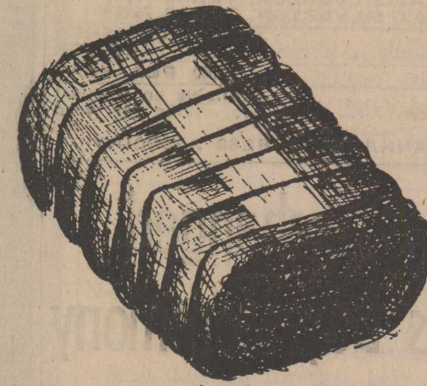
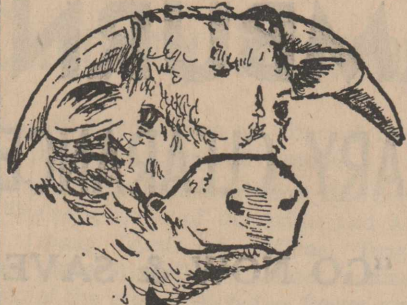
IMMUNIZATION CLINIC PLANNED HERE JANUARY 9

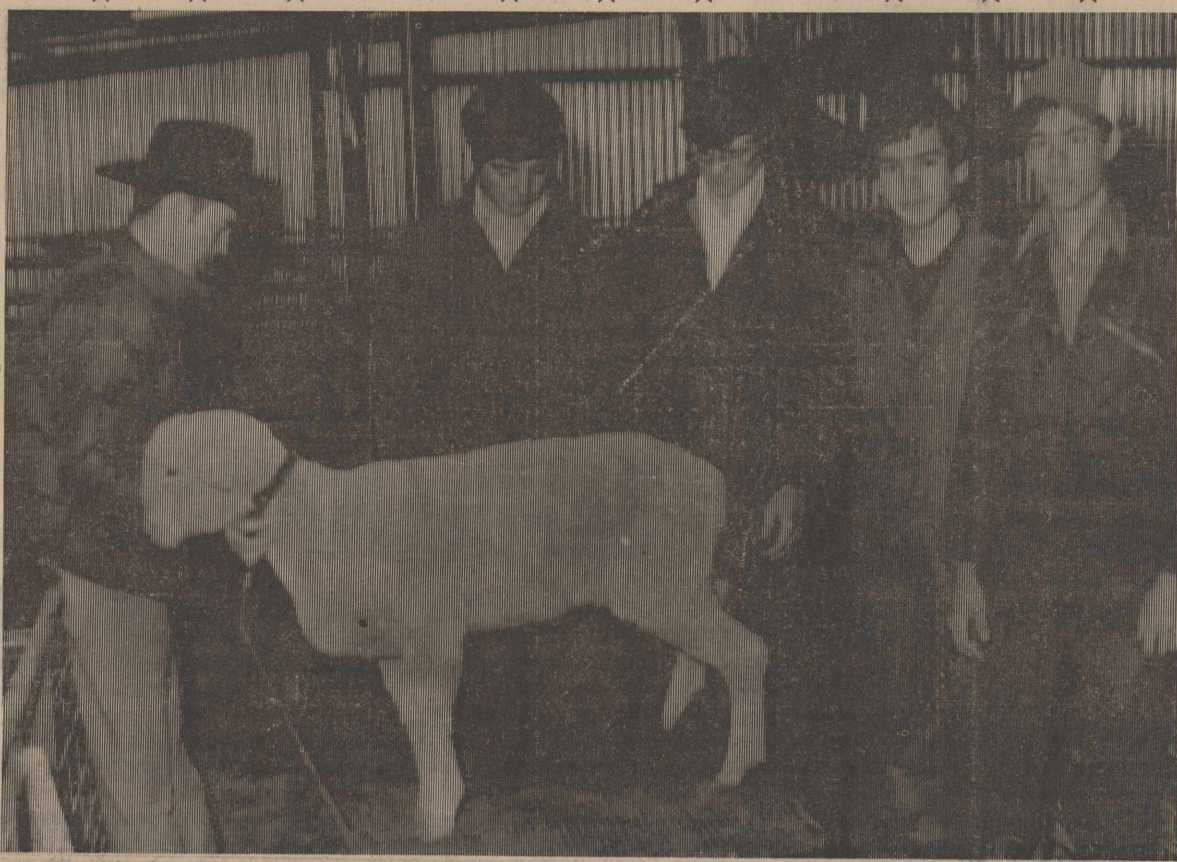

Mr. Morris explained that the public hearing was being held to comply with the application process of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, and stated that any Texas city is eligible for community development block grant funding. The maximum grant for a town the size of Silverton is \$100,000. City Secretary Jerry Patton stated that if the city could qualify for a grant under the program, the City Council would like to upgrade the city water system by building a new water storage tank, water collection mains, new booster pumps and chlorinating system. A 1,000,000 gallon storage tank is planned in conjunction with the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority.

