

Hospital Grants Tax Credit To County Residents

trict Board of Managers voted Monday to offer a homestead tax credit to Titus County homestead taxpayers using hospital services. The goodwill gesture came in response to a citizen's letter to the Daily Tribune editor requesting relief from hospital bills for taxpayers.

"We want our own taxpayers to benefit directly when they support Titus County Memorial Hospital with their healthcare business," said Wayne Ogburn, hospital administrator. "This is one way we can recognize the importance of our taxpayers in an era when they have a choice of hospitals."

For each dollar a Titus County resident pays in hospital tax on their homestead property, an equal dollar credit can be applied to their TCMH bill incurred during that tax year. This offer becomes effective to patients who receive services on or after April 1, 1994.

The procedure for receiving your credit is fairly simple, Ogburn said. A person just presents proof of their homestead tax payment for the current tax year when they are making their final payment for inpatient or outpatient services. This must be within 90 days of the date service was rendered. Credit can be applied only once each tax year.

Chief Financial Officer Alex Popkey offered this scenario about how the residence credit works:

A younster has a mishap and receives emergency room care that totals \$338. Private insurance pays \$270. The child's father, a homeowner of property valued at \$50,000, presents his proof of homestead tax payment for the current tax year, which is \$60.92. He pays \$7.08 cash on the

The Titus County Hospital Dis-account, and then the \$60.92 credit is applied to get a paid-in-full or zero balance on the bill.

Popkey reported to the Board that if every eligible homestead taxpayer received hospital services and met the tax credit qualification requirements, the hospital's cash flow would be reduced by an estimated \$52,000 each tax year.

According to Ogburn, residence credit is one very tangible way hospital management can reduce medical bills for county residents.

We are extremely glad to be able to offer this credit to taxpayers," Ogburn said, "and we're continuing to do everything within our power to hold costs down for all our patients.

The tax credit policy will be posted in the hospital registration area and cashier's office, and reads as follows (a few eligibility requirements have been established to simplify bookkeeping):

(A) Patient must be a Titus County homestead owner, or a member of the household living at the address of the homestead taxpayer, during the current tax calendar year;

(B) Patient must present proof of homestead tax payment for the current calendar tax year for either inpatient or outpatient services;

(C) The total amount of the residence credit is applied to a single account -- no residual amount will remain available for a subsequent patient registration;

(D) Residence credit is available only when payments from all sources, including the residence credit, results in the account being "paid in full;" and

(E) Residence credit or a portion thereof cannot be refunded, accrued annually, or result in a credit balance.

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

Food Processor Pastry Yield: 1 nine inch crust

1 cup all purpose flour 1/4 tsp salt

1/4 cup shortening 1/4 cup cold water minus 1 Tbsp.

Position knife blade in food processor bowl; add flour and salt. Top with cover and process pulsing 3 or 4 times or until combined. Add shortening to flour mixture until resembles coarse meal. With processor running, slowly add water (1 Tbsp at a time); then add 1 Tbsp vinegar. Process only until dough begins to form a ball and leaves sides of bowl. Cover and chill 30 minutes.

Roll dough 1/8 inch thick on lightly floured surface. Place in a 9 in. pie plate. prick bottom and sides of pastry generously with fork. Bake at 425 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes or until golden brown.

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


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Bogata's First Baptist Has Week Of Prayer For Home Missions

Rose Mary Swinford opened the meeting by reading the mission theme verse from Proverbs 14:31. then Colossians 3:12-17,23-24. Alice



The Red River Valley Girl Scout Council has just completed another successful cookie order campaign and wishes to thank all of the people who have supported Girl Scouts

through the purchase of cookies. The girls who came to your door, met you at the store, or called you on the phone will benefit from your purchases in a number of ways. Selling Girl Scout cookies teaches girls about goal-setting (both troop and individual), working together as a team, meeting the public, making change, spending earned troop and individual profits wisely, and how to meet the public in a safe and courteous manner. Those girls who sell cookies each year learn how important customer satisfaction is as they receive orders from "their" customers year after year.

While the girls, troops and council all gain financially from cookie sales, there can be no doubt that a sense of accomplishment is definitely felt by girls who earn their way to resident camp, day camp or special events. Girls who earn various incentives realize that hard work pays off both in feeling good about themselves and in merchandise. Incentives include jewelry, sports bottles, T-shirts, telephones, radioflashlights, flight bags, and for the top cookie-seller in the council, a \$100 cash prize. Older girls have the opportunity to accrue credit to be used to pay for a council-approved trip, in addition to the other incentives. Even though all camp fees are extremely reasonable, there are many girls who cannot attend these events without earning some or all of the fee themselves by selling cookies.

Councils throughout the nation are dependent upon funding from United Ways, donations from corporations, businesses and individuals, grants and cookie sales for operating funds. As income from the first five sources increases, less emphasis will have to be placed on cookie sales, and more of the profit from cookies sales can be used to maintain and improve Camp Gambill, purchase and maintain other program supplies, such as camping equipmenmt, canoes, sailboats, etc., and provide more service and training for Girl Scout volunteers.

While people may prefer not to think of Girl Scouting as a business, good business practices, both nationally and locally, are essential for keeping Girl Scouting current, interesting and available to girls. For notfor-profit organizations that rely on public donations, a one-year operating reserve is not a luxury, rather it is a necessity.
