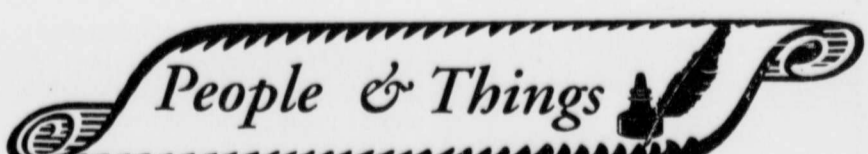

Scams Can Be Avoided

One of the lowest things in the world is a scam that preys upon the elderly.

And, unfortunately, these scams abound. Statistics reveal that one of the main ways unscrupulous people take advantage of others is the Drive-way Swindle.

This one is common throughout the nation, and has happened numerous times right here in this area.

The scam goes something like this: a truck pulls up in a gravel driveway. The driver tells you that he and his helper have just finished a nearby job and have some asphalt left over. They offer to repave the gravel drive for a real "bargain". They have to hurry and do the job right now, of course. The job is done and paid for and it is only later that the owner of the driveway discovers that the price was no bargain, in fact was very much higher than reputable contractor could do, and within a few weeks grass is growing through the surface.

The same routine is frequently used with painting roofs or barns.

The paint isn't the right kind and the first big rain is likely to wash most of it off.

The next scam is the "help us advertise" ad in a paper. The siding company wants ten houses to redo (or five or however many) and they would like to do yours as an example

of it's good work. In exchange the company will waive labor charges and you will only pay for the siding.

The cost of the siding, however, will be inflated so that there is no bargain to be found.

More direct is the problem of two or three people, often clean cut and nicely spoken who come into your house to talk to you about domain specific repairs. While one keeps the householder distract the others will steal.

"Almost Name Brands" are another problem. Telephone sales, or door to door sales frequently offer special prices. The name of the product is spoken quickly and sounds like a well-known brand, but upon receiving it the product is not the well known brand, but an "off brand".

To avoid these scams get competitive bids, don't pay money out before things are checked out, ask for references, names, numbers of satisfied customers, and always use people that are known if at all possible. NEVER pay money before services are rendered!

Don't be rushed, don't fall for the "we have to hurry" routine.

If you are elderly, it never hurts to call family or friends, this will make unscrupulous people very nervous.

Be wary, be careful and avoid these problems.

One of the perks of this job is the nice people I get to meet. During the last few months, with county and local elections taking place, I have been fortunate enough to meet more new people than normal. Of all those who came in doing election business, only one admitted to being a cook. I was able to get him to promise that I could feature him as the country cook just as soon as the elections were all finished. I collected on that promise this week.

Mr. J.R. Lewis is the newly elected Red River County Justice of The Peace. He and his wife, Martha, own a grocery store and Bar B Q business in Clarksville. They will be selling the business so that he may devote all of his time to his new duties.

I really enjoyed meeting Mrs. Lewis, and visiting again with Mr. Lewis. The area of their business in which folks eat is quite compact, but every inch of space is utilized effectively. When they told me how much food they prepare fresh daily, I asked how many people they could seat. One of them, I'm not sure which, said, "We can seat 700 people, eleven at a time." I still don't know how many people they serve, but I'll bet that anyone who comes in has a good time.

Mr. and Mrs. Lewis have two daughters, LuAnne Major and her husband, Mike, have the Lewis' only grandchild, Becky. Amy Lewis is the younger daughter. J.R. told me that when Amy was in elementary school she came home one afternoon and told him that she was supposed to carry a batch of cookies to class the next day so everyone could share

them. J. R. loves to bake sweets. He is sharing his Orange Slice Cake, his Hot Fudge Pie, and his Old Fashioned Teacakes recipes with us this week. My mouth is watering already.

Hot Fudge Pie by J.R. Lewis

3 eggs
1 1/4 cup sugar
3 Tbsp milk
3 Tbsp light Karo
1 tsp vanilla
1/3 cup margarine
3 oz. unsweetened chocolate
1 cup pecans
1 9" unbaked pie shell

Melt chocolate and margarine over hot water or in microwave. Beat eggs. Add sugar, milk, karo and vanilla. Stir until well combined. Add chocolate mixture and stir. Then add pecans. Pour into an unbaked pie shell and bake at 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes. Pie will rise and crack on top when done. As it cools it will sink in the middle. Not beautiful but delicious.

