After stopping and picking them up they were greeted with that instant trust which makes small animals so endearing.

Somehow, the betrayal of that trust seems criminal to me.

To begin with...it's irresponsible to have animals and allow them to just keep on having litters unless you can give the offspring good homes (or keep them yourself). I hear "Oh, but neutering is SO expensive". Count up the' amount spent on food bills for multiple pets and see if the money spent at the vet isn't well spent!

But the real point is...don't dump animals ANYWHERE. Not at a store where they might "have a chance at finding a home" (they usually don't)...not out in the country where they "can hunt for themselves" (they starve or die from

disease). At stores they are at terrible risk from vehicles. In the country they are eaten by coyotes, run over, or worst of all, may die a lingering death from starvation.

And it is so completely unnec-

Most of us can manage to run to "town" for just about anything...so why can't we take unwanted animals to the Humane Association vor Pound? Yes, they may have to be eliminated. But it is done quickly, and isn't painful. Or take them to a vet ... even shot them yourself! As harsh as it seems, it beats being injured or

killed on the road, or starving. Ican't abide cruelty...and dumping is cruel, cruel, cruel.

Please folks, don't do it! There is a verse which reads 'A good man looks to the welfare his animals" it's from Proverbs the Bible. Think about it.

Applications Sought For Residential Weatherization

The Community Council of Red River County is currently accepting applications for Residential Weatherization for citizens of Red River County. Applications will be accepted at 201 E. Baker, room 64, Clarksville from November 20-30.

The Residential Weatherization Program is designed for low income people who meet income guidelines and hav enever received weatherization services under this program before. Services are available for people that are home owners as well as people that rent their homes. Persons interested in receiving weatherization services under this program should bring them their recent income verification and Social Security numbers for all occupants of the household at the time of application.

The Residential Weatherization Program is a no cost program with limited funding for each home approved for weatherization, to reduce energy consumption within an applicants' home, therefore, lowering their utility bills. Some of the things addressed by the program are air infiltration into the home. This would be repair or replacement of doors, windows and any other items to stop air leaks into the home. Insulation may be added to attics to help hold heat in the house. Underpinning on pier and beam houses and mobile homes may be installed also.







1 can chili (any brand you prefer)
12-24 tortillas

Dice onion into small pieces. Fry hamburger meat over low heat adding a few onions for flavor. When meat is done, drain of as much of the grease as possible. Cover skillet with a lid and set to one side Take a 1/2 cup of oil and put into a

small saucepan on medium heat. Let the oil get warm, drop tortilla in one at a time for just a few seconds to get soft and take out. Repeat this as many imes as you need to

mAfter you have prepared the meat andtortillas, get a large pan (depending on how many tortillas you are making). Grate cheese in a bowl. Warm chili. Take one tortilla, put approximately 1 tablespoon meat, sprinkle with onions and cheese, roll over and put into the pan. Keep filling up tortillas until you have filled the pan. Pour chili over the top and sprinkle the rest of the onions and cheese over the top. Bake at 300 until cheese melts and chili is bubbling.

Several items can be substituted to make a low calorie meal. Substitute hamburger for lean, ground turkey, use low fat cheese and bake the tortillas in the oven on low until they are soft. Everyone can enjoy enchiladas even if they're on a diet. Note: There is no salt in this recipe.


Social Security and Supplemental Security Income beneficiaries will recveive a 3% increase in the benefit checks that they receive on Decembe4 31, 1992. The raise is a result of annual cost of living increases required by Social Security law.

For individual Social Security retirees, the average monthly benefit will increase from \$634 to \$653. In a family whee both spouses are beneficiaries, the monthly benefit will increase from \$1,029 to \$1,106. Average disability benefits go up from \$608 to \$627 per month.
