Talco Exes Committee Meets

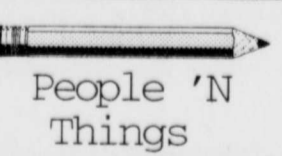

On June 14, We Remember The United States Flag Is Rich In History

On Tuesday, June 14, the U.S. flag will celebrate its 217th birthday. The flag of the United States of America is a living thing that calls to our spirit, reminding us of the greatness of our America. It signifies a people dedicated to liberty, justice and freedom for all.

Since its birth over 200 years ago, this emblem of our great nation has led a stirring life, rich in history. The Continental Congress resolved on June 14, 1777, that the flag of the 13 United States be thirteen alternating red and white stripes; that the union be 13 stars on a blue field, representing a new constellation. With this grand declaration, the Stars and Stripes were born.

Unfortunately, the Congress did not specify an arrangement for the stars in the union, and as a result there were many variations in the flags that followed. Betsy Ross, a Philadelphia seamstress is often credited with making the first flag. While many historians feel that there is not enough evidence to support this story, the legend lives on.

The star-spangled banner flew above Baltimore's Fort McHenry when the British attacked on Sept. 13, 1814. Francis Scott Key, a Washington lawyer, was so moved by the sight of the American flag still flying over the fortress the next morning that he wrote what later became our National Anthem.

In 1892, Francis Bellamy, and

ordained minister, championed a patriotic campaign to institute the flying of the national flag over schools and other public buildings. The campaign reached a crescendo with a well orchestrated national celebration of the 400th anniversary of the discovery of America by Columbus.

In the material that Bellamy circulated nationwide, he wrote, "Let the flag float over every schoolhouse in the land and the exercise be such as shall impress upon our youth the praitric duty of citizenship." Bellamy also included the original 23 words of the Pledge of Allegiance that he wrote and published in the Youth's Companion magazine.

When recounting in later life the story of how the Pledge of Allegiance originated, Bellamy wrote, "The first time I heard it was when it was roared out by 6,000 high school students in Boston, and I felt my thrill as I realized it was a living contribution to patriotic education and sentiment..."

The Pledge has been modified three times since Bellamy penned his original works. In 1923, the words, "the flag of the United States" were substituted for "my flag." Even greater distinction was attained one year later when "of America" was added. Members of the National Fraternal Congress of America were instrumental in the addition of the phrase "under God" to the Pledge of Allegiance in 1954. Since then the

pledge has read; I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation in 1916 setting aside June 14 as a special day to honor the flag. "When we observe Flag Day, we help our children to better understand the principles of liberty and justice which make our nation great. We show the world that we are a nation of responsible citizens dedicated to preserving these precepts for future generations. Finally, as individuals, we renew our own belief in America and in freedom and justice for all." Despite Wilson's plea, it was not until 1949 that Congress made this day a permanent observance.

Nearly 70 years later, the National Flag Foundation inaugurated a new tradition of honoring the flag by instituting a nationwide recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance. Called the "Pause for the Pledge." This Flag Day activity urges all Americans to recite the Pledge in unison at 7 p.m., on Tuesday, June 14. The effect of this simple ceremony, which transcends age, race, religion, national origin, political and geographic differences, is a stimulating patriotic experience at home and a sigh of unity abroad.

Cream Cheese Squares
by Jo Horn

(1)
1/2 cup soft butter
1 egg beaten
1 box yellow cake mix
Mix well- will be stiff, spread in baking dish with hands.

(2)
8 oz. carton cream cheese
1 cup brown sugar
1 tsp vanilla
2 eggs beaten
1 cup powdered sugar
pinch of salt

Mix well, pour over first mixture and bake at 325 degrees for 45 to 50 minutes. Cake will not be firm in middle and will fall after removing from oven. Cool and cut into squares.

Lipton Roast and Gravy
3-4 lb. roast
1 pkg. Instant Lipton Onion Soup Mix
2-cans Mushroom soup- (add no water)
2 Tbls- steak sauce

Place roast on heavy duty foil. Mix together soup mix cans of soup and steak sauce (May also add onions-potatoes and carrots at this time, if you like) Pour over roast seal foil. Place in 350 degree oven for 3 hrs.

Super Banana Pudding
1 large instant vanilla pudding mix
3 cups cold milk

1 can Eagle Brand Milk
1 medium cool whip
7-8 sliced bananas
1-2 boxes vanilla wafers
1-8 oz. cream cheese

Mix pudding and cold milk. In another bowl beat Eagle Brand milk and cream cheese. Fold in cool whip. Then mix with pudding mixture. Put sliced bananas and vanilla wafers in bottom of bowl. (Make 2 layers) Four 1/2 mix over each layer of wafers and bananas. Chill before serving.