Old Fashioned Teacakes

Cream well:
1 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
Then add:
2 eggs, well beaten
2 tsp vanilla
Mix and add:
2 1/2 cups flour
1 tsp baking powder
1/2 tsp salt

Continue adding extra flour on rolling board until they roll well. Roll out

and cut. Only add enough extra flour to make them roll better. Bake on lightly greased cookie sheet at 350 degrees for 8-10 Minutes.

Orange Slice Cake

1 cup margarine
2 cups sugar
4 eggs
Cream the above ingredients well.
1 1/2 cups buttermilk
1 tsp soda dissolved in milk
4 cups flour
1/4 tsp salt
1-10 1/2 oz. bottle maraschino cherries drained. (Using both red and green cherries makes it more colorful)
1 lb. chopped dates
2 lb. orange slice candy (chopped)
1 lb. Angel flake coconut
2 cups pecans or walnuts
2 tsp. grated orange peel

Stir all ingredients together, adding chopped cherries, orange candy and nuts late. Pour into tube pan and small loaf pan, both well greased. Bake 1 hour and 20 minutes at 350 degrees. Mix and stir often:
1 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup orange juice.

Pour onto cooled cake as glaze. If you will mix the sugar and orange juice early enough, the sugar will dissolve without any problem.

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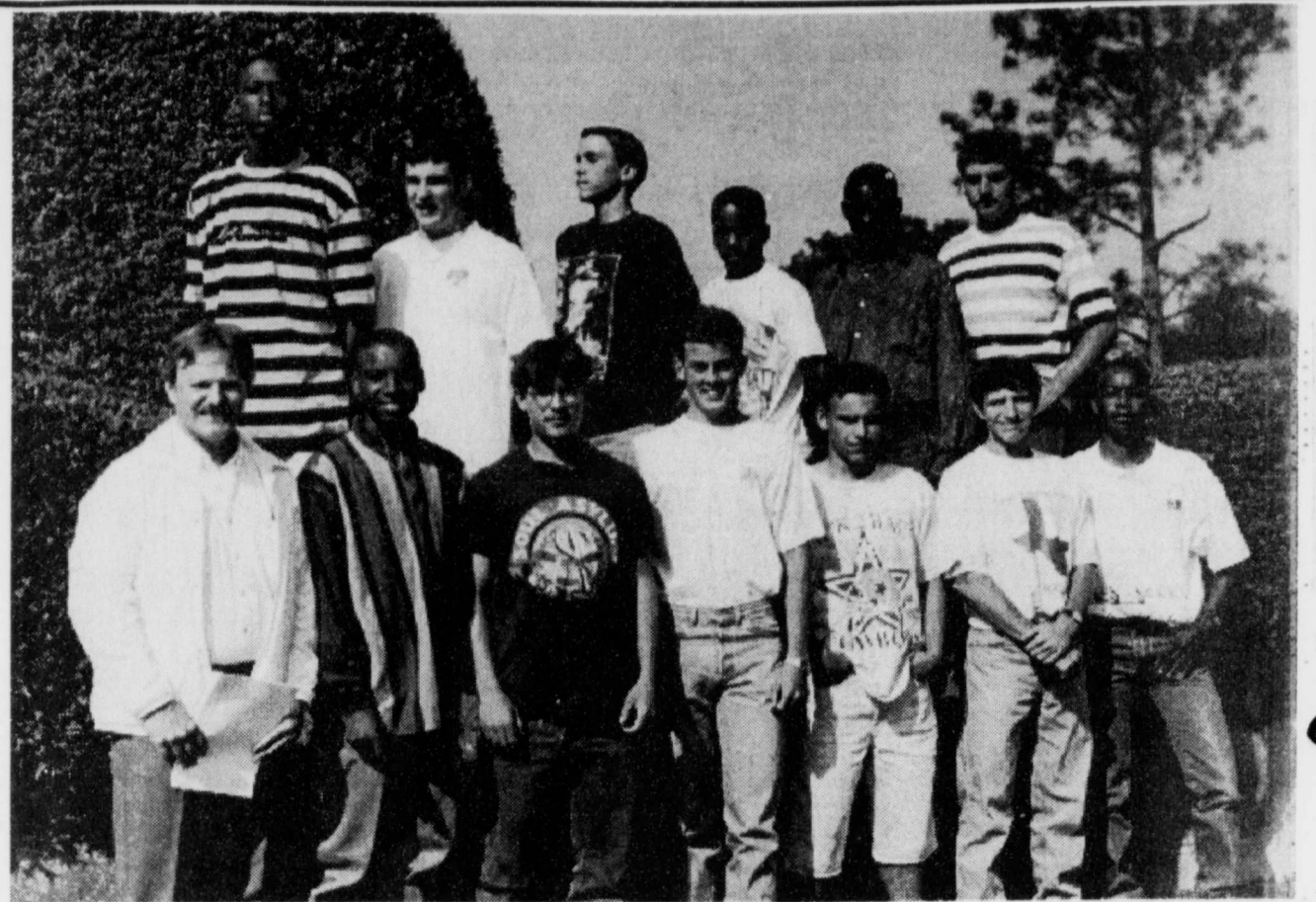

