But, there is a disturbing tendency to write this way. Young, just-out-of-journalism-school and-ready-to-save-the-world reporters tend to deal in this specialized jargon. This comes at a time when more and more people are saying they want things written in short, concise and easily understandable form.

Since confidence in television news is way, way down, why don't we all take the chance to write clearly and honestly, without pretense and without the "bull"? I have a feeling it would be like a breath of fresh air to many readers. You'll notice I didn't say it would "impact print media devotees like a zephyr of unpolluted ozone"? Get the picture? I hope some other people do, too!

GTE extends local calling in Bogata area

GTE will extend local calling for customers in the Bogata telephone exchange area to Clarksville, Mt. Vernon, Winfield and Winnsboro beginning August 29, 1996. Under the plan, all calls from Bogata to those communities will be local calls effective that date. Customers in those communities will also be able to call Bogata without long-distance charges.

Prior to the start of Expanded Local calling (ELC), each call between these areas was billed separately as a long-distance call, and customers would see a long-distance charge per call on their monthly bills. Now these calls are equivalent to local calls.

This action is a result of balloting which took place in the Bogata telephone service area under the rules of Senate Bill 632 and the Public Utility Commission Rule 23.49 (c). Under

those guidelines, certain communities were allowed to petition for extended toll-free local calling to nearby communities. The monthly per-line charge for Expanded Toll-Free Local Calling remains at \$3.50 for residential customers and \$7.00 for business customers in the Bogata telephone exchange. This charge includes the current expanded local calling to Birthwright, Cooper, Deport, Detroit, Paris and Sulphur Springs. The charge is listed as "Expanded Local Calling" in the tax portion of the telephone bill.

Customers are not required to take any action to take advantage of the new service offering. Once extended calling is operational, it is no longer necessary for customers to dial "1" before the number when placing calls between these communities.

The implementation of Expanded Local Calling may require modification to some telecommunications services and/or equipment, such as fax machines, speed calling, PABX's, key systems, automatic dialers and other services/equipment that may restrict or automatically dial long-distance numbers.

Expanded local calling to Talco and Mt. Pleasant may be added at a later date, pending appropriate legal approval.

Customers with questions about the ELC service should call one of the following toll-free numbers: 1-800-483-4400 for residential customers or 1-800-483-5400 for business customers.

There is no charge for the meal, but donations are gratefully accepted. Everyone is invited to come out and help celebrate Labor Day.

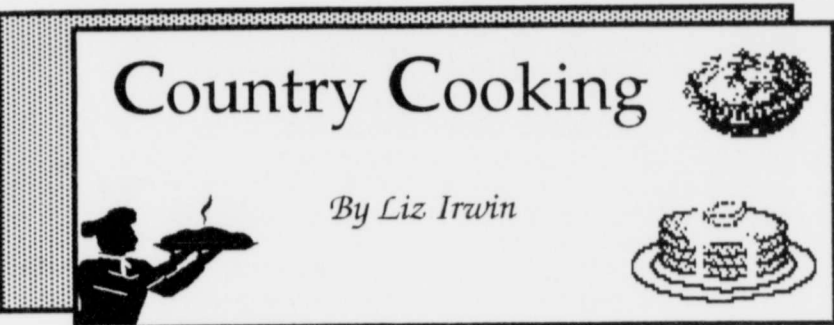

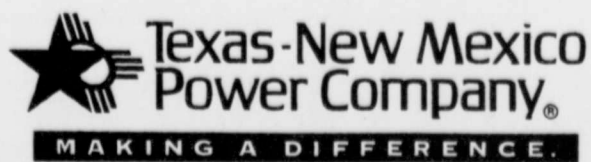

Irish Soda Bread
 4 cups sifted flour
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1-1/2 cup buttermilk
 2 eggs
 4 ounces margarine
 1/2 pound raisins
 Mix dry ingredients; add soften butter, then raisins. Beat eggs separately and add milk. Pour over the rest of the ingredients a little at a time. Dust with flour and make into a loaf pan. Cook at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

Banana Nut Bread
 3 cups flour
 2 cups sugar
 1 teaspoon soda
 1 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
 1 cup chopped nuts
 3 beaten eggs
 1-1/2 cup vegetable oil
 2 cups mashed bananas
 1-8 ounce can drained crushed pineapple
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 Combine dry ingredients; stir in nuts and set aside. Combine remaining ingredients and dry mixture, stirring just until batter is moistened. Spoon batter into 2 greased and floured 9x5x3 inch loaf pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour and 15 minutes or until done. Cool 10 minutes before removing from pan.

