KOHLER'S DISEASE


The tarsal navicular is a bone

located in the foot's midarch. Kohler's disease, which mainly afflicts children between the ages of three and eight, is a degeneration of this bone caused by diminished blood supply that is the result of rapid bone growth. This disease is seldom seen in children ten years of age or older. The main symptom of Kohler's disease is pain above and slightly to the rear of the midarch, though there may also be some redness and swelling in the painful area. 



A good tornado safety rule of thumb is simple, go low, get low. That means go to the lowest level of the structure you are in, crpouch in a low polsition, cover and protect your head.

Tornadoes can occur any time of the year in Texas, but the majority occur during spring and summer. This is why it is a good idea to keep a watchful eye on the sky and pay close attention to tornado watches and warnings. It is also important to know the difference e between a tornado watch and a tornado warning. A tornado watch means 'watch" the sky. Weather conditions are right for tornadoes to form. A tornado warning means a tornado has been sited or picked up on radar.