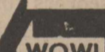

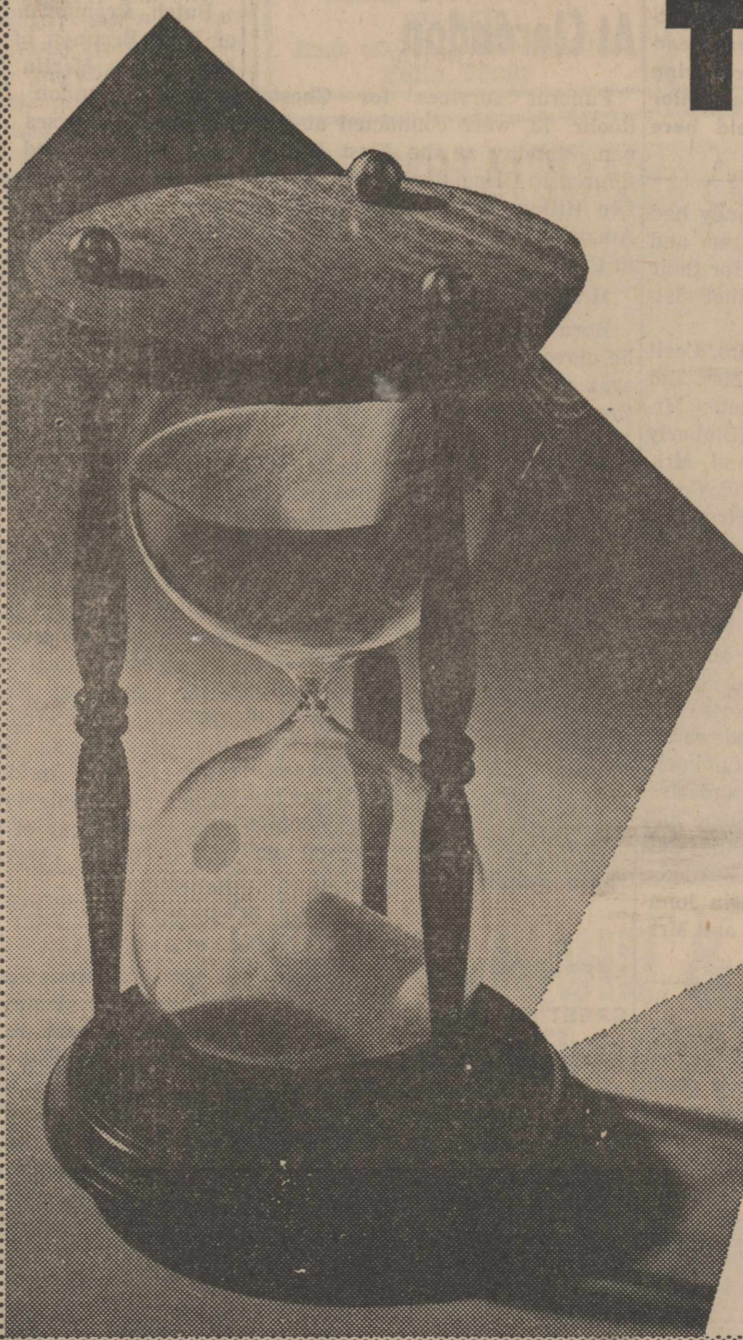

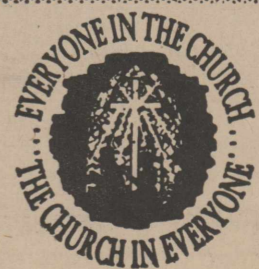
TIME...

