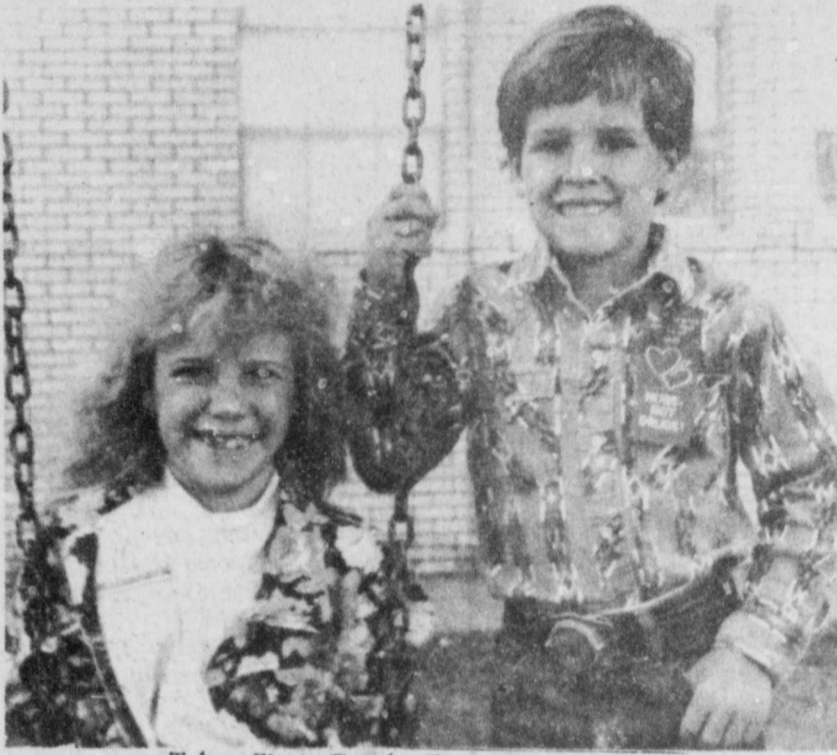

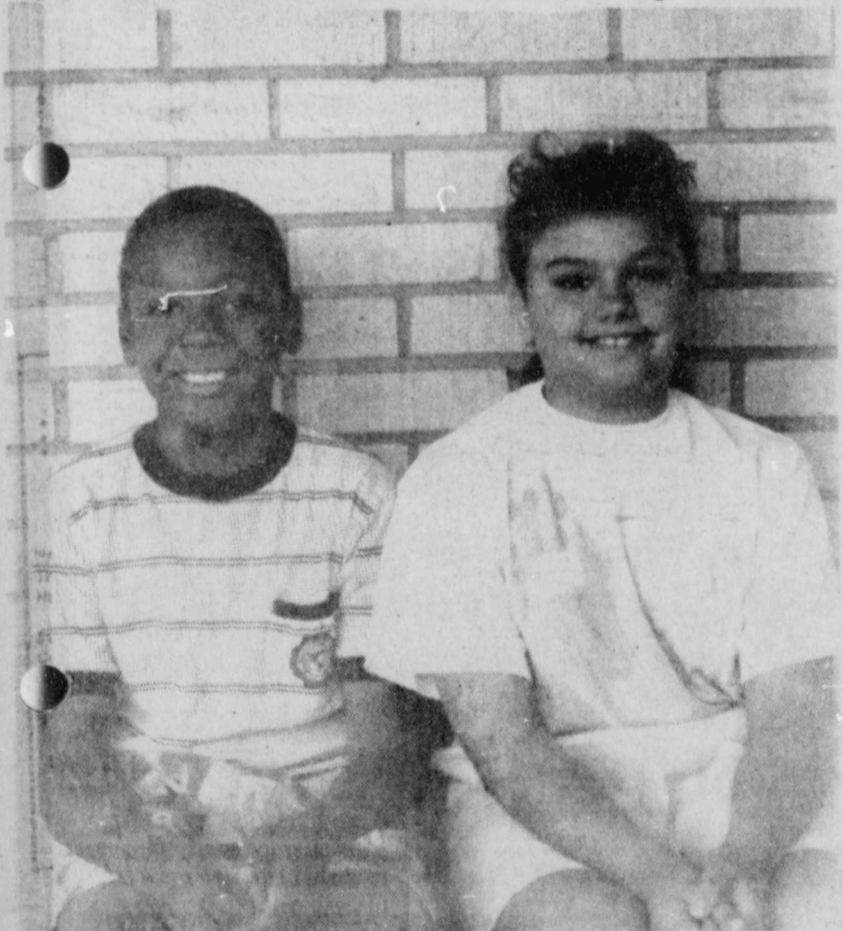

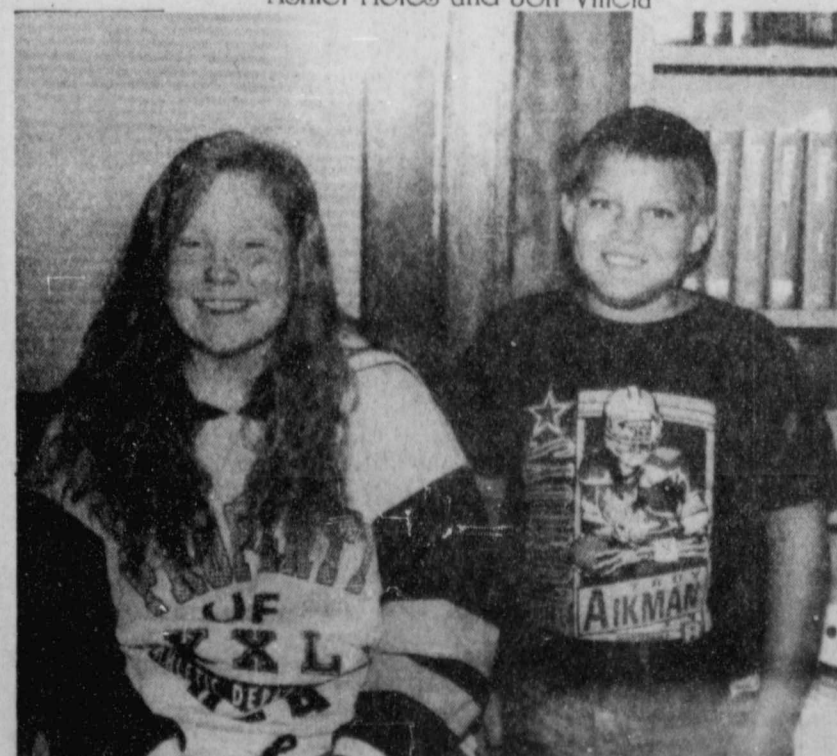

If you had a picture in the section last year it DOES NOT need to be resubmitted.

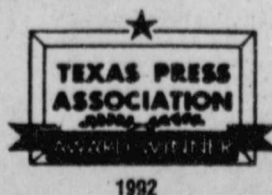

Taco Salad
By Jenny Roach

2 lbs. extra lean ground beef
1/2 teaspoon garlic chips
2 teaspoons chili powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/2 teaspoon cumin
1/2 teaspoon black pepper

Add ingredients as meat is browning. Then add meat, chips, lettuce, and tomatoes to desired taste. For enchiladas: use meat and spice from above. Take corn tortilla shells 8-12, fill and roll them up. Place in a row in bottom of pyrex dish. Place remaining meat on top. Cover top with grated cheese, cook at 325 until cheese is melted.

Peanut Butter Ice Cream
By Cokie Roach

3-6 eggs
1 can Eagle Brand Milk
1 large can Pet Milk
2 cups sugar
1 tablespoon vanilla
1 cup crunchy peanut butter

Beat eggs until blended, but not foamy. Add sugar, Eagle Brand and peanut butter until blended. On low speed, blend in Pet milk and vanilla. Pour into freezer and fill to line with whole milk. Freeze. Use mixer instead of blender as blender will chip up peanuts.

Microwave Peanut Patties

2 1/2 cups sugar
dash of salt
2/3 cup Karo
1/3 cup water
2 cups peanuts
