uncovered at 350 oven until syrup is absorbed, 30-40 minutes.







Local Missionaries Go To Romania

Drue and Wayne Huffman are by now settling into their new challenging permanent missioinary calling. They are in Romania and are the first missionaries from The Assembly of God Church to be assigned a permanent location in missionary service and are very excited about the longevity of their assignment. They will be working with orphans who would otherwise have little chance of growing into adulthood since the country does not have theability to meet the needs of these children.

The present conditions are such in these orphanages that CNN referred to them as extermination camps since many of the occupants were simply allowed to die when they were sick or otherwise in need.

It is estimated that there are 120,000 orphans in Romania and thus is. a great need for the work that Wayne and Drue hae undertaken. They are working with the Mission of Mercy which is owned by a company in Colorado Springs, Colorado. Mission

of Mercy is helping to meet the physical and spiritual needs of hurting people in poverty-stricken areas of the world. Through emergency and support roles, people recieve food, education, medical aid and hope.

This help is welcomed by the Romanian government as it does not have the resources to do the job. The Huffmans will be estbablishing a board of advisors from among doctors and other professionals that will help to re-organize these orphanages. Any evangelical group that is interested is welcomed and encouraged to help in this project.

It seems a wonderfully rewarding experience for these dedicated individuals who plan to take these orphanages and turn them into places where children can learn what love
