He reports that they were frequently fixed to pieces of two by four lumber to give them a very stable base when crawling around under houses.

In addition, plumbers would rub the wax from these specially made candles onto a joint of lead pipe to help it slip together easier when plumbing old fashioned metal pipes.


Elton recalls that the last time he ever used a candle was in the 1940s in Paris, Texas. He had not purchased a flashlight, which were just truly becoming common.

As he crawled around under a house over on Pine Bluff in Paris he was happily using his lighted candle. He peeled a patch from a sewer line to begin work and a pocket of sewer gas ignited!

He says that "we darned near burned the house down". He also was without eyebrows for some time!

Victory by ten votes! Bond Issue Passes by close margin

Predictions that the nine million people who were against the prodollar Talco-Bogata Independent School District bond election would be close came very true Saturday, as the measure passed by 10 votes.

Six hundred fourteen votes were cast for and six hundred and four votes against the bond issue.

It is considered a record turn out for a school election in Talco-Bogata.

There is definitely the possibility of a recount since the voting was so close. It will probably be called for with a petition of twenty-five or more

posal.

The vote was called for a \$9 million dollar bond issue to put grade school and junior high school as well as the high school at the Rivercrest Campus.

This will eliminate school campuses in Talco and Bogata.

If the recount changes nothing, there will be a 20-cent yearly tax increase per \$100 evaluation, with state funds expected to cover the remainder of the cost of the project.

Dr. Gary Vandeaver, Superintendent, said that "the first job is going to be to get with a finance company and get the bonds issued and work with the architect pursuing the preliminary planning to try to get production work going". He says that he believes people will work together for the good of the students now that the election is over.

"We have been told that from the time the election passes to the time the new buildings are completed will probably be about two years" Dr. VanDeaver.



years old and likes to ride horses, color and ride sheep. You may call 632-5347 to purchase tickets from Kaimbri.




Settling in Blossom came to mind, when they acquired their property from Martha's mother's family and have loved the area ever since.

Drain juice from cherries, 1 cup or nearly. Add cornstarch, mix well and stir until mixture is smooth. Add wine and vinegar and corn syrup and bring to a boil; stirring constantly. Mix lemon juice in slowly. You should have about 2 cups of sauce. You can use some to glaze ham for the last half hour of cooking. Add cherries.

inch of salt l large can of frozen orange juice concentrate fresh fruit of all kinds

Put tapioca in water and bring to a boil; stir constatntly. When tapioca burst into clear bubbles remove from heat, Add sugar, salt, frozen juice. Let cool and stir once after 15-20 minutes. Cover and chill. When ready to serve add fruits, cherries, grapes, peaches, orange sections, strawberries, etc. If too thick add small amount of juice.

1/2 teaspoon salt Into this mixture cut in:

1/4 cup brown sugar 1/2 cup Crisco

Cut into pieces as for pie crust. To this add 1/2 cup chopped nuts, 1 egg and 2/3 cup milk. You will have to spread the mixture with your fingers on the bottom of two 9-inch cake pans with removable bottoms. Place when cooked and cooled bottom tart with peaches (sliced and sweetened) and whipped cream. Add second tart same as first layer on top. Swirl several peach slices on very top.

Aggies study El Nino effects on lightning

COLLEGE STATION - The effects of El Nino are everywhere — it has waterlogged the west coast, pummeled Florida with tornadoes and turned winter snows into winter sunshine — but scientists have yet to determine the effects of the system on thunderstorms and lightning.

By studying lightning, Texas A&M University meteorologists hope to better predict where lightning will occur next in order to protect lives and property and help power companies anticipate power outages.

The scientists will combine radar, satellite and lightning data to get a more complete picture of storms. The lightning data will come from the National Lightning Detection Network, which is run out of Tucson.


"It's going to be interesting this year to see what El Nino is doing to lightning activity," said meteorologist Richard Orville.


Lightning is classified as either positively or negatively charged with positive-charged lightning being the more dangerous. Researchers expect to see not only more lightning associated with El Nino but also more positivelycharged lightning, Orville said. "Being able to look into a

"Being able to look into a storm system and see where the most dangerous lightning is occurring means you can tell what parts on the ground will be most threatened by the lightning activity," he said.

activity," he said. With this knowledge, power companies can deploy repair crews to areas where and when lightning is likely to cut power, he said. The companies also will be better able to predict where lightning may occur, so they can reroute power to minimize the lightning damage and power outages.



Web Tracks By Dave Seber A Column For Those Interested In Or Learning About The Internet

Last Friday, the Clinton administration released a plan to end our government's management of the Internet and hand over control to a yetto-be-formed international board consisting of fifteen members. This board is expected to be up and running by October 1, 1998 and total transfer of responsibilities no later than October 1, 2000.

A smooth changeover is expected and the average user of the Internet will hardly notice.

The biggest change will be a handful of new suffixes for Web addresses

We are familiar with .com, .net, .gov, and .org. New ones will probably be .shop, and .rec. If you want to register your own Web site address, the process will likely be easier and less costly with new companies allowed to compete for that business.

At the present, registration of many Web addresses is the responsibility of Network Solutions Inc., in Herndon, Va. They have an exclusive fiveyear contract with the National Science Foundation that expires at the end of September. Network Solutions will retain the role of keeper of the lists of Web sites using .com, .net and .org. Other companies will probably be this monopoly





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
When this drug was tried in HIVpositive adults, the amount of virus found in the body was dramatically reduced according to Dr. Mark Kline, professor of pediatrics at Baylor. Hydroxyurea, a drug that works by

inhibiting DNA production, has been used in the treatment of leukemia and solid tumors in children and adults. Currently, studies are also being conducted for treatment of sickle cell anemia. In adults hydroxyurea has shown

impressive results in lowering viral load. In some cases where treatment included the drug ddI, the amount of HIV was suppressed below the level of detectability. Two individuals had no detectable virus more than one year after discontinuing the study drugs. Kline hopes to see similar results in the pediatric study.

Hydroxyurea may be a good choice for children, because it is taken once a day, versus two or four times per day for other HIV medications. In addition, the drug has no taste and dissolves easily in juice or other beverages. It costs only pennies per dose, according to Kline.

Drugs such as protease inhibitors which are the accepted treatment today, don't taste good. Often kids spit out the medicine or refuse it entirely.

Changed behavior may help swimsuit fit better


COLLEGE STATION - On New Year's Eve, you stuck a picture of Cindy Crawford on the refrigerator and made a resolution to get into shape and into your swimsuit by summer.

Well, summer is here and that swimsuit still doesn't fit. While intentions were good, old habits kept you on the couch, not in the gym.

Every year thousands of people intend to eat less and exercise more because they know they should take better care of their health, but knowledge is not enough, says Texas A&M University psychologist Wendy Wood and Judy Ouellette, a psychologist at the State University of New York-Cortland.

"One reason is that behavior is a product of both intentions and habits. To change behavior, psychologists typically try to change people's conscious beliefs and thoughts, but for everyday lifestyle-type behaviors, such as eating and exercising, changing habits may be more important,' Wood says.

Wood and Ouellette investigated the role of habit by reviewing 64 earlier studies and then testing their findings on college students' frequency of TV watching and recycling. They defined habits as behavioral tendencies to repeat well-practiced behaviors in a stable context (situation), like driving a car, and intentions as cognitive commitments. Habits are performed automatically, with little thought.
