



Common schemes con artist use to swindle money:


- * Convincing consumers that the dire predictions regarding loss of financial security due to Year 2000 problems are true.

Tips and warning signs to guard against fraud

- * NEVER give out account information or credit card numbers to someone unless you're certain they are trustworthy. Thieves can appear very sincere and friendly. And they can be very persuasive. All they need is your account number to empty all the money out of your
- * Don't enter into a deal if you're being pressured to act immedi-
- * Be wary of people posing as bank officials, police officers, or other government agents who ask you to assist them in an investigation or audit of your financial institution. You may be asked to withdraw cash or give out your account information. No legitimate official would ask a consumer to participate in this type of investigation.

If there was a lull long enough between firegights, we would put away the morphine and plasma and break out the aspirin. We would put up the Sickbay tent and hold firestclass Sick Call.

Johnson would always be at or near the head of the line. The corpsmen joked about it, but we always

listened with a straight face when he told us of his ailments, and we took good care of him. He could have picked up any one of us and thrown us over the tent.

I was the corpsman handling the ear, nose and throat complaints the morning Johnson came in with a stuffy nose. I had him lie down on a table with his head tilted back while I put drops in his nose. I told him to keep his head back and to say "Cluck, Cluck, Cluck" to help the drops do their work and to keep it up until I told him to stop.

Just I was moving on to the next Marine, three mortar shells came whistling over. I ran out of the tent and headed for the hole. Those gooks could shoot a mortar with the best.

I hit the hole and before I could straighten up, Johnson was beside me with his head tilted back and going "Cluck, cluck, cluck"!!!


