$\$ 200,000.00$ to over $\$ 600,000.00$. A mostpeople are aware, he build-

in need of extensive repair. We have in need of extensive repair. We have on these facilities increase each year, nd as some have noticed, we heen needs. Most people recognize the poor
conditions at the Bogata facilities, but at both locations we are dealing
with decayed sewer lines (many of

buildings would be energy efficient enough to cut monthly utility costs
by $2 / 3$. Our current utility bills at the Bogata and Talco campuses aver-
ages $\$ 8,734.446$ per month. This
could save as much as $\$ 69,875.00$ annually. Combining the campuses would
lead to considerable savings in the lead to considerable savings in the
future. At current enrollment rates, one section of each grade in kinder
garten through the fift grade could be eliminated. This could make per-
sonnel available to offer a more varsonnel available to offer a more var-
ied curriculum or could reduce personnel enough to save approximately
$\$ 150,000.00$ annually. Combining the campuses would also allow us to
eliminate the duplication of services and programs such as cafeteria, li-
brary, computer labs, etc. This will
