

GRAND JURY HAS GRAVE OPENED. CORPSE IS MISSING

The Stonewall county grand jury which was in session last week at Aspermont ordered the grave of one Bert J. Cochran opened, as there was some doubt as to Mr. Cochran being dead. He was supposed to have died about March 10th, 1919, and his wife is said to have collected several thousand dollars in insurance money and the W. O. W. Lodge had also erected a monument over the grave.

When the grave was opened there was no corpse to be found, even to the casket was missing. It is reported here that an arrest has been made in connection with the affair. A number of Aspermont citizens are willing to make affadavit that a coffin was lowered into the grave at the time of the funeral-but the casket was not allowed to be opened at the cemetery.

It is said that Cochran was wanted in New Mexico for murder and was to have appeared for trial just a few days before his supposed demise.



Uncle Abe Clawhammer on the Educ tional Amendment

"Well, nut," said Uncle Abe Clawhammer of Pignut Gulley, "since some of you fellers are warrying about some king restricting the liberties of the natives of Africky, I would like to knor what you fellers are going to do about the liberties of people three inches over the corporate limits of some mossback city? When did you get the idea in your head that some feller cleaning out a livery stable was entitled to better educational advantages than the lad who breathes the free air of the rural district? When did you get the idea in your head that some bootlegger was safer to make the rate of taxation than the feller what raised the corn?

"Now if I understand the proposition correctly, the country people merely want a constitution without class distinction, a constitution that will give them all the advantages they would have if they had a mayor, a flock of policemen and a hoodlum wagon. Be cause they can behave themselves without having a cop tell them where to head in every minute, is no reason they haven't got sense enough to give their children a decent education, especially when they are going to pay the freight themselves.

'Some of you smart alecs write columns and columns about back to the farm when about all you do after you got there would be to gather up the aigs. You fix everything and do everything possible to make the farmer live in town, and then cuss him fer ing it. Since coming to think I believe the best thing that could happen to the United States would be to make the country schools so good that all the city people would send their children to the country. I have heard of boys being sent from the country to town to school and come back about as bad a misfit as you "Then there are the girls. The way you have it fixed at the present time, if a girl living in the country wants better than a common school education, often too bloomin' common, she has to hike it to some town. If there is anything more deplorable than taking a young girl away from her mother and home influence and stick her off in some boarding house just because the state constitution would not let her dad pay enough taxes to build a school, I don't know what it is. "Texas was shown by the last census to be the greatest agricultural state in the union, that is, a greater per cent of the people lived in the country than in any other state. This belig the case, Texas has more interest in seeing that the country districts have the proper educational advantages. No one would think of having a constitution which would give the city people the right to have self-starters while the country people must confine them-seives to a backfiring rattletrap what has to be cranked up. 

> Years ago when the state constitution of Texas was adopted, the people of the state were afraid of the recurrence of the conditions of carpetbag rule. For this reason the constitution was hedged about with many provisions and limitations, the necessity for which long since passed away. In the matter of the maintenance of schools there was an example of this limitation on the taxing power of the people themselves. The cities and incorporated towns were long since relieved of this inhibition on their taxing power for schools, and given local self-government and the right to make adequate provision to maintain their schools by taxation.

> In the rural districts, however, the people are still not allowed to vote adequate taxes to maintain their schools, no matter how much they may desire to do so. The constitution amendment which is to be voted on will give the country people the same privilege of maintaining good schools as the cities and towns now enjoy. It is the most needed reform in the way of school legislation that has been submitted to the people of the state. Vote for it and work for it.


