**Notice of Election**

(Order of election duly passed and authorized by the City Council of the city of Haskell, Haskell County, Texas, a municipal corporation, to determine whether or not a majority of the qualified voters, resident property tax-payers residing within the corporate limits of said City, shall vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 11, Title 22, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas 1911 providing that cities incorporated under the laws of Texas shall have power to make street improvements by the construction or reconstruction of sidewalks, curbs, gutters, etc.)

Under and by authority of a resolution, duly passed and entered on record by the City Council of the city of Haskell, a municipal corporation duly incorporated under the laws of the State of Texas, said resolution being recorded on Page 358, volume 1 of the minutes of said City Council, dated September 16 A. D. 1920, special election is hereby ordered called and to be held on the 23 day of October, A. D. 1920, in the city of Haskell, Haskell County, Texas, to determine whether or not a majority of the qualified voters, resident property tax-payers, residing within the corporate limits of said city, shall be in favor of the city of Haskell, as a municipal corporation, complying with the provisions of Chapter 11, Title 22, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas of 1911, authorizing and empowering such cities as comply with the provisions of said law, through its City Council or other governing body, by ordinance duly passed and entered of record to improve any street, avenue, alley, highway, public place or square or any portion thereof, within their limits, by filling, grading, raising, paving or repaving the same in a permanent manner, or by the construction or reconstruction of sidewalks, curbs and gutters or by widening, narrowing or straightening the same, and to construct necessary appendances thereto, including sewers and drains.

When authorized by such election the City Council or other governing body of the city of Haskell, shall have power by ordinance, duly passed and entered of record, to assess the whole cost of constructing sidewalks or curbs, and not to exceed three-fourths of the cost of any other improvements, against the owners of property abutting on such improvement and against their abutting property, benefited thereby, and to provide for the time and terms of payment of such assessments and the rate of interest payable upon deferred payments thereon, which rate of interest shall not exceed eight per cent per annum and to fix a lien upon the property and declare such assessments to be a personal liability of the owners of such abutting property; and such governing body shall have power to cause to be issued in the name of the city, assignable certificates, declaring the liability of such owners and their property for the payment of such assessments, and to fix the terms and conditions of such certificate.

The ordinance making such assessments shall provide for the collection thereof, with reasonable costs and attorneys fees, if incurred. Such assess-

ments shall be secured by and constitute a lien on said property, which shall be the first enforceable claim against the property against which it is assessed except State, county and municipal taxes.

Said election shall be held at the courthouse of Haskell County in the City of Haskell, Texas, and S. A. Hughes is hereby appointed manager of said election.

Said election to be held in compliance with law, with reference to city elections in such cases made and provided by law and shall only be participated in by the qualified voters, who are resident property tax payers, residing within the corporate limits of the city of Haskell, Haskell County, Texas.

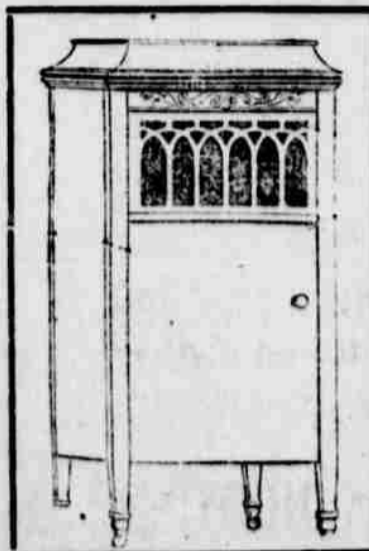

### Uncle Abe Clawhammer on the Educational Amendment

"Well, nut," said Uncle Abe Clawhammer of Pignut Gulley, "since some of you fellers are warring about some king restricting the liberties of the natives of Africky, I would like to know what you fellers are going to do about the liberties of people three inches over the corporate limits of some mossback city? When did you get the idea in your head that some feller cleaning out a livery stable was entitled to better educational advantages than the lad who breathes the free air of the rural district? When did you get the idea in your head that some boot-legger was safer to make the rate of taxation than the feller what raised the corn?"

"Now if I understand the proposition correctly, the country people merely want a constitution without class distinction, a constitution that will give them all the advantages they would have if they had a mayor, a flock of policemen and a hoodlum wagon. Because they can behave themselves without having a cop tell them where to head in every minute, is no reason they haven't got sense enough to give their children a decent education, especially when they are going to pay the freight themselves."

"Some of you smart alecs write columns and columns about back to the farm when about all you do after you got there would be to gather up the aigs. You fix everything and do everything possible to make the farmer live in town, and then cuss him fer doing it. Since coming to think about it, I believe the best thing that could happen to the United States would be to make the country schools so good that all the city people would send their children to the country. I have heard of boys being sent from the country to town to school and come back about as bad a misfit as you are."

"Then there are the girls. The way you have it fixed at the present time, if a girl living in the country wants better than a common school education, often too bloomin' common, she has to hike it to some town. If there is anything more deplorable than taking a young girl away from her mother and home influence and stick her off in some boarding house just because the state constitution would not let her dad pay enough taxes to build a school, I don't know what it is."

"Texas was shown by the last census to be the greatest agricultural state in the union, that is, a greater per cent of the people lived in the country than in any other state. This being the case, Texas has more interest in seeing that the country districts have the proper educational advantages. No one would think of having a constitution which would give the city people the right to have self-starters while the country people must confine themselves to a backfiring rattletrap what has to be cranked up. That, however, is the way you have your school matters."—Beaumont Enterprise.

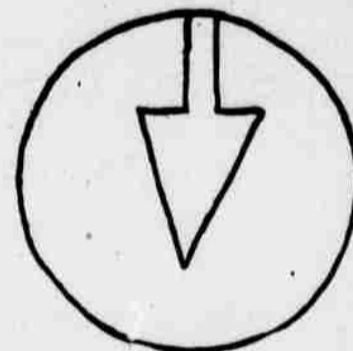
**Died**

# J. F. Kimball, Supt. Dallas Schools, Says:

Years ago when the state constitution of Texas was adopted, the people of the state were afraid of the recurrence of the conditions of carpetbag rule. For this reason the constitution was hedged about with many provisions and limitations, the necessity for which long since passed away. In the matter of the maintenance of schools there was an example of this limitation on the taxing power of the people themselves. The cities and incorporated towns were long since relieved of this inhibition on their taxing power for schools, and given local self-government and the right to make adequate provision to maintain their schools by taxation.

In the rural districts, however, the people are still not allowed to vote adequate taxes to maintain their schools, no matter how much they may desire to do so. The constitution amendment which is to be voted on will give the country people the same privilege of maintaining good schools as the cities and towns now enjoy. It is the most needed reform in the way of school legislation that has been submitted to the people of the state. Vote for it and work for it.
