Silverton Volunteer Fire Department hosted a Stew Supper for the Silverton Young Farmers Saturday October 18, at the City Hall.

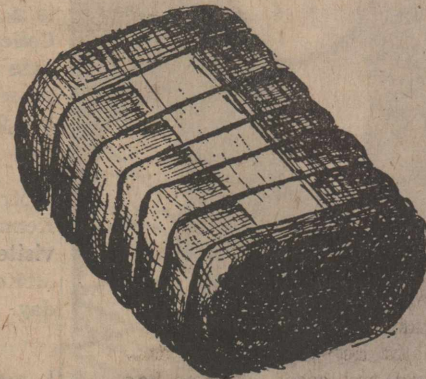

### Payne Appointed To Direct Briscoe County 1976 Spelling Bee

Mr. Charlie M. Payne, Principal of Silverton Junior High, has been named to direct the activities for the 1976 Briscoe County Spelling Bee, to be held in conjunction with the 28th annual competition, co-sponsored by the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University.

April 24, 1976, will be the date for the regional eliminations in Amarillo and the location will be the Stephen F. Austin Junior High School.

There will be 46 counties represented.

The area assigned the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University covers 29 counties in the Texas Panhandle, 10 in Oklahoma, four in New Mexico and three in Kansas.

All students in the public and parochial schools are eligible to participate. Any student who will not have reached his (or her) 16th birthday or gone beyond the eighth grade at the end of the current school term, will be eligible to enter any school contest and participate in the county eliminations.

All details of the county's Bees will be available from the director.

The Scripps-Howard Newspapers, headquartered in New York City, are the national sponsors. Last year more than 7½ million school children participated at local levels throughout the United States.

A unique opportunity is offered the elementary grade students to compete in the Amarillo Globe-News-WTSU event. Boys and girls in the sixth and lower grades may spell in the Junior Division and each county may select a champion in this category. The elementary county winners will not compete in the regional contest in April unless they should hold both titles in the respective county.

County directors have complete control over their contests and may conduct the spelldowns either verbally or orally. The Amarillo regional contest will be oral competition.

Most schools use the booklet prepared by the national sponsors, "Words of the Champions." The 1976 issue may be obtained by writing Spelling Bee Editor, Amarillo Globe-News, Box 2091, Amarillo, Texas 79166. The price of the book is 25 cents.

The champions from Briscoe County in 1975 were: SENIOR DIVISION: Carolyn Carey, a student in the Silverton Junior High; JUNIOR DIVISION: Penny Cogdell, also a student in the Silverton Schools.

An all-expense paid trip to national competition—to be held in Washington, D. C. early in June, 1976—will be awarded the regional champion when he is named next April.

SINAI AGREEMENT

The House has overwhelmingly passed a resolution authorizing the use of U. S. civilian observers in the Sinai. I voted for this measure because I believe that the use of civilian observers is a small price to pay for the chance of permanent political stability in the area. There is no military invol-

vement, and we will not be allied with either the Egyptians or the Israelis. Disagreement with Mr. Kissinger's approach is understandable, yet this is a difficult situation where he appears to have found a way to deal effectively with both sides of the conflict. The U. S. is the only country both sides would trust in the role of the observer. The U. S. has a vital interest in the preservation of peace in this area. Although the cost is high I do not think that it is as great as the cost of the various alternatives.

