Long-distance charges would not apply for the calls, but there would be a monthly charge for all Talco customers of up to \$3.50 for each residential line and up to \$7.50 for each business line.

Box 10900, Austin, TX 78766-9976. Returned ballots must be received by June 2, 1994. The results of the ballot will be communicated by GTE as soon as they are known.






