The main essential in a good primary department is a good teacher. But however well-trained the teacher may be, and however varied her experience she can not do her best work in a crowded room of one grade; and it is an impossibility to teach in a crowded room of two grades as every first primary teacher in the Haskell

schools is trying to do. A primary department must be efficiently equipped if the children grow and develop physically, mentally and morally as they should; but we have very meager equipment. Some of the dreams of the teachers for their rooms are: enough room and small chairs for a home like semi-circle during a socialized lesson or a story hour; a low table with books, children's magazines and educative busy work for the restless child, or the child who can finish his task before the average child can: the proper equipment for nature study lessons, etc: but most of all a reasonable number of children in a room. Are the primary children of Haskell being given a fair deal? Will the foundation they receive in this primary

department give to the grammar grades, the high school and college the right kind of student; and to the co try the right kind of citizen?