Plum Cake
 2 cups sugar
 2 cups flour
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/2 teaspoon soda
 3 eggs
 2 teaspoons red food coloring
 2 small jars baby food (Plum with Tapioca)
 Mix dry ingredients together in a large bowl and all other ingredients mixing thoroughly. Bake at 350 degrees in a tube pan or 2 loaf pans.

Glaze for Plum Cake
 1/2 teaspoon oleo
 2-1/2 tablespoon lemon juice
 1 teaspoon red food coloring
 1 cup powdered sugar
 Heat until sugar is dissolved and spread on warm cake.

Mother's Caramel Drops
 3-3/4 cup granulated sugar
 1 bottle milk or 1/2 cup evaporated milk and water
 1/4 teaspoon salt/1/2 cup light cream
 2 tablespoons butter
 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
 1-1/3 cups nuts
 Boil 3 cups of sugar with milk and salt for 3 minutes; then add the cream. Meanwhile melt the remaining 3/4 cup sugar in a skillet until golden brown syrup. Add gradually to milk mixture while stirring. Cook at 238 degrees or until a little soft ball forms in cold water. Remove from the heat and drop in butter, but do not stir in. Let cool to 110 degrees or lukewarm. Add vanilla, then beat with electric beater until mixture loses it's gloss. Stir in chopped nuts and spoon onto waxed paper. Makes 30 caramel drops.

Sombbrero Pie
 1/2 pound ground beef
 1/2 pound ground lean pork
 1 large sliced onion
 2-1/2 cups tomato juice
 1-10 ounce package frozen corn
 1-2 tablespoons chili powder
 1 teaspoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 commeal pastry (see below)
 In a large skillet cook and stir meat and onion until meat is brown and onions are tender. Drain off fat. Stir in remaining ingredients except pastry. Heat to boiling, reduce heat and simmer 10 minutes. Heat oven to 400 degrees. Prepare pastry. Pour meat mixture into greased baking dish 11-1/2 x 7-1/2 x 1-1/2 inches. Cover with pastry; seal to edges of baking dish. Bake 30-35 minutes.

Cornmeal Pastry
 1 cup Gold Medal flour
 1/4 cup cornmeal
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/3 plus 1 tablespoon shortening
 3 tablespoons cold water
 Measure cornmeal, flour and salt into bowl. Cut in shortening thoroughly. Sprinkle in water. 1 tablespoon at a time, mixing until all flour is moistened. Gather into a ball; roll into rectangle, 12 x 8 inches on lightly floured cloth-covered board. Fold lengthwise in half and cut slits on folded edges.

Krautwickel
 1 head cabbage
 1-1/2 pounds ground beef
 8-10 crackers
 1/2 cup chopped onions
 1 egg
 1/4 teaspoon caraway seeds
 salt and pepper to taste
 3 dashes tabasco sauce
 Loosen 8-10 leaves from cabbage and cut one wedge of cabbage. Cook in boiling water about 5 minutes. Lift out carefully and let cool. Mix remaining ingredients; cut up wedge of cabbage and add to meat mixture. Form oblong rolls and wrap in cabbage leaves. Arrange in baking dish with folded sides down. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle a few caraway seeds on top. Add about 1/4 cup water and bake at 350 degrees about 40-45 minutes. Baste once or twice during baking. Serve with baked potatoes or potato salad.

Poppy Seed Dressing
 2/3 cup vinegar
 1-1/2 cup sugar
 2 cups oil
 3 tablespoons poppy seed
 2 teaspoon dry mustard
 2 teaspoon salt
 3 tablespoon lemon juice
 Bring to a boil all ingredients, except poppy seeds. Remove from heat and add seeds. Let cool before serving. Can be served over fresh fruit.

