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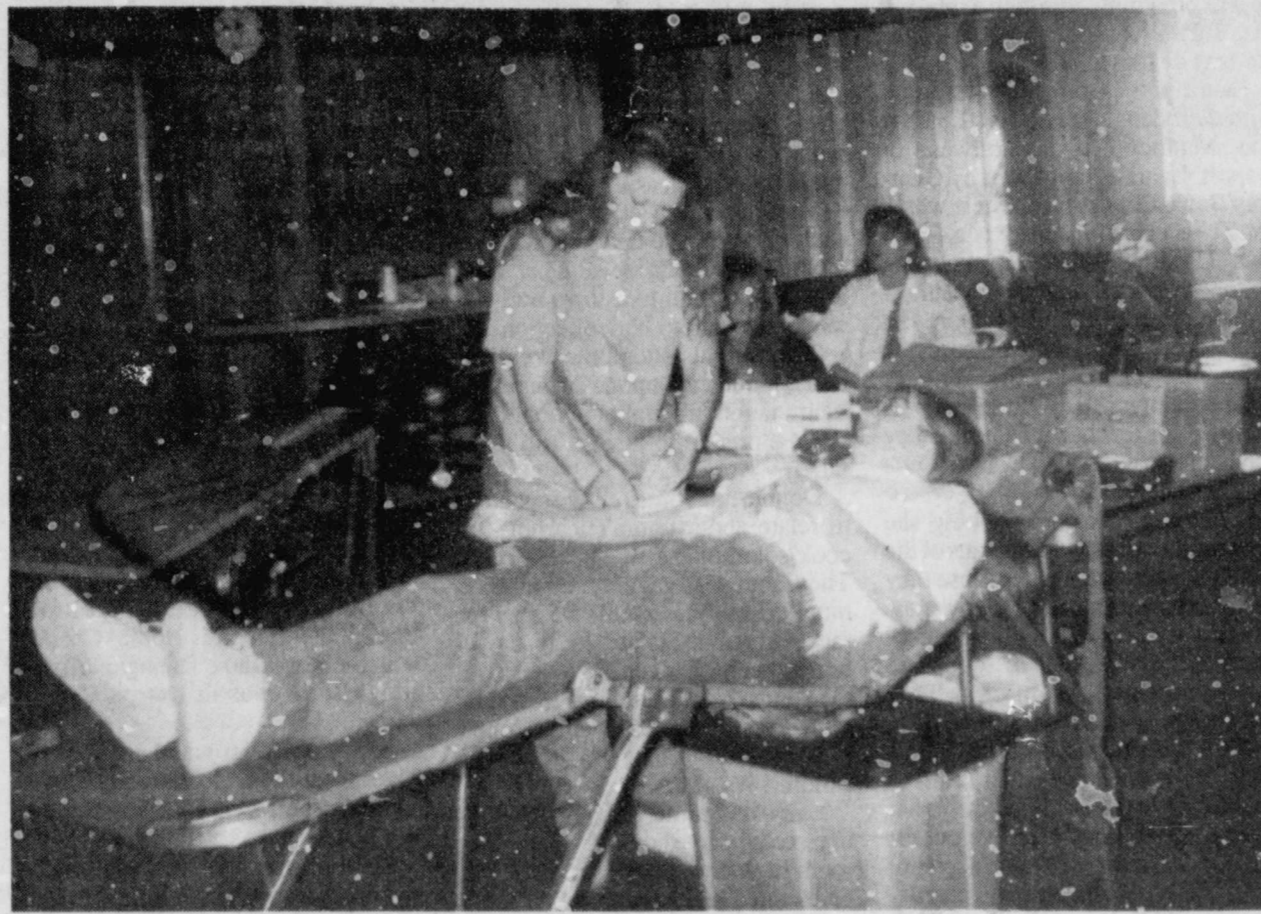

