You Can Work And Collect Benefits At The Same Time

Want to "keep on truckin" and collect Social Security benefits at the same time? You may be able to do it! If you're over 62, it's possible that you could collect partial Social Secu- \$3,600 from Social Security while rity retirement benefits while con- earning \$20,040 on your job. Your tinuing to work full-time.

Partial benefits may be payable when you're employed and eligible for retirement benefits (the earliest age is 62) or widow(ers) benefits (at age 60 or older.) If you're under age 70, you'll be subject to an annual earnings limit. If your earnings exceed the limit, part of your benefits will be withheld. In 1994, the earnings limit is \$8,040 if you're under age 65, \$1 is withheld for every \$2 you earn over that amount. If you're over 65 but not yet 70, \$1 will be withheld for every \$3 of earnings that exceed \$11,160. If you're 70 or older, you can collect full benefits no mat-

ter how much you earn. Here's an example of how this could work for you. Let's say, you are 63 and eligible to receive \$800 a month in Social Security benefits -that's \$9,600 a year. You have a job that pays you \$20,160, which is \$12,000 over the 1994 earnings limit of \$8,040. Because you earn \$12,000 over the earnings limit, we would withhold \$1 from your Social Secu-

rity benefit for every \$2 you earn over the limit. In your case, we would withhold \$6,000 of your benefits. However, you would receive total income from work and Social Security for the year would be \$23,640.

Next year, if you were still working, you could be getting even more money. The annual earnings limit rises each year. Therefore, a smaller amount of your earnings would be withheld if you exceed the limit. And, because Social Security refigures benefits each year to consider additional earnings, you could get a higher

If you're at least 62 and want to find out if you can work and collect Social Security benefits at the same time, call this toll-free number: 1-800-772-1213 (between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.) to make an appointment to talk with a Social Security representative. You can call that number at anytime to have a Request for Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement form sent to you. You'll receive your statement about four weeks after you complete the form and send it to the Social Security address on the back.

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

Q: How many CEUs do I already have's

A: CEUs are tracked by the Texas Department of Agriculture. Write TDA, Attention: "Applicator Recertification Credits," at P. O. Box 12847, Austin, TX 78711, or call 1-800-TELL-TDA (1-800-835-5832). County Extension Agents are not required to keep permanent records of your attendance at Extension recertification courses, although some agents do this as a courtesy. However, their records would not reflect credits you received in other counties or from other trainers. Only TDA has a complete record of your continuing education credits.

Q: How many CEUs must I have, and by when?

A: Private Applicators: If your certificate number is 158,532 or less, you have until December 31, 1995 to choose between two courses of action: either 1) ob-

tain 15 CEUs to maintain your certificate, or 2) retrain and retest to obtain a private applicator license (and pay license fee).

If your certificate number falls from 158,533 through 166,865, you must retrain and retest for a private applicator license by December 31, 1994 regardless of your CEU his-

If you already have a private applicator license, you must obtain 15 CEUs every 5 years (by December 31 of the year preceding your license expiration date.) These must include 2 credits in laws and regulations and 1 credit in integrated pest manage-

Commercial and Non-Commercial Applicators:

Employers can obtain their refunds with interest by filing Form 843, "Claim for Refund and Request Abatement." Alternatively, employers who file a fourth quarter Form 942, "Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees" can reduce their liability on that return by the amount of any overpaid household employment taxes. In December, the fourth quarter Form 942 package will be mailed to employers; this package will contain special instructions and a simplified version of the Form 843 for use in claiming refunds.

For the 1995 tax year, household employers are no longer required to. file Form 942. Instead, they will use their 1040 income tax returns to report SS, Medicare and FUTA taxes along with any income taxes withheld from their household employ-

Even though the new law simplifies the reporting and payment of. household FUTA tax by allowing it; to be reported on the employers 1995 Form 1040, it does not affect the wage threshold for FUTA liability. Mr. Scott warns: This new law does not directly affect any state unemployemnt tax filing requiremtns. Household employers may still besubject to quarterly filing requirements for their state tazes.'