Green Bean-Shoe Peg Corn and Almond Casserole
1 can shoe peg corn
1 can french cut green beans
1 8 oz. carton of sour cream
1 large onion chopped fine
1 cup cheddar cheese grated
1 can cream of celery soup- no water
dash of garlic powder

Topping
1 tube ritz crackers crushed
1 stick margarine melted
1/2 cup sliced almonds

Rub casserole dish with butter. Put corn, green beans in baking dish. Mix sour cream, onions, cheese, celery soup and garlic powder. Pour over beans and corn.

Mix crushed ritz crackers, butter, and almonds. Pour over casserole and bake 25-30 minutes at 350 degrees until golden and bubbly.

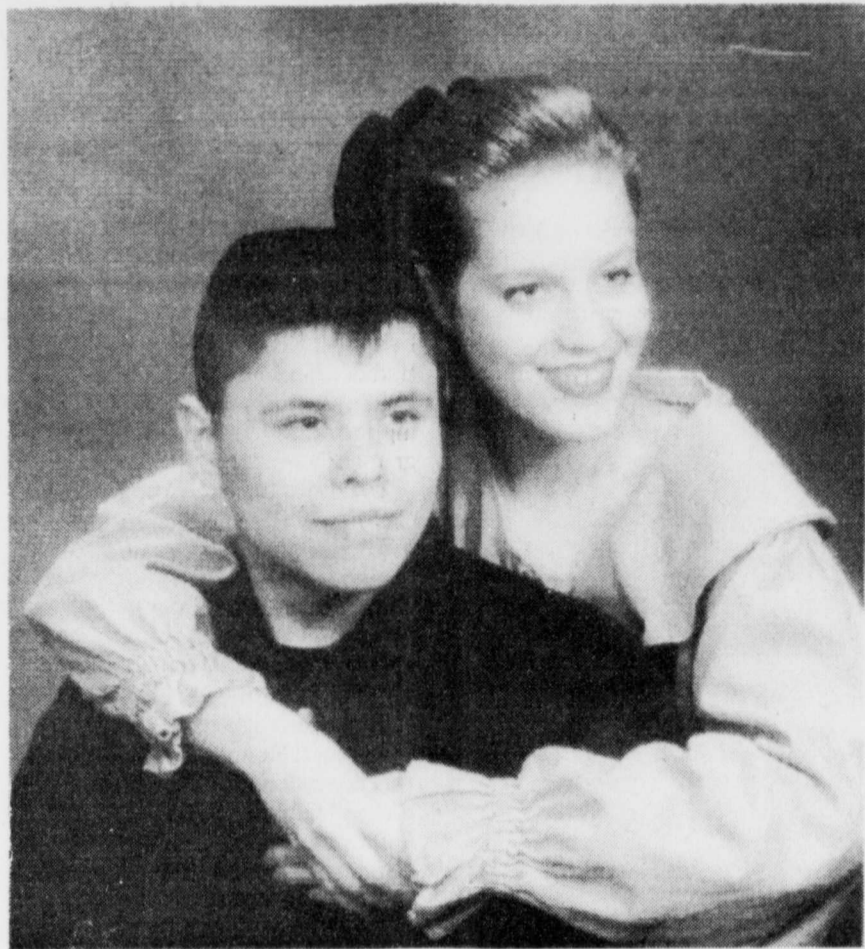

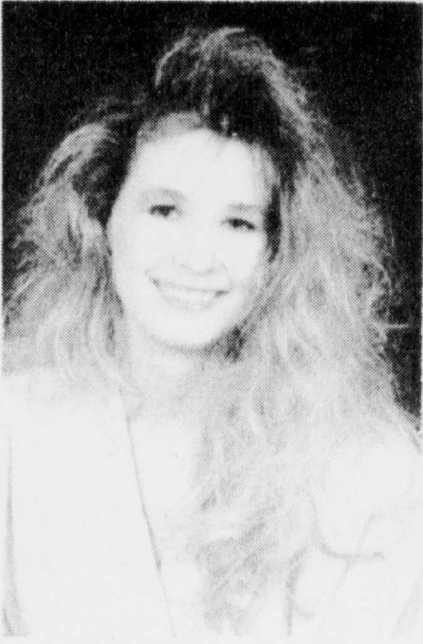

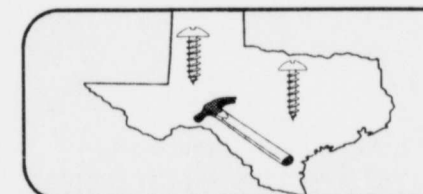

Nuts & Bolts

Back in the '60s we had a 1961 Plymouth. That car was a real lemon, and to top off all the malice I felt toward that car, the big guys decided that we needed seat belts put in it. We had until a certain date to take it to a shop and have the seat belts bolted into the back floor board so that the belts could be pushed up through the seat and be buckled around our bodies as we drove that lemon down the street on the days it would crank. We just left the belts buckled together in the back floor. We would never get in a car buckled down that way. We may not be able to get out of the car if we had a wreck.