Rebels Face Tough Basketball Schedule

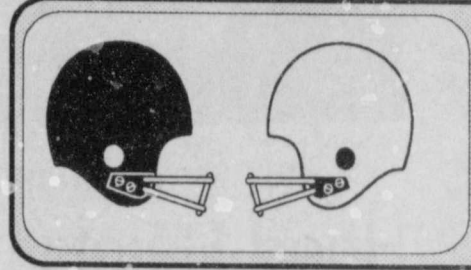
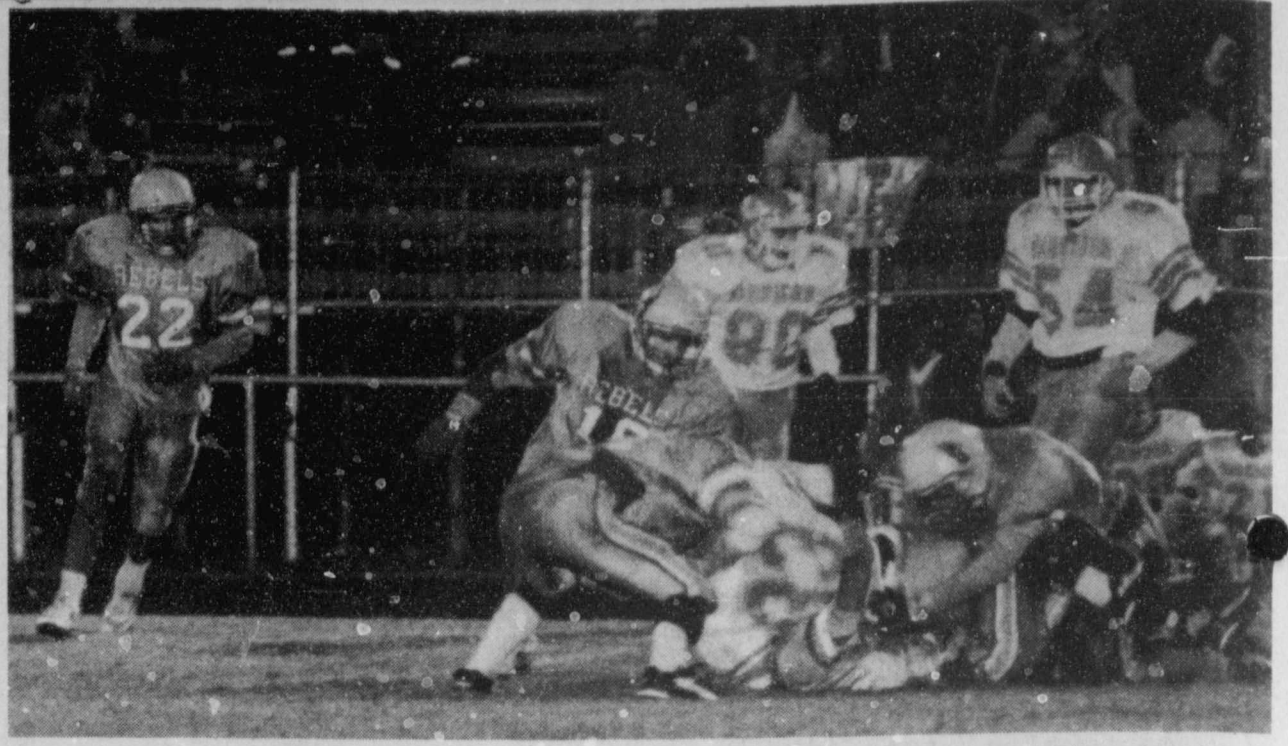

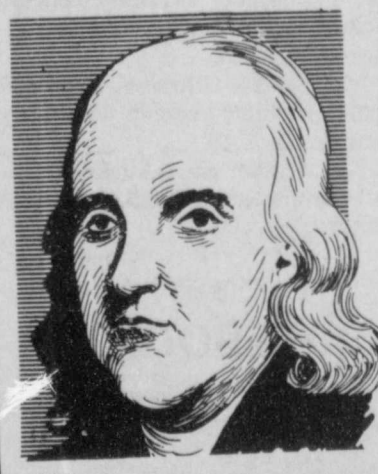

PUBLIC NOTICE

Contel of Texas, Inc. has filed an amendment to its application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for approval of its Universal Emergency Number Service 9-1-1 tariff. The proposed tariff establishes rules, regulations and rates including the provisioning of the B9-1-1, C9-1-1, and E9-1-1 services; optional services, such as Selective Routing and Data Base Administration; additional services, such as Forced Disconnect, Called Party Hold, Emergency Ringback, Switched Access System, and Public Safety Answering Point Equipment.

Customers affected are either 9-1-1 districts or councils of government with 9-1-1 responsibilities. The application does not propose changes to emergency fees charged to end-user customers.

Twenty-three customers would be affected by the Universal Emergency Number 9-1-1 tariff, which would increase annual revenues by \$10,107.12, a 2.92% increase in the revenues generated by the contract rates of the current customers. Customers will have the option, however, of continuing the rates under their contract for up to one 12-month renewal term.

The deadline to intervene in this proceeding is December 24, 1992. Correspondence or any other communication regarding this matter should reference Docket No. 10929.

Rivercrest Is Awarded American Classics

The Rivercrest High has been awarded a 60-volume set of the Library of America, the series described recently by Governor Ann Richards as "a priceless educational resource."

