The rodeo is produced by Bogata's own Wing Rodeo Company, owned and operated by Jerald and Joan Smith. The Wing Rodeo Company assures rodeo-goers that top quality livestock will be on hand each performance to pit their ability against top rodeo competitors from a seven state area.

Added attractions at the rodeo on Thursday night will be a Scoop Race and the Wild Cow Milking Contest. The Wild Cow Milking pits six wild cows and 18 cowboys all in the arena together, at one time, trying to get enough milk to prove to the judge that they were successful. This event

The Scoop Race will find cowboys riding in a corn scoop on the end of a 45' lariat rope, being pulled at breakneck speed by their partner on the fastest horse they can find. This event is a crowd pleaser, for sure.

The championship rodeo, which is co-sanctioned by the Cowboys Regional Rodeo Association, will feature the seven championship events, with \$400.00 per event, total \$2,800.00, being added into the prize money by the Bogata Rodeo Association, hosts of the annual rodeo.

Princess candidates, age 4 to 10 years old, will be vying for buckles, crowns and trophies. The Princess contest is being sponsored by the Bogata Rodeo Association and Guaranty Bank-Bogata. There are five



Shoplifting Can Be Deterred

item shoplifted, you must sell an additional \$200 worth of goods simply to cover the loss? This assumes your net profit is 5%--a common margin.

Shoplifting can be especially damaging to the profit margin of small businesses, but no business is safe. Primarily affected are those selling small, concealable items. For some shoplifters, merchandise size is no problem. Many have taken stereos, small appliances and even furniture in full view of store employees.

There are several ways to deter shoplifting. The surveillance mirror has become an indispensable part of the retailing scene. Its low cost makes it especially appropriate as a small business owner's first defense. Properly located throughout the store, the mirrors give visual access to aisles and blind spots. As with most anti-shoplifting devices, the mirrors serve dually as surveillance and deterrence.

A busy or sparsely staffed smaller store may find it appropriate to rely upon mechanical restraining or







I can read about this place I think would be so fascinating, but it will probably be a long time before I ever



Poundies (or Champ) Wash and peel

3 lbs of potatoes. Boil in saucepan until fully cooked THen mash. Wash and clean about 1 dozen spring onions, chop small and add to mashed potatoes. Mix onions well into the mash adding a little milk as you go along. Season with salt and pepper. Add a knob of butter to centre.

1/2 lb of plain flour add a level tsp of Bicarbonate of soda 1/4 tsp of salt Stir in a 1/4 pint of Buttermilk or sour milk and mix until the dough is soft and knead very lightly. Turn out onto a floured board and shape into a "Round" about 1/2 " thick. Quarter and bake of griddle for 4 minutes Irish Potato Bread Mix

8 ounces of mashed potatoes a tsp of salt 1 or 2 ounces of butter sufficient flour with a little milk to make a stiff dough. Roll out to 1/4 ' thick. Cut into eight pieces. Cook on griddle or hot plate, browning on both sides. Prick with a fork. Fry in Fat for an Irish breakfast.
