And the "NOs" had it in Titus County Commissioners Court Monday. There was No Second to a motion made by Pct. 3 Commissioner Billy Jack Thompson to purchase a new pumper truck for the Talco Volunteer Fire Department.

No second means no action will be taken to purchase the \$65,855 truck which would give the Talco Volunteers the equipment needed to effectively fight fires in the northern part of Titus County. After almost an hour of discussion with Assistant Chief "Randy" Hollis of the Talco VFD, and City of Talco Officials, no one

a vote to be taken. County Judge Crooks pointed out that Talco is 16 to 18 miles form Mt. Pleasant and that is a long distance for Mt. Pleasant Fire Department to respond to a structure fire in Talco. It would take at least 20 minutes for Mt. Pleasant Fire Department to respond.

"In other words, forget it, if there is a house fire near Talco or Sugar Hill. We don't have any Fire Protection" stated the Judge.

Commissioner Thompson noted that if a house fire occurs where the lives 18 miles form Mt. Pleasant "it's

Well, in my situation I knew Randy Carroll or whoever came from Talco would call for a helicopter since my husband is a heart patient and I did not care about who could transport, I just wanted

help and fast. I would like to tell everyone that may need help if they want Talco they should call 379-3331 just as we did before 911 was available. At least Talco will arrive and give aide while Mt. Pleasant travels to help and transport. I have full confidence in the people who donate their time to service our area in case of fire or medical emergency and I will never call 911 again unless I have time to wait on Mt. Pleasant to arrive from 16 miles away when Talco is only 6 miles up the road.

Everyone should keep emergency numbers near their phones and if they are nearer Talco than Mt. Pleasant the number again is 379-3331.

Texas Agriculture Commissioner

It seems you can't walk into a department store or simply open your mail without being hit with an offer for a shiny new credit card. Of course, that card always comes complete with a line of credit just waiting to be used. And apparently many are "charging" forward, even folks in what's considered the fiscally conservative industry of agriculture.

Examples of farmers and ranchers across the country who have racked up credit card bills in the thousands - up to \$150,000 in some cases - are becoming oo easy to find. Even those who are used to sitting down each year with their local banker to keep their operation going are now finding it too tempting to just say "charge it."

And that's why David Kohl, a proessor of agriculture and economics at Virginia Tech University, fears the next domestic financial crisis (both on and off the farm) will come from mounting consumer credit card debt. Kohl estimates there's at least \$20 billion of generally unseen bad debt - all of it wrapped in credit card plastic.

Credit cards serve a valuable purpose and provide an efficient way to pay for some big-ticket items. But as credit card offers continue to roll in, we should all remember that after you 'charge it," you still have to pay for it. And folks in agriculture know all too well that every debt eventually come



Texas has more than 800,000 ponds 🐚

By Mike Morrow County Extension Agent-Ag. Lamar County

Texas has more than 800,000 private ponds. Properly managed ponds provide excellent recreational opportunities. A good fishing pond must be managed like a vegetable garden. It must be seeded properly, limed and fertilized correctly, weeded now and then, and harvested in the correct numbers and on an appropriate timetable. The basic guidelines for good pond management include pond construction and watershed management, species selection and stocking. liming and fertilization, pond balance

management and weed control. Pond banks should slope rapidly

to a depth of 2.5 feet or more. Aquatic plants do not easily establish themselves at this depth, especially if a good algae bloom is maintained.

Several herbicides are labeled for use in ponds for aquatic weed control. Check with the Extension office for your local farm supply dealer to determine which herbicides will best target your weed problem. Always read and follow label instructions.





Radio Enters The Data Age ®


(NAPS)-Do more than just listen to your radio. A new digital technology now lets you receive data via your radio. Using the FM broadcast band, the Radio Data System (RDS) transmits digitally encoded information which appears as text to specially equipped home and car radio

An RDS radio has an enhanced display panel that gives listeners a visual readout of broadcast information-such as radio station call letters, song titles or traffic updates. Even special "smart radio" features are possible, including station searching by music format, automatic clock time updating and automatic returning to the same program when driving from town to town.

RDS delivers a 1200 bps datastream that is broadcast alongside any standard FM channel. Listeners can't hear the data because it is mixed at a high frequency within the FM station's channel. Since the data is transmitted as a radio broadcast, all an FM radio station must do is update the RDS information. RDS radios have a special decoding chip that picks up the data signal and shows it on the radio display panel.

Currently 700 FM radio stations in the U.S. transmit messages via RDS. If your favorite station does not use RDS, call the station and make a request. If the station knows there are RDS listeners (or watchers) in the area, they will want to put the signal

Preservation prof backs "conservation" use

COLLEGE STATION - "Places that grow over time and continue to develop end up looking like a family reunion, says David Woodcock, a professor of architecture at Texas A&M University.

Woodcock, who coordinates the college's graduate certificate in historic preservation, believes that is a delightful result. The variations show the history of a place, just as the people at a reunion reflect the different generations of a fam-

In general, Woodcock feels positive about what he prefers to label conservation. Although Americans have revered such national shrines as Mount Vernon or Monticello and natural landscapes in national parks, the passage of the Historic Preservation Act of 1966 brought a new direction. It created the concept of the historic district.

"That was a fairly major step for America," Woodcock believes. "It meant saving a neighborhood or a collection of buildings that are not necessarily under individual ownership or have individual merit architecturally. Although they may not have housed a special event, they are regarded as worth saving as a group or

He thinks that only a few restored places should be set aside as museums. "Buildings are meant to be used and,. where necessary, adapted to new pur-

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


