When the James Wo dramily ofBoga morning they had something strange looking hanging on their weather whes. After investigation, it seemed to be some kind of weather balloon, but trying to find out a strange looking one, so they began they finally took it to Bogata School to Science teach, Don Easterling, so that the students might benefit from it. Mr. Easterling got on the internet and found that it is a Radiosonde. A Radiosonde is a weather measurement instrument that measures upper air profiles of pressure, temperature and humidity, when launched into
the upper atmosphere on a weather balloon. It had ascended to the upper atmosphere for about $11 / 2$ hours to an altitude of 20 to 30 $\mathbf{k m}$. During its ascent the radiosonde transmitted data on weather conditions to the ground station, until the decreasing atmospheric pressure made the weather balloon larger and larger and the radiosonde and the balloon naturally fell down. He After this the tally hazardous materials that would require special treatment. The Vaisala radiosonde was made in Vaisala, Helsinki and if it had been launched from Helsinki, it could have been sent back for a refund, but it was decided that this particular gizmo was probably launched in Oklahoma. TXDOT approves road construction for Titus County
The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has approved
plans for two projects to improve traffic flow through downtown Mt. Pleasant and resurface a section of U.S. 271 north of town.

A new traffic control system will connect all the signal lights along
Business 271 (Madisonand Jefferson Business 27 (Madison and Jefferson
Streets downtown). A cnmputerized system will be used to munitor traffic flow and make adjustments to the signals as needed to help keep traffic
moving smoothly with only a mini-
mum number of stops.
"This is all part of the departments. efforts to create 'smart' highways"
said Carlos Ibarra, traffic engineer for TxDOT in Atlanta. "It is what we call a closed-loop system and will also allow us to monitor traffic flow from the district headquarters in Atlanta."