2 tablespoons butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
3-5 drops red food coloring

Before starting, roast peanuts for 3 minutes in microwave on high. Mix sugar, water and syrup and cook on high for 4 1/2 minutes. Add peanuts, stir and cook for 7 minutes on high. Remove from heat, add butter, vanilla and coloring. Stir until mixture is dull. Spoon into muffin tins coated with Pam or butter. Makes about 30 patties.

Microwave Peanut Brittle

1 cup sugar
1/2 cup white corn syrup
Mix in 1 1/2 qt. casserole and cook in microwave on high for 4 minutes.
Add 1 cup peanuts roasted and salted. Stir into syrup mixture and microwave at high for 3-5 minutes, until light brown.

Add 1 teaspoon butter, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Stir into syrup mixture and microwave at high for 1-2 minutes.

Add 1 teaspoon baking soda.

Stir into syrup mixture until light and foamy. Pour mixture onto lightly greased cookie sheet or unbuttered non-stick coated cookie sheet. Let cool, break into small pieces and store in airtight container.

Old Fashioned Coconut Pie

1 cup coconut
1 cup milk
1 pinch flour
3 eggs, beaten
1 cup sugar
1 pinch salt
1/2 stick butter, browned

Mix above ingredients in order and pour into uncooked pie shell. Dust nutmet over top if desired. Bake at 350 until set, about 30 minutes.

