There will be a fish fry at the Hagansport Community Center Saturday January 31. Serving will begin at 5:00 p.m.


This fund raiser is to raise more money for more work on the community center. Come and enjoy the fish and make a donation to help the community center.

Hagansport Community Center is located on Highway 37 northwest of Mount Vernon near highway 71.



### Jimmie Woodall dies January 23


Jimmie Woodall, age 69 of Deport, died Friday afternoon at McCuistion Regional Medical Cen-


