

Everybody has... **RIGHT!** You either have to break it with a hammer or eat it with a spoon! Well, I have come across some recipes that will change all of this. Except. . . DO NOT MAKE CANDY WHEN IT IS **RAINING! WATER IS THE ENEMY OF ALL HOMEMADE CANDIES!**

Anyone who has ever attempted candy-making when the humidity is high, knows this! So lets take a trip down Candy Lane with these few handy tips!

1) Don't be afraid to add character to your candy! Instead of the old stand-by chocolate, use butterscotch, vanilla or a variety of the chocolate flavors. There are many!

2) Line pans with foil or waxed paper, butter or spray with butterflavored cooking spray. This will make it easier to remove from the

pan and you are able to cut nice, uniform squares for gift giving or just plain old eating!

3) Gather all of your needed ingredients and tools before you start to cook your candy! This is a must, because it is very hard to chops and dice when your candy is boiling and it calls for you to stir constantly.

4) Use a wooden spoon! Plastic melts and metal conducts heat and seems to burn your hand! Burns are not good!

Services were conducted Friday, November 26 at 1 p.m. at Morgan's Funeral Home in Princeton with Rev. Franklin Skaggs officiating.



I wish you could see the sadness of a business man as his livelihood goes up in flames, or that family returning home, only to find their house and belongings damaged or lost for good.

I wish you could know what it is like to search a burning bedroom for trapped children, flames rolling above your head, your palms and knees burning as you crawl, the floor sagging under your weight a the kitchen below you burns.

I wish you could comprehend a wife's horror at 3 a.m. as I check her husband of 40 years for a pulse and find none. I start CPR anyway, hoping to bring him back, knowing intuitively it is too late. But wanting his wife and family to know everything possible was done to try and save his life

I wish you knew the unique smell of burning insulation, the taste of soot-filled mucus, the feeling of intense heat through your bunker gear, the sound of flames crackling, the eeriness of being able to see absolutely nothing in dense smoke...sensations that I've become too familiar with.

I wish you could understand how it feels to go to work in the morning after having spent most of the night hot and soaking wet at a structure fire.

I wish you could read my mind as I respond to a fire, "Is this a false alarm or a working fire? How is the building constructed? What hazards await me? Is anyone trapped?" Or to an EMS call, "What is wrong with the patient? Is it minor or life threatening? Is the caller really distress or is he waiting for us with a 2x4 or a gun?"

I wish you could be in the emergency room as a doctor pronounces dead the beautiful five-year old girl that I have been trying to save during the past 25 minutes. Who will never go on her first date, or say the words, "I love you Mommy!" again.

I wish you could know the frustration I feel in the cab of the engine or my personal vehicle, pressing hard on the pedal, pushing again and again on the horn, as people fail to yield the

right-of-way at an intersection or in traffic. When you need us however, your first comment upon our arrival will be, "It took you forever to get here!'

I wish you could know my thoughts as I help extricate a girl of teenage years from the remains of her automobile. "What if this was my sister, my daughter my wife, my girlfriend or my friend? What were her parents reactions going to be when they opened the door to find a police officer with hat in hand?"

I wish you could know how it feels to walk in the back door and greet my family, not having the heart to tell them that I nearly did not come back from the last call.

I wish you could realize the physical, emotional and mental drain or missed meals, lost sleep and forgone social activities, in addition to all the tragedy my eyes have seen.

I wish you could know the brotherhood and self-satisfaction of helping save a life or preserving someone's property, or being able to be there in time of crisis, or creating order from total chaos

I wish you could understand what it feels like to have a little boy tugging at your arm and asking "Is my Mommy okay?" Not even being able to look in his eyes without tears from your own and not knowing what to

Or to have to hold back a long time friend who watches his buddy having rescue breathing done on him as the ambulance pulls away from the wreck caused by a drunk driver. And all along, you know no one had their seat belts on.

Unless you have lived with this kind of life, you will never truly understand or appreciate who I am, who we are, or what our job really means to us...I wish you could, though.

in age 7-8 or 9-10 will be allowed to increases dramatically. In 1997, Texas led all other states in the number of alcohol-related traffic fatalities. These deaths accounted for about half of all traffic fatalities in Texas, well above the national average of 39% About 1/4 of alcohol-related deaths in Texas involved blood alcohol levels of less than .10, the previous standard for legal intoxication. As a person's blood alcohol concentration (BAC) increases, his or her abilities are impaired. Many tests report that the vast majority of drivers exhibit impairment of critical driving tasks with a BAC of .08. This impairment can result in problems

with attention, reaction time, speed control, etc., substantially increasing the risk of a crash. During this year's legislative session, lawmakers passed a bill that changes the definition of legal intoxi-

cation to a BAC of .08 or more. The law defines "Intoxicated" as not having the normal use of physical or mental faculties as a result of alcohol, a controlled substance, a dangerous drug or a combination of these

substances It is hoped that a lower BAC level will serve as a deterrent for those who might consider driving after drinking. In addition, the lower BAC standard will result in more drivers being eligible for Driving While Intoxicated charges.

Don't drink and drive

A first time offense of driving while intoxicated is a Class C misdemeanor with a minimum sentence of 72 hours in jail. If the driver is found to be intoxicated AND has an open container of alcohol in the car, the minimum sentence is increased to six days.

A second-time offense is a Class A misdemeanor and carried a minimum 30-day sentence. A third Driving While Intoxicated conviction results in a third degree felony charge. Keep in mind that these sentences are only for driving while intoxicated. They do not address any additional charges that may result if an intoxicated driver injures or kills someone

In addition to safety reasons for adopting the lower standard, Texas now qualifies for additional National Highway Safety Administration grant money which can be used for highway safety or construction projects.

Regardless of what the law classifies as legally impaired, no one should ever drive a car after drinking. No one should ever ride in a car with a driver who has been drinking or allow someone who is impaired to drive. Get the keys and call a cab or have a designated driver.

Many cities offer free cab rides for drivers who have had too much to drink, and many bars and restaurants offer free sodas for designated drivers

On the surface, this seem like a good thing because it preserves valuable protein. Unfortunately without carbohydrates, the body cannot effectively use the fats that are being broken down. As a result, these fats are turned into ketone bodies. As the body tries to use fat for fuel, the level and can cause ketosis. Ketosis is not a normal state and can lead to some unpleasant and potentially serious side effects including nausea, dizziness, bad breath, headache and dehydration. In the first week or so, many fad diets appear to work but the weight loss is usually water weight. And some people will lose weight, but usually it is because they are taking in

eating less of a certain food group.

There is a desire for a quick fix but losing weight and keeping it off is difficult. Healthy eating and exercise should be made permanent behaviors to promote healthy life-styles. People should set realistic goals and commit to eating healthy and obtain a regular physical activity. Incorporate fruits, vegetables and whole grains in place of high fat foods and snacks. Also watch portion size. People can still have cake, ice cream and other "forbidden" foods, just eat less of them. Chose a physical activity that is enjoyable to the individual and in addition, try to identify and control events, such as stress or social situations, that encourage eating even when not hungry. Understanding the relationship a person has with food and finding out the importance of food in their lives is very important. If food is a comfort or way or relieving stress, find another alternative that is satisfying, yet easily accessible like listening to music, needlepoint, walking or writfewer calories, not because they're ing a journal.
