Time passed on. We visited some more.


At 1:00 p.m. we began to worry...could something have happened to them?

#### Sugar Hill community plannning for center/fire station

Residents of the Sugar Hill community are busy making big plans. The group have decided to erect a nice 30' x 100' metal Community Center Activities Building on the Sugar Hill School property that was recently deeded to the community by Mt. Pleasant School District.

Plans include utilizing part of the existing building by covering and completing it into a fire station to be located at the east end of the gym.