Finally, under the new law, household employers are not required to: make household employee SS, Medicare and FUTA tax payments throughout the year until 1998. Mr. Scott encourages household employers to either increase their withholding or make estimated payments to avoid a large balance due on these taxes when they file their income tax returns. Beginning in 1998, withholding or estimated tax payments must be sufficient to cover these taxes. If not, these underpayments could be subject to estimated tax penalties.

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Fire Ants Can Be Controlled But Are Hard To Eradicate

Fire ants cannot be eradicated yet, but they can be controlled in lawns, especially if action is taken in the fall instead of waiting until next spring.

Entomologists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are now recommending a control program called the "Two-step Method" for lawns in the highly infested areas in the eastern half of Texas and the southeastern United States.

This program uses the annual or semi-annual broadcast application of one of the effective fire ant bait products like Amdro or Logic (also sold as Award, Ortho Fire Ant Bait or Hi-Yield Fire Ant Killer Containing Logic).

The second step is to use an individual fire ant mound treatment product -- a dust, drench, or granular in- have migrated into the bait treated secticide -- to treat "nuisance" or area. Very few mounds will need to slow-acting nature of bait-formulated fire ant insecticides, they are best applied in the fall to produce a fire

Amdro, when applied at a rate of 1 to 1 1/2 pounds per acre, provides its maximum control 3 to 6 weeks after application. Products containing Logic act much more slowly, since these products do not kill worker ants but prevent the production of new workers.

Ants in the mound at the time of treatment must die off naturally. Maximum effects from these "insect growth regulator" insecticides occur three to nine months later. All bait products are approved for use around the home, but none are registered for use in home gardens.

Bait-formulated products generally use processed corn grits. The active ingredients are dissolved in soybean oil which coats the grits. The product must be fresh; if the soybean oil is old or exposed to air, it becomes rancid and unattractive to foraging ants.

Baits are best applied using cranktype seeders or spreaders. Hand held or over-the-shoulder spreaders are

best for treating small areas. Apply baits in the fall to dry ground when no rain is expected for 24 to 48 hours. If possible, treat in the cool of the morning or evening. Bait products cannot be applied as mixtures with seeds or fertilizers since bait attractiveness to the ants will be lost.

If individual mound treatments are needed, wait two to seven days after broadcasting the bait before treating. "Nuisance" mounds are those around the mail box or by the gate which need to be eliminated right away.

"Escape" mounds are colonies that were not affected by the bait treatment. Ants in these mounds may have been feeding on another, more attractive source of food when the bait was applied Colonies may also cape" mounds. Because of the be treated individually once the effects of a successful bait application have been achieved.

> The "Two Step Method" is considered appropriate for most turf grass in heavily infested areas, but there are other approaches. In small areas with low fire ant mound numbers or when it's important to preserve native ant species, individual-mound treatments may be more appropriate. Also, slow-acting bait-formulated products may not be suitable for floodprone areas.

> And finally, the use of baits and individual fire ant mound treatments will not prevent mounds from migrating into or colonizing treated areas. In those areas where absolutely no ants can be tolerated, surface treatments of contact insecticide containing Dursban, diazinon or others may be necessary.

Whatever fire ant control efforts are used, take care to follow use instructions provided on the product label. None of the methods of fire ant control available today will totally eliminate ants. Plan to re-apply treatments as needed for as long as control



The effluent is discharged into an unnamed ditch; thence to the Prairie Lake; thence to an unnamed tributary of the Sulphur River; thence to the Sulphur/South Sulphur River in Segment No. 0303 of the Sulphur

In accordance with the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards, the Commission staff must determine the existing uses for the receiving water in the area of the proposed discharge. The unclassified receiving waters of the unnamed tributary have no significant aquatic life uses. The designated uses for Segment N. 0303 are contact recreation and high quality aquatic life uses. The effluent limitations in the draft permit will maintain and protect the existing instream uses. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/ or revision

The Executive Director of the Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved, will enforce existing applicable rules and regulations. It is proposed that the expiration date of the renewed permit be specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission ap-
