OsGood Pie by Jean Taylor

- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1 stick oleo
- 2 cups raisins cooked til tender and drained
- 2 cups chopped apples
- 1 cup chopped walnuts or pecans
- 1 Tbsp vinegar
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp nutmeg.

Cream sugar and oleo, add beaten eggs. Add apples, raisins, nuts, vinegar, cinnamon and nutmeg. Pour into 2 unbaked pastry shell. Bake 45 minutes at 325 degrees. May be served with whipped cream.

Neiman-Marcus Cake

- First Layer
- 1 Box Duncan Hines cake mix - yellow
- 1 stick oleo
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- Second Layer
- 1 box powdered sugar (reserve 1/2 cup for later)
- 2 eggs
- 8 oz. cream cheese
- 1/2 tsp vanilla

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour 13x9 in cake pan. Mix the cake mix, oleo and 2 eggs together; spread in bottom of pan. Batter will be thick. Sprinkle 1/2 cup chopped pecans over batter. Now mix powdered sugar, 2 eggs, cream cheese, and vanilla well; pour over mixture in pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes. While cake is warm, sift 1/2 cup powdered sugar on top.

Food Processor Pastry

- Yield: 1 nine inch crust
- 1 cup all purpose flour
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1/4 cup shortening
- 1/4 cup cold water minus 1 Tbsp.

Position knife blade in food processor bowl; add flour and salt. Top with

cover and process pulsing 3 or 4 times or until combined. Add shortening to flour mixture until resembles coarse meal. With processor running, slowly add water (1 Tbsp at a time); then add 1 Tbsp vinegar. Process only until dough begins to form a ball and leaves sides of bowl. Cover and chill 30 minutes.

Roll dough 1/8 inch thick on lightly floured surface. Place in a 9 in. pie plate. Prick bottom and sides of pastry generously with fork. Bake at 425 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes or until golden brown.

Hot Chili Stew

- 1-3 pound can pinto beans
- 2 pounds ground chuck
- 1 large Spanish onion chopped
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/4 cup chili powder
- 2 Tbsp cumin
- 2 Tbsp hot red pepper sauce
- 2 tsp salt
- 1-1 lb can red tomatoes drained
- 4 Tbsp tomato paste
- 5 to 6 cups water
- 1 large green pepper, chopped
- 3 canned green chiles minced
- 1/4 cup picante sauce
- dash of cayenne pepper
- dash of black pepper

Brown ground chuck over medium heat. Drain. Add onion, garlic, green pepper, green chiles. When onion becomes translucent, add can of tomatoes. Turn burner off.

In a large pot put beans, chili powder, cumin, pepper sauce, salt, tomato Paste, water, picante sauce, cayenne and black pepper. Turn burner on. As beans begin to boil, add beef and tomato mixture. Turn heat down and let chili simmer with cover on 30 minutes. Remove cover and cook 30 minutes more. Serve in soup bowls with crackers.

Remember- You may add more or less chili powder, chiles and hot pepper sauce to determine heat of final product.

Rose Mary Swinford opened the meeting by reading the mission theme verse from Proverbs 14:31, then Colossians 3:12-17, 23-24. Alice