Tax Rebates For April Total \$113.3 Million

A total of \$113.3 million in April sales tax rebates was delivered by State Comptroller John Sharp to 979 Texas cities and 111 counties, a 14.4% increase over the payments of one year ago.

This month's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in February and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in March.

"Continued construction growth in all major metro areas of Texas has

helped push statewide employment to its highest level in more than four years," Sharp said, "with total employment up 3.4% over the same period in 1993."

Ten special purpose districts around the state were sent monthly payments totaling just over \$1 million, up 21.8% above last year's \$892,181.

Tornado Facts Are Good To Know

The average number of tornadoes in Texas each year is 119 with an average of 11 Texans killed each year.

Tornadoes can occur any time during the year, but are most frequent in Texas during the months of April, May and June.

Tornadoes can occur at any time of the day, but are most frequent in Texas between 3 p.m. and 6 p.m. CST.

Sometimes tornado outbreaks occur where tornadoes cause widespread damage over an extensive area. During the afternoon and evening of April 3rd and the early morning of April 4th, 1974, a "super outbreak" of 148 tornadoes across 13 states

killed more than 300 people, injured more than 6,000, and caused \$600 million in damage.

Most tornadoes (about 7 out of every 10) are weak with wind speeds no greater than about 110 mph, and a path length which averages 3 miles.

Nearly 3 out of every 10 tornadoes are strong, with wind speeds between 110 and 200 mph, and a path length which averages 9 miles.

It has been rumored that rivers, hills, and valleys protect an area from tornadoes. This is not true. Tornadoes have been observed to cross rivers and valleys and to climb over mountains with little change in intensity.

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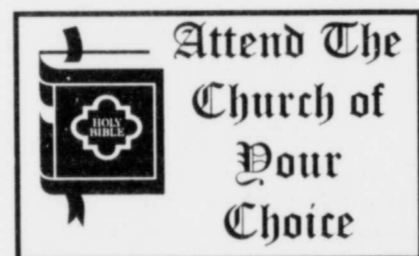
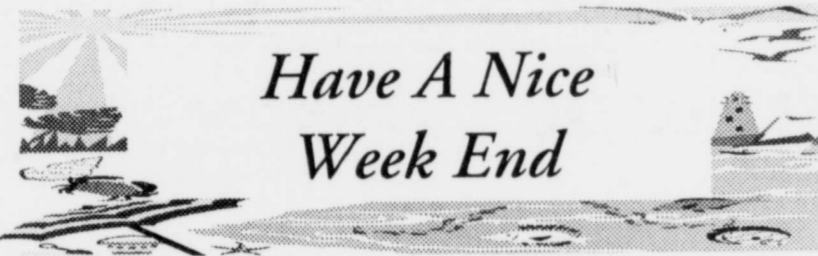