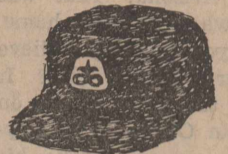

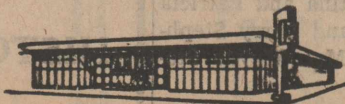
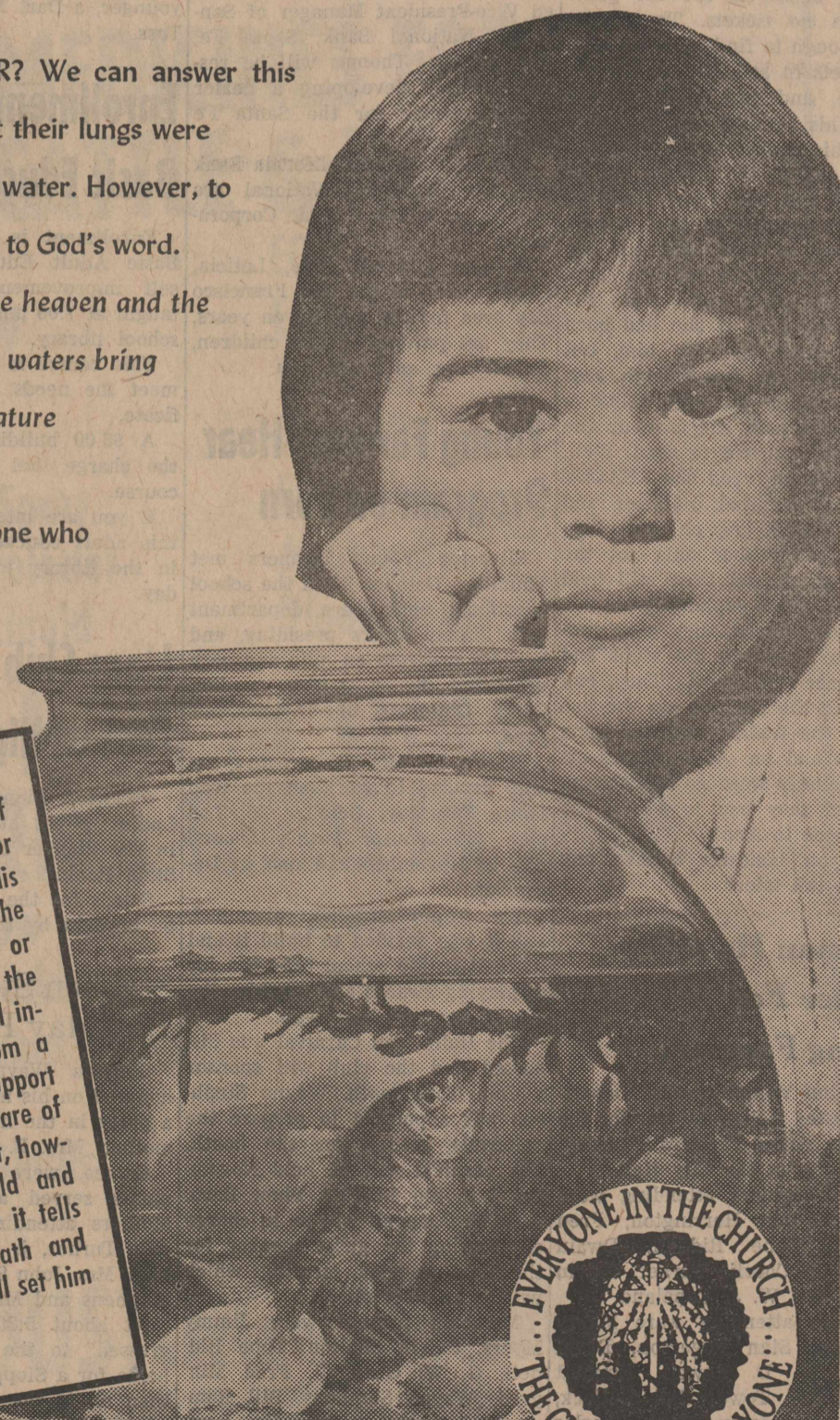

**HIGHTOWER REPORT**

**PRESIDENT'S TAX/SPENDING REDUCTION PROPOSALS**

President Ford surprised the American public and many of his closest advisers with his proposed \$23 billion tax reduction program. Although it had been an open secret for weeks that he would ask for an extension of the tax cuts enacted last spring, only a few top officials had expected the request for such a dramatic increase. I commend the President's intent. Each of us would like to keep more of our earnings rather than carry the present tax burden. However, the President gave us the recipe for only half a loaf. In this instance half a loaf could be worse than no loaf at all. The reality is that a tax cut at our present levels of spending could create economic disaster. Although the President suggested specific areas in which tax cuts could be made, he did not suggest specific

spending programs that could be reduced. It would have been politically unpopular to do so, and it is also an extremely difficult task.

The President did say the Congress and the Administration must work together to reduce spending. I agree. I will support these efforts. He also said much of the increase in each year's federal budget can be attributed to programs already on the statute books. These programs must be examined closely, and time is very short if we are to enact tax cuts to become effective next January.

I hope the President will soon offer specific suggestions concerning how the national budget can be reduced and the national debt diminished.

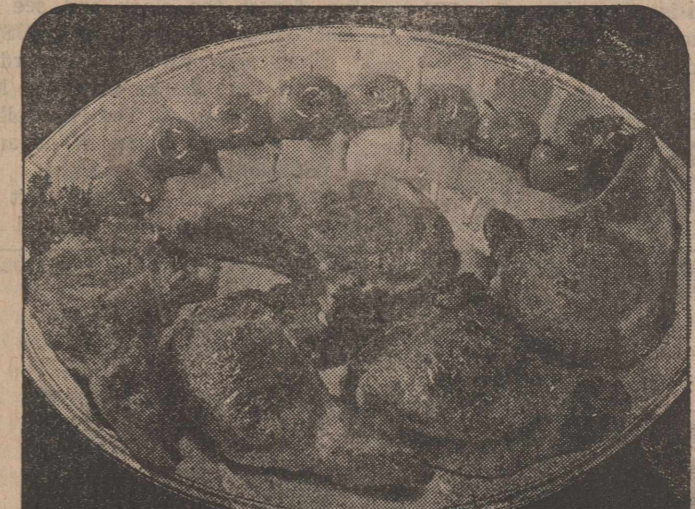