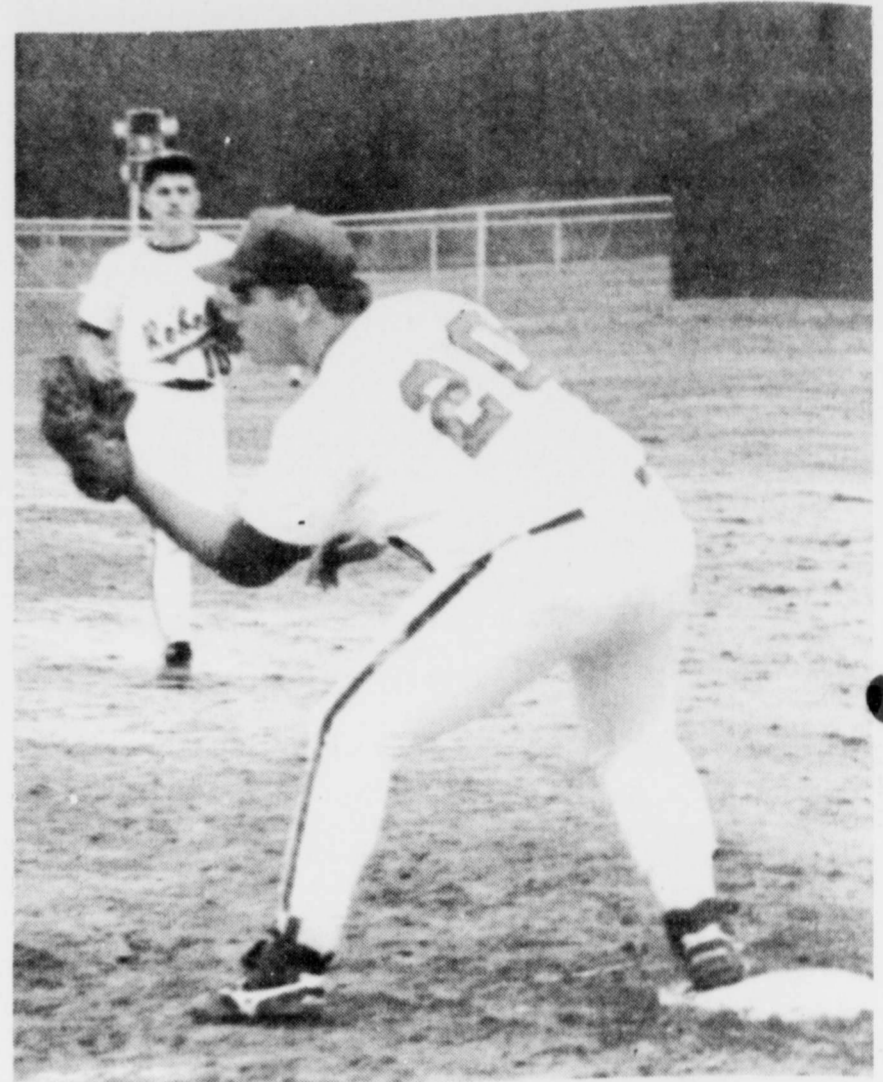

Scouts Complete Cookie Campaign

The Red River Valley Girl Scout Council has just completed another successful cookie order campaign and wishes to thank all of the people who have supported Girl Scouts through the purchase of cookies.

The girls who came to your door, met you at the store, or called you on the phone will benefit from your purchases in a number of ways. Selling Girl Scout cookies teaches girls about goal-setting (both troop and individual), working together as a team, meeting the public, making change, spending earned troop and individual profits wisely, and how to meet the public in a safe and courteous manner. Those girls who sell cookies each year learn how important customer satisfaction is as they receive orders from "their" customers year after year.

While the girls, troops and council all gain financially from cookie sales, there can be no doubt that a sense of accomplishment is definitely felt by girls who earn their way to resident camp, day camp or special events. Girls who earn various incentives realize that hard work pays off both in feeling good about themselves and in merchandise. Incentives include jewelry, sports bottles, T-shirts, telephones, radio-flashlights, flight bags, and for the top cookie-seller in the council, a \$100 cash prize. Older girls have the opportunity to accrue credit to be used to pay for a council-approved trip, in addition to the other incentives. Even though all camp fees are extremely reasonable, there are many girls who cannot attend these events without earning some or all of the fee

themselves by selling cookies.

Councils throughout the nation are dependent upon funding from United Ways, donations from corporations, businesses and individuals, grants and cookie sales for operating funds. As income from the first five sources increases, less emphasis will have to be placed on cookie sales, and more of the profit from cookies sales can be used to maintain and improve Camp Gambill, purchase and maintain other program supplies, such as camping equipment, canoes, sailboats, etc., and provide more service and training for Girl Scout volunteers.

While people may prefer not to think of Girl Scouting as a business, good business practices, both nationally and locally, are essential for keeping Girl Scouting current, interesting and available to girls. For not-for-profit organizations that rely on public donations, a one-year operating reserve is not a luxury, rather it is a necessity. Any time expenses must be cut due to decreased income, services to troops are the first to be affected since there is little that can be done to reduce building payments, utility costs, travel expenses, insurance, maintenance of facilities or other typical expenses. When finances improve, it takes a long time to regain lost ground in services to troops.

Perhaps one of the reasons Girl Scout cookie sales have remained successful is that both girls and the public benefit from them. The girls gain a sense of accomplishment and pride in their organization and product while the public gains personal satisfaction from contributing to a worthwhile cause and a great tasting cookie. What a great combination!

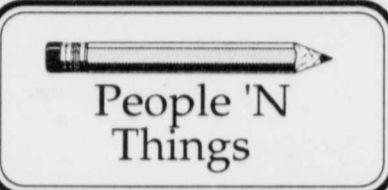