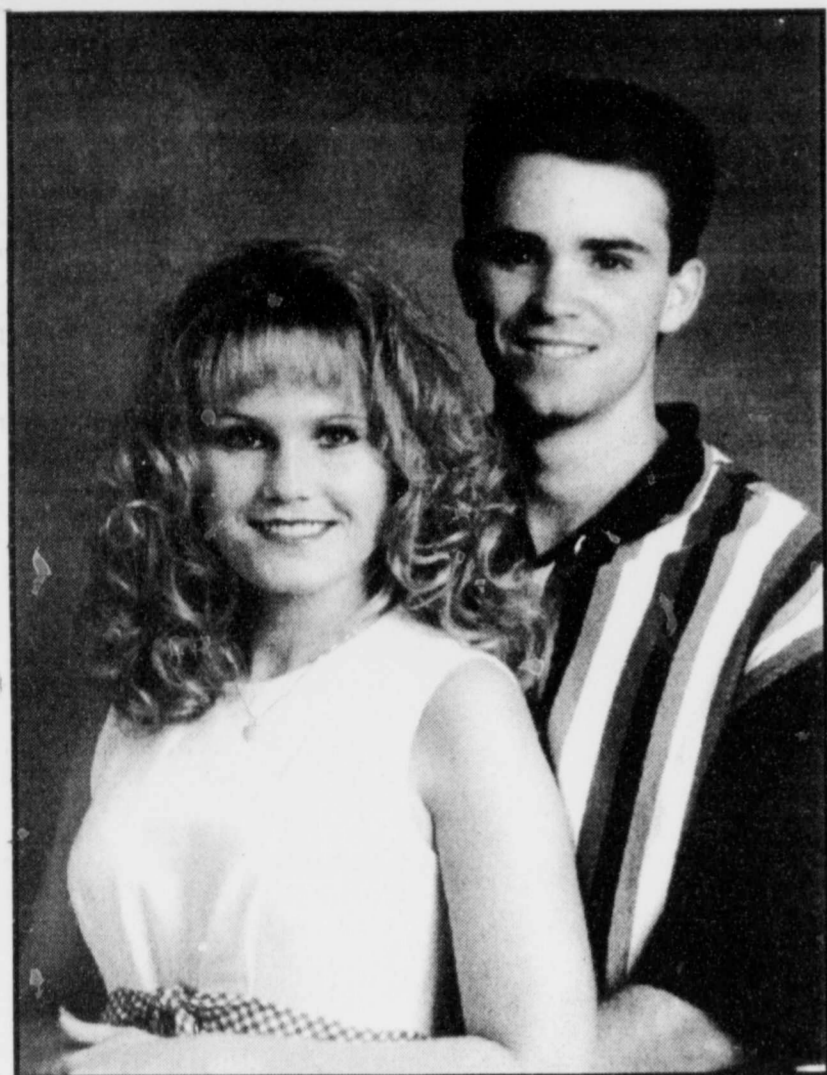

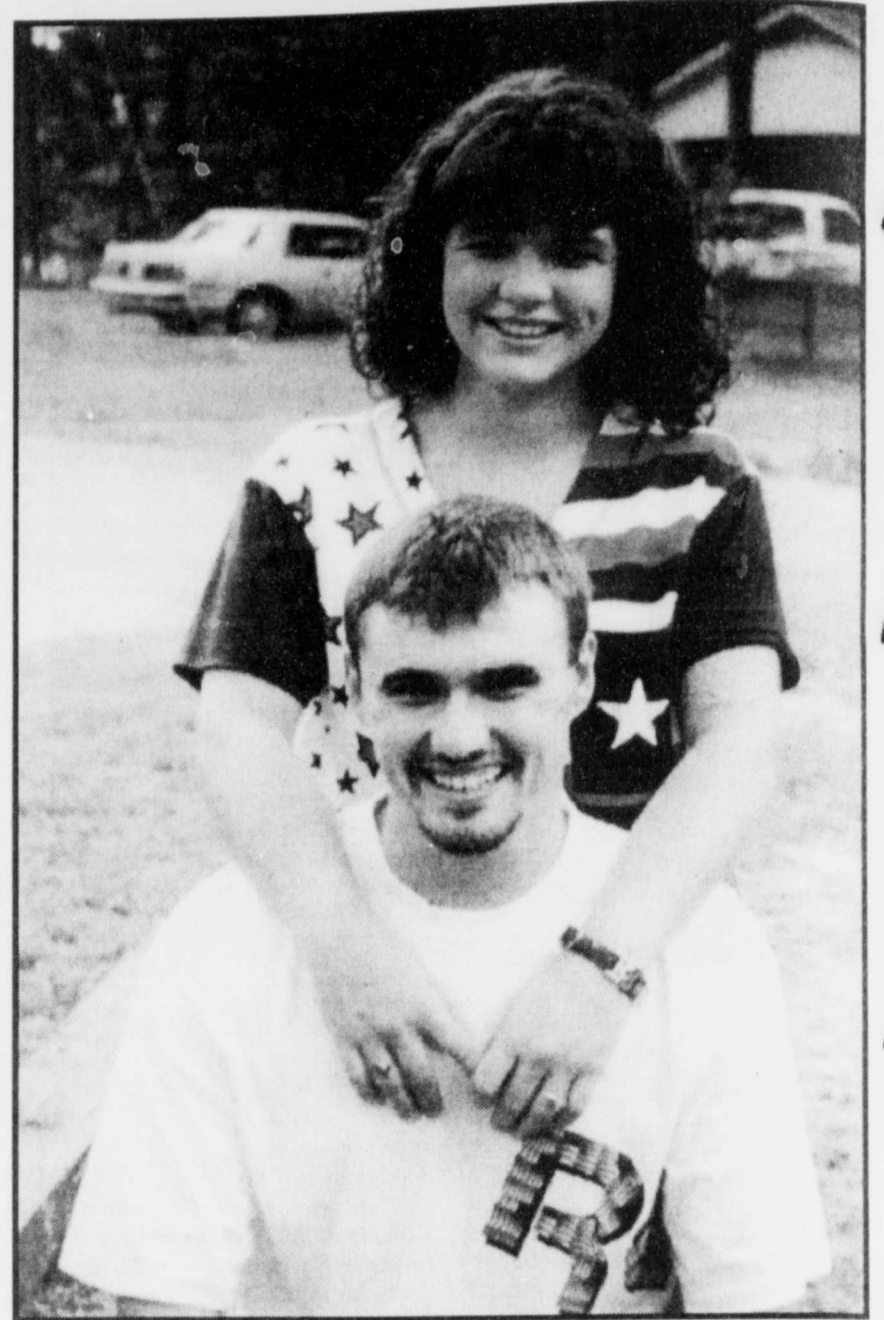

Following a wedding trip to St. Lucia in the Caribbean, the couple will live in New Orleans.

