Disabled Veterans Eligible for Property Tax Exemptions

Beginning in 1976, certain disabled veterans will be eligible for property tax exemptions in Texas. According to information furnished by Billye Kesler, Veterans Service Officer for Briscoe and Swisher counties, the tax exemptions are also to be made available to the widows of some veterans as well as the widows of persons who died while in military service. These special tax exemptions were made available through the provisions of House Bill 546, which was enacted by the 1975 Texas Legislature and signed into law by Governor Dolph Briscoe.