Rivercrest is participating in an innovative program called CLASSICS, designed to help public high schools improve book collections in their libraries. The award was made to the Rivercrest High School after it sent an application to The Library of America and pledged \$600 from local funds toward the cost of the books. The pledge was matched by \$600 from the Brown Foundation of Houston.

The library of America is a non-profit publishing enterprise that is committed to preserving the works of America's greatest writers in handsome and authoritative hardcover editions. Volumes published to date include the works of Henry Adams, Willa Cather, Stephen Crane, W.E.B. Du Bois, Ralph Waldo Emerson, William Faulkner, Benjamin Franklin, Henry James, Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln, Jack London, Flannery O'Connor, Eugene O'Neill, Edgar Allan Poe, Mark Twain, Edith Wharton and Walt Whitman.

In the letter pledging her support for CLASSICS, Governor Richards said, "All that is inspiring, entertaining, and enlightening in the American library and historical tradition can be discovered in the volumes of The Library of America." The governor remarked that the series would help encourage in students a sincere and lasting love of reading, and added, "There is nothing greater our schools can hope to give them."

Although a set of 60 volumes normally costs \$1,850, CLASSICS enables each participating high school to acquire the books for only \$600. foundation funding, and a substantial price reduction by The Library of America exclusively for this program, puts the cost of each volume at \$10, or one third of the price.

Each volume averages 1,200 pages in length and includes several works by one author. The supplementary notes and the chronology of the author's life and career in each volume make the collection especially useful in schools. The Rivercrest High School will receive the first 40 to 50 volumes of the series within the next few months; the remaining volumes will be shipped within a year's time.

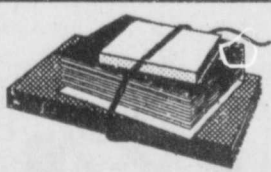

Basic Principles Of Community Benevolences Are Determined

The statement which follows is a guideline established by the various benevolent concerns in this community who, in a series of meetings to discuss the basic attitudes and capacities of each group, set forth the following criteria and recommendations. It should be noted that each entity is dedicated to doing what is within its power to be of assistance in emergencies to persons and families in the Bogata and surrounding communities.

A) We'll help you develop management skills, but we haven't the resources in money to pay your bills, (utilities, etc.).

B) Don't come to us with unrealistic expectations; you will only bring more distress and disappointment to your situation.

C) We don't distribute emergency funds until we have discussed the need within the steering committee, i.e., it will require generally a one day waiting period before receiving assistance.

D) So, don't wait until desperate to call us. Let us participate with you in locating alternate solutions to an otherwise "trapped in" situation.

E) A simple and basic history will be maintained for future reference as a means of guiding recipients to a sounder future.

In summary, our community wants to act responsibly and caringly toward one another. There are ways we can not help, and there are ways that we can. What we want to do is clarify what our role can be. (This information was provided by Rev. Bob Bush.)

New Historical Marker To Be Dedicated

The newest of over twenty official Texas State Historical Markers in Red River County will be dedicated in a public ceremony Saturday, November 14, 1992 at 2:00 p.m. The Arnold E. A. Roitsch Archeological Site marker has been erected near one of the first areas explored by the Texas Historical Commission and the Texas Archeological Society in

1991 and 1992, preserving the Caddo and pre-Caddo artifacts endangered by the periodic flooding of the Red River. Located was a large village occupied between AD 1000 and AD 1700 by ancestors of the Caddo. The marker is located about 5-6 miles west of Highway 37 on FM road 410, just south of the Red River.

Immunization Clinic Scheduled

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office, announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations, who meet the required family income determination guidelines.

The clinic will be conducted November 19 from 9-11:30 and 1-2:30 at 1300 Highway 37 North, Clarksville, Texas.

Future clinic dates will be announced. Parents may call the clinic for an appointment for their child, (903)572-9877, or arrive on a walk-in basis.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all preschool and school age children who meet the family income guide-

lines, beginning at two months of age. Immunizations offered include Measles/Mumps/Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis and Tetanus/diphtheria. The Haemophilus Influenzae type b vaccine is also available to medically eligible children between the ages of 2 months and 60 months. The pneumonia vaccine is available to all high risk patients meeting income guidelines. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record and Social Security number if available. The Tetanus/diphtheria vaccine is available to medically eligible adults. Should the parent or legal guardian have questions, please contact the above noted field office staff.

Collection boxes will be placed in the lobbies of the following Post Offices: Bagwell, Clarksville, Detroit and Talco.

