TXDOT approves road construction for Titus County

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has approved plans for two projects to improve traffic flow through downtown Mt. Pleasant and resurface a section of U.S. 271 north of town.

A new traffic control system will connect all the signal lights along Business 271 (Madison and Jefferson Streets downtown). A computerized system will be used to monitor traffic flow and make adjustments to the signals as needed to help keep traffic moving smoothly with only a minimum number of stops.

ling, so that the students might benefit from it. Mr. Easterling got

on the internet and found that it is a Radiosonde. A Radiosonde is

a weather measurement instrument that measures upper air pro-

files of pressure, temperature and humidity, when launched into

the upper atmosphere on a weather balloon. It had ascended to the

upper atmosphere for about 1 1/2 hours to an altitude of 20 to 30

km. During its ascent the radiosonde transmitted data on weather

conditions to the ground station, until the decreasing atmospheric

pressure made the weather balloon larger and larger and it burst.

After this the radiosonde and the balloon naturally fell down. He

learned that a Vaisala radiosonde does not contain environmen-

tally hazardous materials that would require special treatment.

The Vaisala radiosonde was made in Vaisala, Helsinki and if it had

been launched from Helsinki, it could have been sent back for a

refund, but it was decided that this particular gizmo was probably

"This is all part of the department's efforts to create 'smart' highways", said Carlos Ibarra, traffic engineer for TxDOT in Atlanta. "It is what we call a closed-loop system and will also allow us to monitor traffic flow from the district headquarters in At-

Striping Technology, Inc. of Tyler was awarded the contract for the project with a low bid of \$266,863. Work on the system should begin

this spring and be completed by September of this year.

A second project will put a new riding surface on U.S. 271 between Interstate 30 and Business 271 north of Mt. Pleasant. About 3.5 miles of the highway will be resurfaced this summer, according to Roger Ledbetter, area engineer for TxDOT in Mt. Pleasant. Buster Paving Co., Inc. of Sulphur Springs was awarded the contract for the resurfacing with a low bid of \$715, 608.

Listen for weather warnings



A good tornado safety rule of thumb is simple, go low, get low. That means go to the lowest level of the structure you are in, crpouch in a low polsition, cover and protect your head.

This applies whether people are indoors or outdoors.

In shopping centers, go to the interior rooms and halls on the lowest floor, not to your parked
