New business concerned a booth at the Titus County Fair, a Book Club, Fall Festival and membership drive.

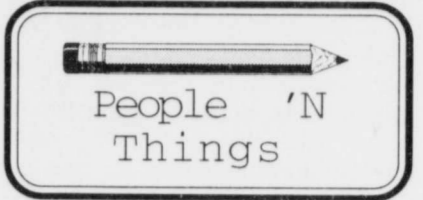
Committees for the fall festival's

Scholarship Opportunity Is Offered

According to Scott Ferguson, Region VIII ESC has received notice of an initial grant for \$182,486.00 from Texas Education Agency to begin a Graduate program for Speech Language Pathology in conjunction with Texas Women's University beginning in the Fall of 1994. The program will offer the opportunity to persons who currently hold Bachelor's degrees in Speech Language Pathology, the opportunity to obtain a Master's Degree at region VIII via compressed video.

No university closer than TWU at Denton offers this program. Com-

pressed video is a form of electronic Media which transmits both two-way audio and two way video through telephone lines allowing the instructor to present the information simultaneously to students in the on campus classroom and to students at the Region VIII location.

This will be the first Master's Degree program offered in Speech Language Pathology via compressed video in Texas.

Homemade Waffles

2 eggs
1-1/4 cups flour
6 tablespoons melted butter
Beat the above in a small bowl and add:
1-3/4 cups all purpose flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
add to this:
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 tablespoons sugar
Maple flavored syrup:
1-1/2 cups sugar
1 cup boiling water
Boil for 3-4 minutes and sprinkle in a dash of salt and 1 teaspoon maple flavoring.

Buttermilk Pound Cake

4 large eggs
1 cup crisco
2-1/4 cups flour
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups sugar
1 cup buttermilk
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon soda
Mix eggs, crisco and sugar. Dissolve soda in buttermilk. Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Mix and cook in a Bundt pan at 325 degrees for 1 hour or until straw or toothpick comes out clean. Good to eat plain or use glaze below and pour on when hot.
Glaze:
1 cup powdered sugar
3 tablespoons margarine
2 tablespoons lemon juice

Raisin Pie

1 cup of raisins cooked in small amount of water. Dissolve 1/4 teaspoon soda in 1/2 cup of buttermilk and add 3 tablespoons of butter. Then add:
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons (mixed in sugar)
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1 teaspoon vanilla
Pour into an unbaked pie shell and top with another unbaked shell and bake at 325 degrees until crust is brown.

Cream Cheese Spread

1 small package of cream cheese
1/2 cup chopped nuts
2 tablespoons ripped chopped olives
1-2 tablespoons mayonnaise
Soften cream cheese to room temperature, add nuts and olives and mayonnaise and mix well. Use as spread on rye bread or crackers.

Dry Toast

Slice strips of day old bread such as hamburger buns, hot dog buns or white bread and dip into melted butter or margarine seasoned with garlic salt and seasoning salt. Bake at 250 degrees until brown and firm. This is a favorite with everyone and can be stored for several days.

Peanut Butter Fudge

2 cups of sugar
1/2 cup of evaporated milk
1/4 cup light corn syrup
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons butter
1 cup crunchy peanut butter (or smooth)
1/2 cup finely chopped roasted peanuts (these are optional)
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
Combine milk, corn syrup and salt in a small dutch oven. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until sugar is dissolved.
Continue to cook, without stirring, just until mixture reaches softball stage (234 degrees). Remove from heat and add butter (do not stir). Cool mixture to lukewarm (110 degrees).
Add remaining ingredients and beat with a wooden spoon until fudge is thick and begins to lose it's gloss (2-3 minutes).
Pour fudge into a buttered 8-inch square pan. Mark warm fudge into 1-inch squares. Cool and cut. Yield is about 5 dozen squares.