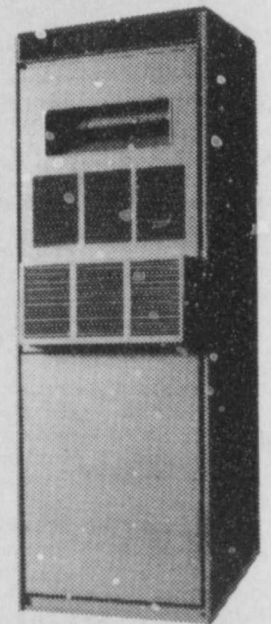

QUESTIONS TO THE CLEAN TEXAS 2000 HOTLINE: 1-800-458-9796

Q: I pass by an abandoned tire dump every day and it doesn't look as if anyone has started cleaning it up. Whom do I tell about it?

A: Call the Clean Texas 2000 Information Line to report the tires. If a Texas Water Commission District Office is listed in your telephone directory, it would be best for you to call that office, because the people there will probably be more familiar with your area. If none is listed, then call the Clean Texas 2000 number or call our tire specialists at 512/834-6683. We've identified about 350 abandoned tire sites in Texas. We're tackling the worst sites first, so it's possible that we know about the site you have mentioned. Nevertheless, we encourage you to call about any sites you know of. We'd rather hear about them twice than not at all.

Q: What's the single most important thing I can do to reduce waste?

A: If you are a homeowner, the most immediate thing you can do to reduce what you send to the landfill is to cut back on yard waste through mulching and composting your grass and leaves. But the single most important thing you can do to reduce total waste produced by our nation is to learn to buy products that don't produce waste by-products in their manufacture. It's not always easy, but you can look for products that don't require much wasteful packaging, for products that can be reused and for natural products that don't use petroleum as a base. When you shop, keep in mind the motto, reduce, reuse, recycle! And you could consider adding 'repair' to that list as well.

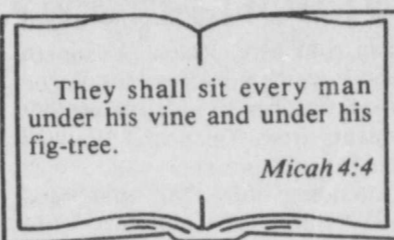

Article Tells About World's Largest Gin!

Mr. & Mrs. Vernon Lollar, of Fairfield Bay, Arkansas, formerly of Deport, sent a copy of an article run in the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette down to us here at the paper thinking we might be interested in it, which we were.

The article tells about Leacville Mississippi which is now the home of what is reputed to be the world's largest cotton gin.

Charles Dean "Boe" Adams says that the gin will have the capacity of about 2,000 bales per day.

Adams has a net investment of \$7.5 million in the building and equipment, and more than two acres are under one roof.

Under ideal conditions it could put out about 120 bales an hour.

There are ten gin stands in the huge plant.

Most of the cotton ginned will be in modules, and Adams has ten module trucks that will cotton from about a sixty mile radius. Trailer cotton will be ginned only at design-

nated times.

It is estimated that the gin will handle the cotton from about 62,000 acres. About 100,000 bales this year and about 120,000 in the future is predicted.

The entire operation is state-of-the-art.

He says that they try to make \$40 to \$45 per bale through marketing and ginning, anything above that they return to the farmer.

the gin will operate two twelve hour shifts daily with 17 people per shift.

Adams was once a basketball coach, and owns about 30,000 acres of land.

He also has pursued insurance in the past.

He and his family have recently moved into a 17,000 square foot home, complete with a 4,500 square foot guest house and a doo-doo tennis court!

He also operates a farm supply store as well as a fertilizer and chemical business.

Parents Can Help Child's School Performance

The key to a child's success in school does not depend on parents' employment, but involvement, according to a family specialist. Many working parents tend to feel guilty because they're not able to attend school functions during working hours, but they can do a number of things to help children with school performance.

All parents can provide an environment conducive to learning by following some basic steps such as these:

- Encourage children to eat a nutritious breakfast and lunch each day.
- Check school opening and closing times to determine proper times for arrival and departure.
- Participate in parent activities or organizations related to school. Volunteer to be a home-room parent. Even if you cannot attend every meeting or activity, you can make some contribution.
- Keep a list of your child's class schedule at your workplace. This

listing should include class, time, teacher, and location. Also list names and telephone numbers of school secretary, nurse, and counselor as well as principal.

- Keep your child's complaints about school in perspective. Avoid criticism of the school and it's personnel in your child's presence.

- Assist children with homework, but allow them to do the work. Provide a suitable study area and proper resources and supplies. Plan together and show interest in every aspect of your child's work.

Since more parents of school-aged children are employed outside of the home today, schools are taking steps to adjust. Parents should share needs with school administrators and become involved in cooperative and supportive ways that lead to a good educational environment for their children.