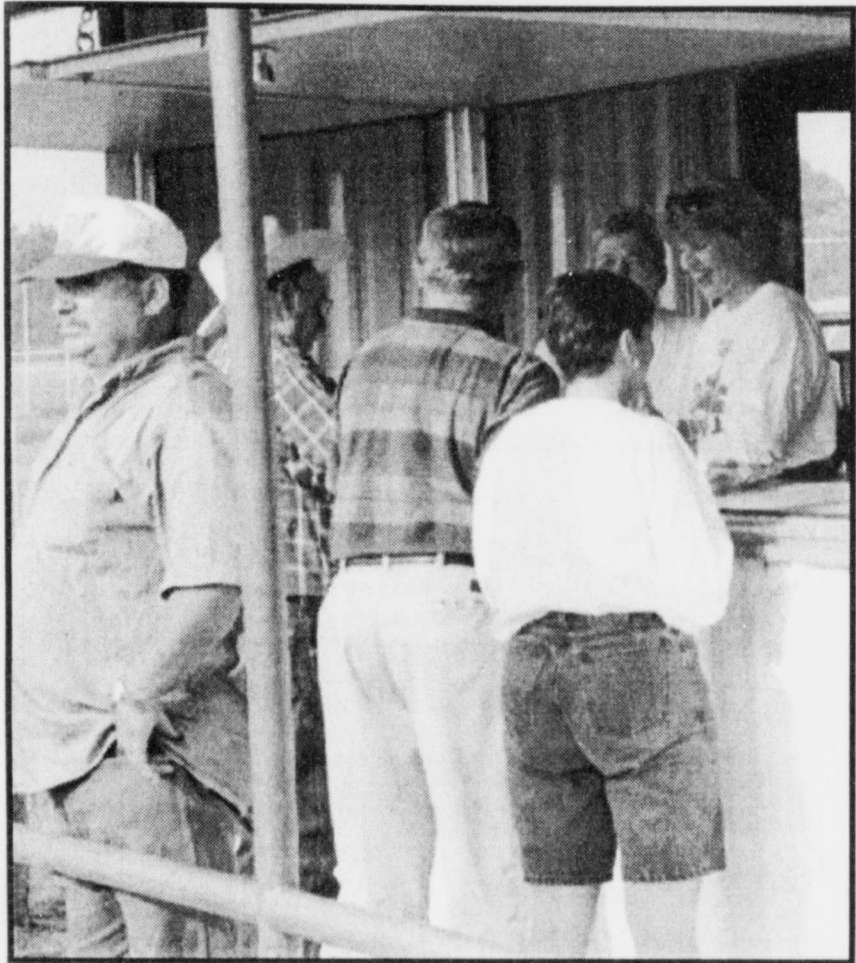

The mighty Rebel defense took pride in the fact that James Bowie recorded zero first downs.