Donald had had a wreck in 1960 when he went to sleep and hit a street sweeping machine. He rammed his head through the windshield and impaled his arm on the broken steering wheel. We never gave a second thought to anything which would have protected him, we just thought that when you had a wreck, you got hurt. We had not been introduced to seatbelts at that time, anyway.

Through the years we purchased other cars, which all came with the belts and we never once considered buckling them.

On August 21, 1984 I received a phone call at work telling me that someone more precious than life itself to me had been in a fatal collision. Maybe seat belts would have helped. We'll never know. Even after that, I still could not bring myself to use them.

About a year after the Seatbelt law began being enforced seriously, Tana and I split a \$42.00 fine for riding in a car without our belts buckled. At the time I thought the Highway Pa-

trolman should have been taking care of dangerous folks instead of peering into cars and meddling in my business to see if I had those dastardly belts buckled.

In 1988 I once again received the same kind of phone call about someone just as dear, but even though he had gone to sleep and cut a telephone pole completely in half, he had walked away from the accident because he had on his seatbelts.

I had become a little bit better about wearing mine by that time. Sometimes I would just pull them in across so they would look buckled in case I met the Law.

Saturday morning, some nice folks came to our back door and told Donald that Tana had been involved in an accident on her way to Rivercrest to teach her driver's ed class. The man also told Donald that she was okay. Donald related all of the message to me except the part about her being okay. He kept hurrying me to get in the car and get to the scene. I held my breath until we got to Johtown and she came walking across the highway.

The wrecked car is a disaster as is the pickup which hit her. She is very sore from where the seatbelts bruised her as they kept her from flying through the windshield. The two young men in the other vehicle also walked away from the accident. I don't know if they had their seat belts on or if they were just lucky, but as badly as I hate them, I plan to use my seatbelts and I will be buckling them, even if I am only going one block. Most accidents happen close to home and the seatbelts at least give us a fighting chance.

Medicaid Process Has Changed

The Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1993 (OBRA-93) has changed some of the most critical areas of Medicaid eligibility. Waiting periods, look back periods, and stepped up estate recovery are critical areas affected when Congress adopted this bill Aug. 10.

These three areas must be examined closely, in light of this new act, before making decisions about what senior citizens should do to enhance Medicaid eligibility.

Senior Information Services is an organization serving older American's financial needs throughout the state of Texas and provides a wide range of services to help individuals understand how proper financial planning can greatly enhance the quality of life in their retirement years.

To receive Medicaid, one of the qualifications is that the recipient cannot have more than \$2,000 in countable resources (checking and savings accounts, CDs, stocks and bonds and some life insurance policies).

Medicaid applicants who exceed this \$2,000 limit must "spend-down" their estate on their own long term care before qualifying for benefits.

Some individuals transfer or gift the bulk of these resources to family or charitable organizations to qualify. These transfers, however, result in waiting periods for the start of Medicaid benefits based on this for-

mula for Texas: Transferred amount divided by \$1,883, equals the number of months in waiting (i.e. donating \$18,830, will create a 10 month waiting period)

Until recently, the maximum waiting period was 30 months, but OBRA-93 has eliminated this time limit. For example a \$188,300 gift creates a 100 month waiting period!

Another change in the law has extended the eligibility look back period from two and one half years to three years. This current 36 month look back is to determine if you have made any disqualifying transfers that would trigger a waiting period.

Many states are beginning to successfully recover money from the estates of Medicaid recipients through Estate Recovery (liens placed on probated property in to pay back funds paid out in Medicaid benefits)

Texas has not been involved in this process-- but OBRA-93 requires all states to institute programs to recover nursing home and long term medical expenses from the estates of deceased recipients.

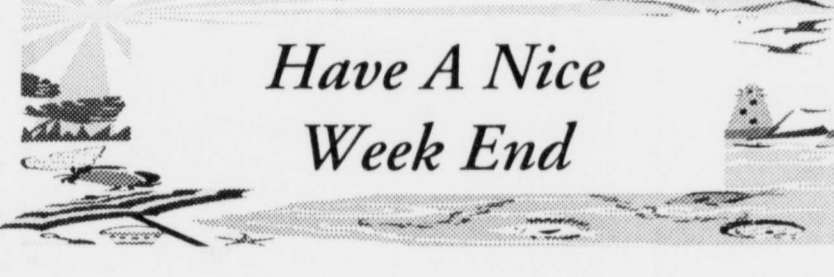