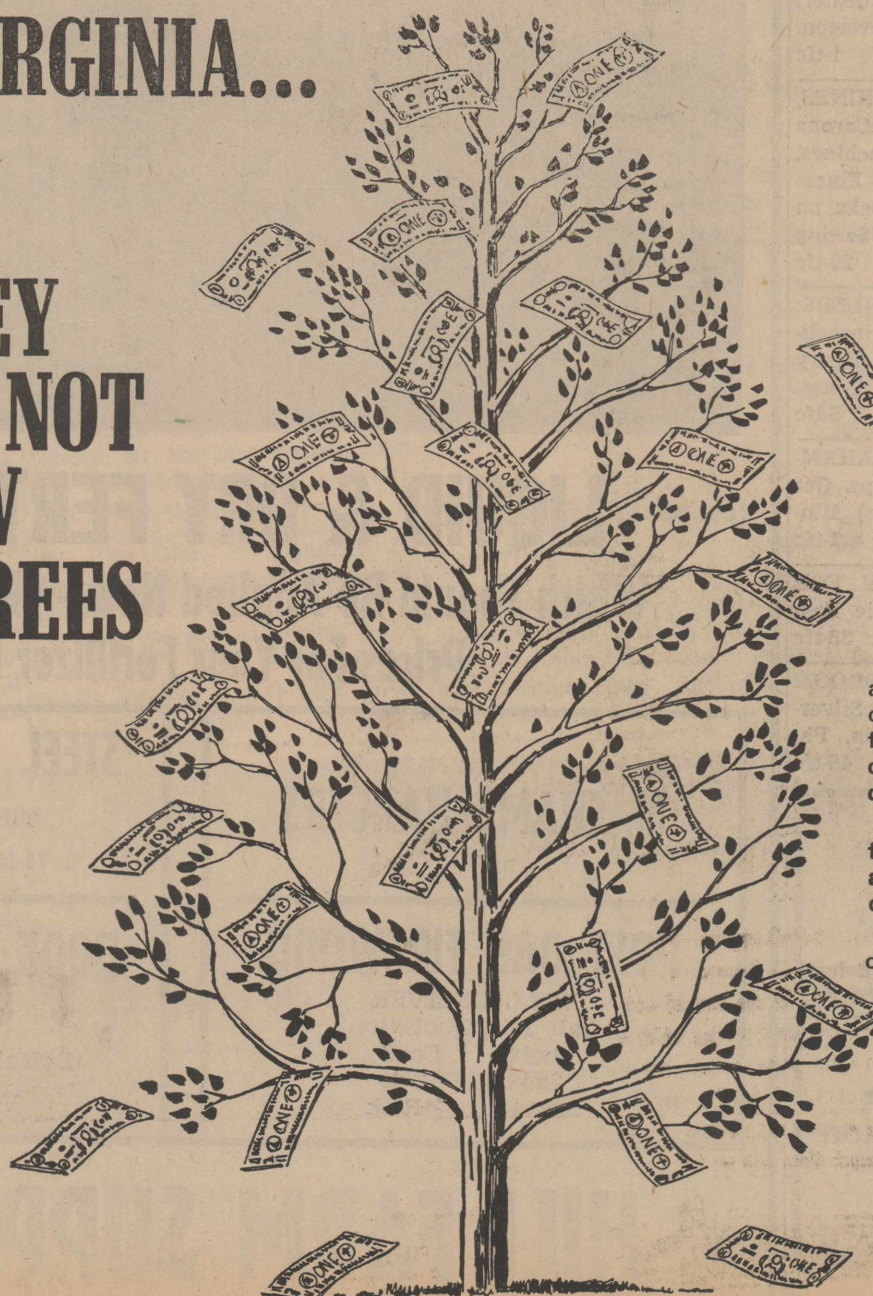

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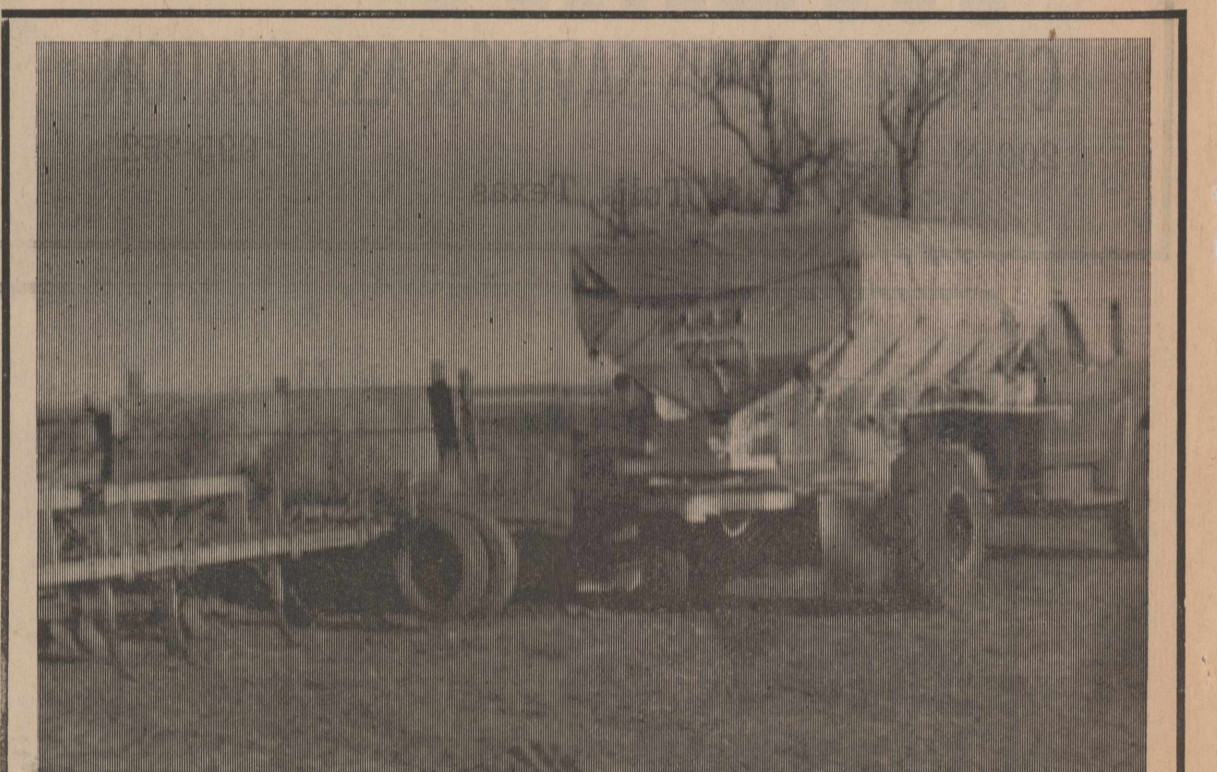
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