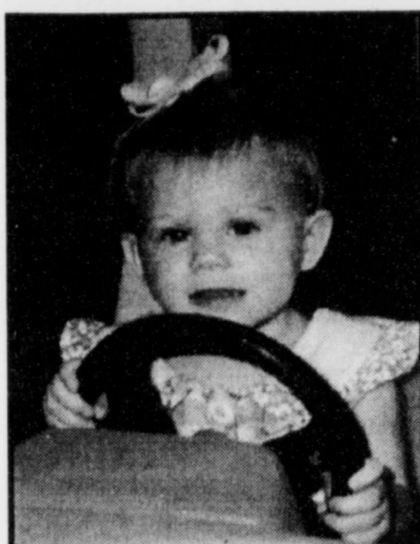

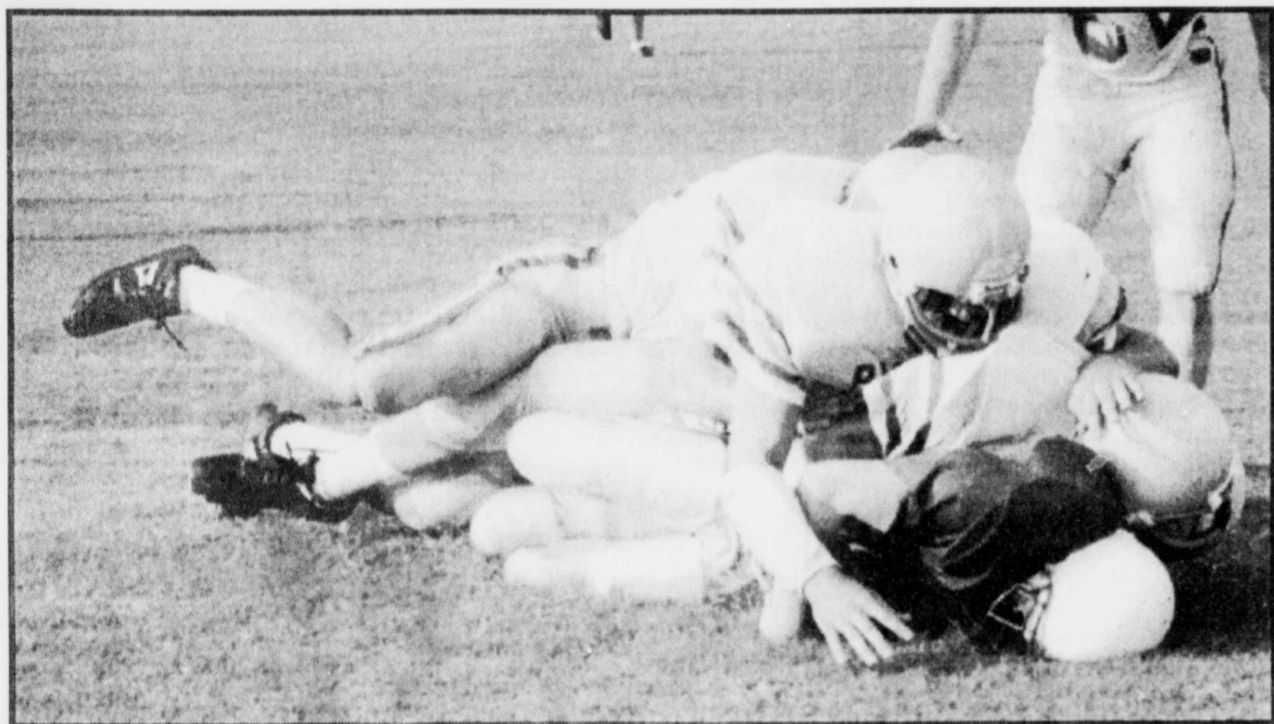
