

Tisn't gonna happen! Why not?...because we just aren't built that way. It's the working towards that's important...not the finish-


Put it down to human nature. Or, if you are one of those rare creatures who really don't do this...who don't go onward towards new projects, who never, ver redecorate, disagree with


Dennis Cleary Dies November 9


Dennis N. Cleary, 72, of Detroit died Monday, November 9 in St. Joseph's Hospital, Paris.

When I got out of the car at the Wright home this week, I was greeted by a big, red, flop-eared pup named Rusty and a fiesty little white dog whose name I didn't catch. Laying to the side of the path was old Bullet, a German Shepherd. He didn't react to noise, and I was afraid there was something wrong with him. I watched a while to make sure he was breathing before going toward the house. Laura came out on the porch and I commented that he didn't seem very interested in his surroundings. thought she said he was dead. I told her that he couldn't be dead because he was breathing. She then explained that Bullet lives in a world of silence.

Laura and Donnie Mack Wright with their daughter and son, Lindsay and Matthew, live northwest of Deport. Laura is employed by Guaranty Bank-Deport and Donnie works for TU Electric. Lindsay is a freshman at Prairiland. She enjoys playing on the volleyball team and Matthew is in the seventh grade at Deport. His interests include basketball, baseball, swimming and golf. The Wright's older daughter, Stacy Huddleston, is a third grade teacher at Deport. Stacy and her husband, Allen Dale, operate A&R Grocery.

Her great-grandfather donated the land for the railroad to come through the community of Enloe. The Enloe home in Paris was one of the first to burn in the 1916 fire. When the home was rebuilt, the furniture had to be replaced. Laura is preparing to bring the dining room table and chairs to put in the room with the rest of her antique collection and he collection of old Japanese wear. When she picks up a delicate pitcher or a brightly painted plate, her eyes show the pleasure she gets from this hobby. Carrot Cake
By Vivian Enloe
Mix together: 3 cups flour, 2 cups sugar, 2 tsp. soda, 2 tsp. cinnamon and 1/2 tsp. salt. Mix together 3 eggs beaten, 2 full cups grated carrots, 1 small can crushed pineapple, 1 1/2 cups Wessen oil, and then gradually cups Wesson oil, and then gradually add above. Add last 1 cup nuts and 2

tsp. vanilla.

Grease and flour tube pan. Pour mixture in and bake at 350 for 1 hour or until done. Cool about 5-10 minutes before turning into cake plate.

Wesson Oil Cake tsp. salt tgsp. soda tablespoons cocoa 5 tablespoons Wesson oil l cup cold water tsp. vanilla tsp. vinegar 2 cups sutar

1/2 cup milk l stick oleo 1 tsp. vanilla a little Karo

4 tablespoons cocoa Grease and flour 2 cake pans. Cook at 325 for about 25-30 minutes. Don't overcook. Make chocolate fudge icing and ice while just barely warm or just Buttermilk Cornbread

By Mildred Wright 1/4 cup all purpose flour

1 tsp. baking powder 1 egg 1/2 tsp. baking soda

Combine dry ingredients and sift into large mixing bowl. Then add egg and enough buttermilk to make a good runny mixture. Pour into cast iron skillet with oil very hot. This begins cooking process right away. Bake 20 minutes in bottom rack of oven then as top looks dry, move to top rack to complete cooking of the top of combrfead. Remove and cut. Makes wonderful cornbread dressing. **Buttermilk Biscuits**

1 cup buttermilk tsp. baking soda

1/2 tsp. soda

Combine all in a large mixing bowl and stir well. Sift self-rising flour into wet mixture and mix until you have a good elastic mixture. Then place onto floured dough board and knead with flour already on board. Pat out dough into large circle then use a cutter and cut biscuits. Put oil in pan and dampen each side of biscuits. Cook about 20-25 min-

The Rivercrest High has been awarded a 60-volume set of the Library of America, the series described recently by Gevernor Ann Richards as "a priceless educational resource.'

Rivercrest is particiapting in an innovative program called CLAS-SICS, designed to help public high schools improve book collections in their libraries. The award was made to the Rivercrest High School after it sent an application to The Library of America and pledged \$600 from local funds toward the cost of the books. The pledge was matched by \$600 from the Brown Foundation of Hous-

The library of America is a nonprofit publishing enterprise that is committed to preserving the works of America's greatest writers in handsome and authoriative hardcover editions. Volumes published to date include the works of Henry Adams, Willa Cather, Stpehen Crane, W.E.B. Du Bois, Ralph Waldo Emerson, William Faulkner, Benjamin Franklin, Henry James, Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln, Jack London, Flannery O'Connor, Eugene O'Neill, Edgar Allan Poe, Mark Twain, Edith Wharton and Walt Whitman.

In the letter pledging her support for CLASSICS, Governor Richards said, "All that is inspiring, entertaining, and enlightening in the American library and historical tradition can be discovered in the volumes of The Library of America." The govenor remarked that the series would help encourage in students a sincere and lasting love of reading, and added, "There is nothing greater our schools can hope to give them."

Although a set of 60 volumes normally costs \$1,850, CLASSICS enables each participating high school to acquire the books for only \$600. foundation funding, and a substantial price reduction by The library of America exclusively for this program, puts the cost of each volume at \$10, or one third of the price.

Each volume averages 1,200 pages in length and includes several works by one author. I pass by an abandoned tire dump every day and it doesn't look as if anyone has started cleaning it up. Whom do I tell about it?

Call the Clean Texas 2000 Information Line to report the tires. If a Texas Water Commission District Office is listed in your telephone directory, it would be best for you to call that office, because the people there will probably be more familiar with your area. If none is listed, then call the Clean Texas 2000 number or call our tire specialists at 512/834-6683. We've identified about 350 abandoned tire sites in Texas. We're tackling the worst sites first, so it's possible that we know about the site you have mentioned. Nevertheless, we encourage you to call about any sites you know of. We'd rather hear about them twice than not at all.

What's the single most important thing I can do to

If you are a homeowner, the most immediate thing you can do to reduce what you send to the landfill is to cut back on yard waste through mulching and composting your grass and leaves. But the single most important thing you can do to reduce total waste produced by our nation is to learn to buy products that don't produce waste byproducts in their manufacture. It's not always easy, but you can look for products that don't require much wasteful packaging, for products that can be reused and for natural products that don't use petroleum as a base. When you shop, keep in mind the motto, reduce, reuse, recycle! And you could consider adding 'repair' to that list as well.

Immunization Clinic Scheduled

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted at the Texas Department of Health, 1014 N. Jefferson, Mt. Pleasant.

Clinic hours wil be from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Parents may call the clinic for an appointment for their child, (903)572-

9877, or arrive on a walk-in basis. The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guidelines, beginning at two months of

age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diptheria/Tctanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diptheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/ diptheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.