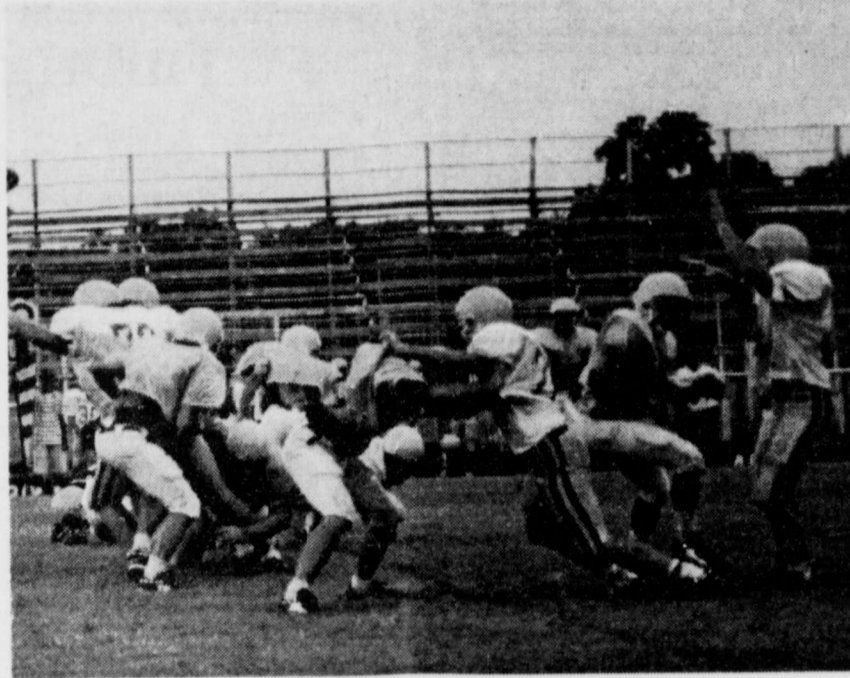

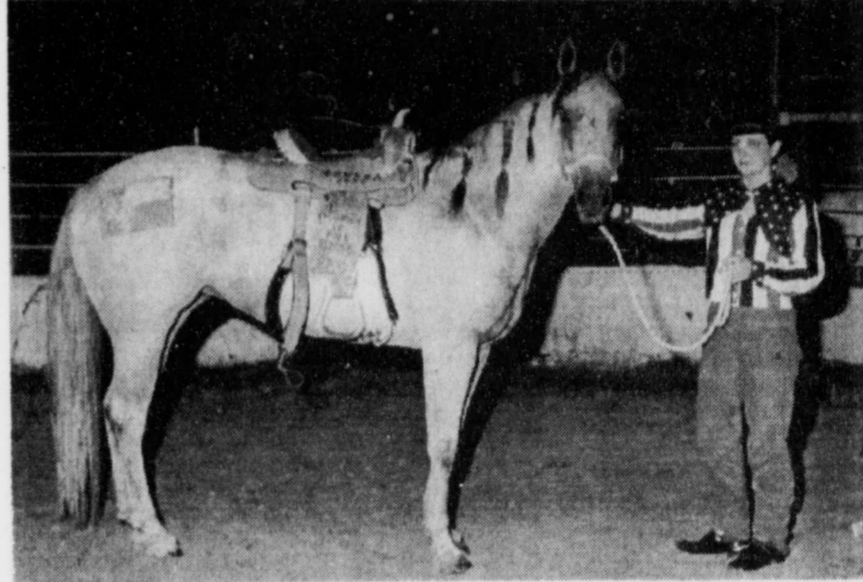

We enjoyed the cool weather, the great fellowship with our friends in Juno and of course the great coho fishing. The people of Alaska are much like the Texans of yeateryear, friendly and caring. Thank you Alaska for a great trip. Thanks to our wives for being so understanding, I think.

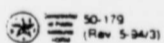

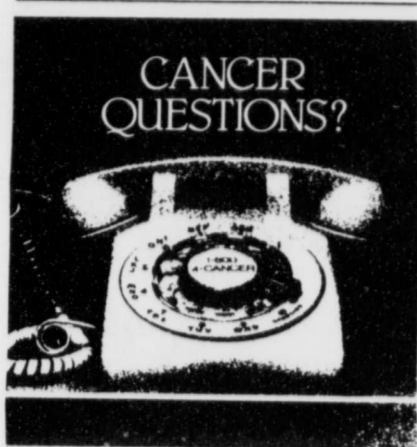

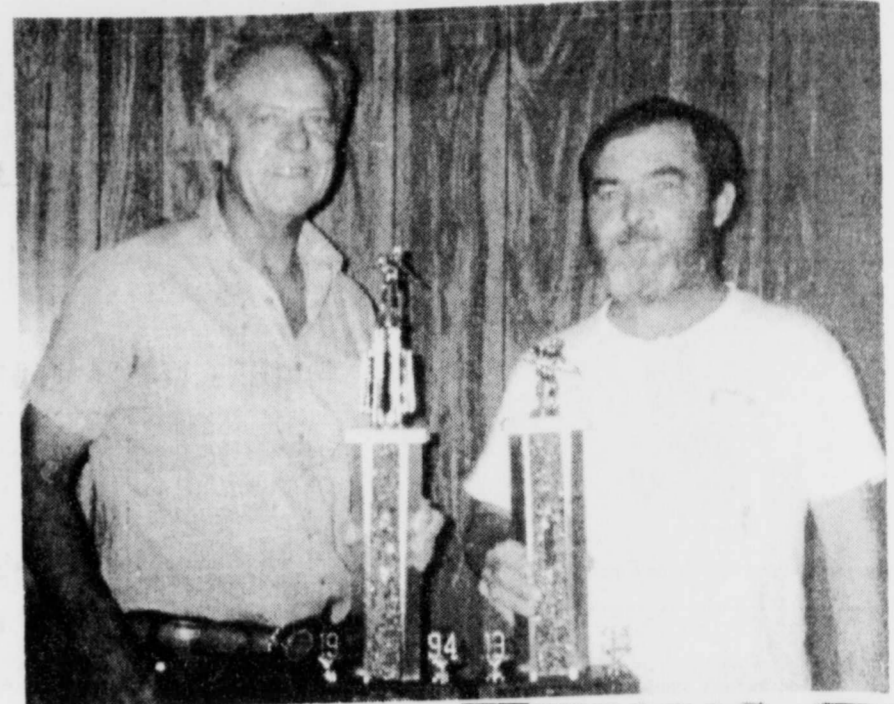
