Never Fail Crunchy Salmon Patties

- 1 (15-16 oz.) can pink salmon 1/3 cup minced onion
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder 1 egg
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 1/2 cups oil

Drain salmon; set aside two tablespoons of the juice. In a medium mixing bowl, mix salmon, egg and onion. stir in flour. Add baking powder to salmon juice; stir into salmon mixture. form into patties and fry until golden brown in hot oil.

Banana Nut Cake

- 2 cups flour 1 tsp soda
- 1/2 cup shortening 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs
- 3 ripe bananas 4 tablespoons buttermilk
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans

Sift flour and soda; set aside; Cream shortening and sugar until fluffy. Beat eggs and add to shortening mixture. Mash bananas. Add to mixture then add flour and buttermilk alternately. Add vanilla and pecans. Bake in layers for 25 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool before icing.

- ICING:
- I stick margarine 1 box powdered sugar
- 2 ripe bananas 1 cup pecans
- Cream margarine and powdered sugar. Fold in mashed bananas and add pecans. Spread on cooled cake.

The number of pediatric poisonings reflects a need to focus poison prevention efforts on toxic substances ound in the home. People should

Keep all medicines out of the reache of children

Never assume that Child-Resistant containers are child PROOF contain-

Carefully store drain operners, solvents, anti-freeze, kerosene, gasoline, pesticides or other toxic material out of the reach of children.

There are Poison Control Centers throughout the United States that maintain information for health care professionals and the public on recommended treatment for the ingestion of household products and medicines. They are familiar with the toxicity of most substances found inthe home, or know how to find this information. Their phone number can be found on the inside cover of the yellow or white pages of the phone directory. Advise all of your patients to post this number on their telephones. If they need to call a Poison Control Center in an emergency, they will need to give the following informa-





- Have the numbers of your local poison control center and physician near the telephone at all times.