Watergate

1 small can crushed pineapple
1 pkg. Pistachio Jello instant pudding and pie filling
2 cups small marshmallows
1 large carton Cool Whip
1 cup chopped pecans

Mix together and refrigerate.

Strawberry Congealed Salad

1 small can crushed pineapple
1 pkg. Strawberry jello
Heat and dissolve jello and let cool.

Add:
1 carton cottage cheese
1 carton Cool Whip
1 cup chopped pecans.

Refrigerate. You can substitute with:
1 small can mandarin oranges and 1 pkg. orange jello.

Chicken and Spaghetti

1 stewed chicken
1 lb. spaghetti
1 #2 can tomatoes
2 oz. pimientos
1 onion, chopped
1/4 to 1/2 lb. Velveeta cheese
1 can mushroom soup

Remove cooked chicken from liquid, cool and bone. Add spaghetti pimientos and onion to liquid and cook until tender. Add more water if needed. Add tomatoes and chicken, when warm add sliced cheese and heat until thoroughly warmed. Add mushroom soup.

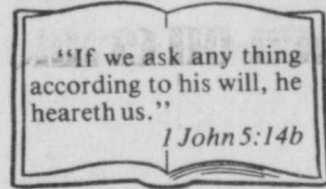

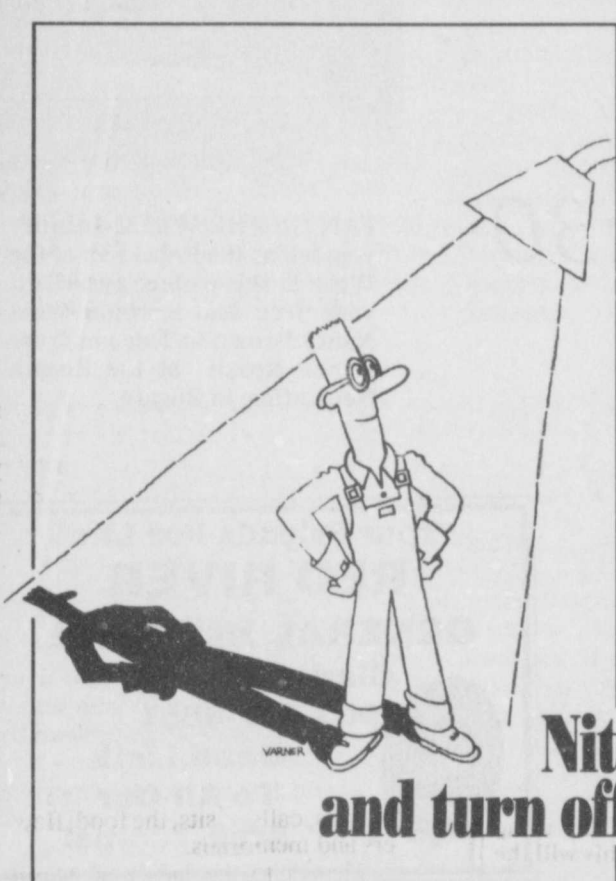

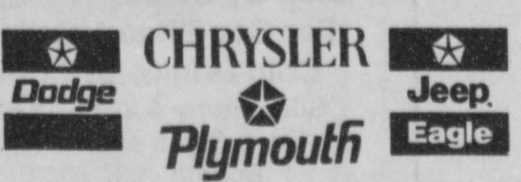

Coach Charles Swann said that "I'm proud of these kids, they never quit trying, they gave one hundred percent."

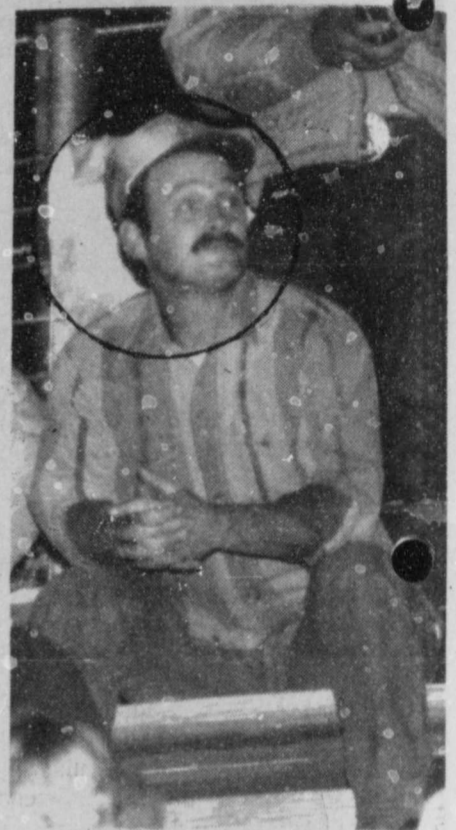
