### Talco Science Department making plans to publish cookbook


Department is putting together a cookbook to help raise funds for hands-on science experiences. The students have already started collecting recipes for the book which will be titled Cooking Rebel Style"


#### **Roberta Moon Kile**, 98 dies March 27

### Law needs modification, says ICA

The Independent Cattleman's Associatin of Texas today broke with all other agricultural trade associates in the state and urged the Legislature to modify the "Rule of Capture," to protect landowners from having their water sources depleted.

ICA President Chuck Kiker of Beaumont said that landowners face the certainty of losing the right to control the water under their land if the Legislature fails to act.

The "Rule of Capture" was declared to be the law in Texas by the

RedRiverGSociety

Supreme Court in 1904. It affirms the right of landowners to use the water under their land. Landowners cannot compete with Texas cities in the demand for water. The cities simply have bigger pumps.

ICA is urging that a duty be imposed on all water users in Texas to consider the impact on the aquifer from which they are pumping and on adjoining landowners.

Kiker pointed out that the alternative, ultimately, was regulation of groundwater by the State of Texas. SCOTT MCDOWELL Democratic Candidate for 62nd Judicial District Judge

#### TEXAS BUSINESSES HAVE APRIL 17 DEADLINE FOR FILING PROPERTY TAX RENDITIONS

(Austin)-Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander today reminded Texas businesses to render their property with county appraisal districts by April 17. To render is to list the taxable property that businesses owned or managed as of Jan. 1, 2000. Rendering allows property owners to record their opinions of their property's value. This ensures that the appraisal district sends them a notice before placing a higher value on their property.

"Property owners who render are in a better position to exercise their rights as taxpayers," Comptroller Rylander noted. "They ensure that the appraisal district has their correct address so they will receive notices of any actions that affect their property or tax bills."

iven if the tax collector cannot deliver a tax bill because of an incorrect address, the property owner is still responsible for paying the taxes, plus late payment penalties.

Businesses annually report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment and other tangible assets. Appraisal districts use the reports to set business property values. When a business owner doesn't render the business property, the chief appraiser estimates the value. While state law requires business owners and operators to render, any property owner, including homeowners, farmers and ranchers, may render their property with county appraisal districts.

may render their property with county appraisal districts. Since the regular deadline of April 15 is on a Saturday this year, property owners have until Monday, April 17 to render.


State law requires anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 to render with the local appraisal district. An exception is a business that receives the freeport exemption for managing cotton stored in a warehouse. Renditions must be notarized if they are filed by persons other than the property owner, the owner's employee or the owner's representative.

Rylander also announced that property owners whose property was damaged by a storm, flood or fire last year may file a special decreased value report that could lower their final tax bills. Property owners have until April 17 to file the decreased value report, which indicates their property's condition on Jan. 1, 2000.

Property owners may ask the chief appraiser to extend the filing deadline to May 1 if the owners can demonstrate good cause. The chief appraiser must grant owners of property regulated by the Public Utility Commission or the Texas Railroad Commission a filing extension to May 1, and may extend the deadline another 15 days if the owners request it in writing and show good cause.

If more than one appraisal district appraises a property, the property owner should render in each appraisal district office. One appraisal district may appraise a property for county purposes, while a neighboring appraisal district may appraise the same property for school taxes, if the school district is in both counties.

Taxpayers may contact their county appraisal district office for rendition forms, or they may e-mail the Comptroller's property tax division at ptd.cpa@cpa.tx.state.us. Or call the property tax hotline at 1-800-252-9121 for general property tax information.

### **Protect your rights!** "Render" your taxable property by April 17th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office...or you may draft a similar form.

#### Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income--such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you? The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1999. The district will look at your property before assigning value in 2000.

#### What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2000 renditions is April 17. Call your appraisal district for the last date the rendition may be postmarked, if mailing. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 17 deadline.

Soft classical music wafts softly down the hall. In each spotlessly clean room there is a luxurious special bed, a "patio" area that looks upon serene country scenery ,and dining facilities. A non-slip special bathtub is available for those guests who want to be pampered by a warm bath and massage. All is overseen by the German management, and owner, Jake Maurischat. No, it isn't a luxury hotel, it's Lone Oak Pet Camp, located just south of Deport on FM 1503. Lone Oak caters to pets and their people who want a safe, secure place where they can leave their animals when they are away from home.

There are also training and obedience classes for puppies and dogs with behavior problems.

Jake, whose real name is Joachim, is a native of Germany and is married to Barbara Holt Maurischat, a Milton native whose parents, James and Dorothy Holt are well known in the area

When asked why everyone calls him Jake he grins that "Barbara renamed me for her convenience, since no one could pronounce Joachim". The good natured man has a love

of animals that positively shines forth. His walls have pictures of beloved cats and dogs that have passed away after a long and healthy life.

The couple currently has seven

dogs and four cats of their own, including Jake's newest pride and joy, Rex, a German Shepherd who is only six months old. Rex's real name is Joe von der Schnuckenwein and Jake brought him back from Germany last year at 12 weeks of age.

This spring Jake will go back to Germany and bring back a female puppy in hopes of breeding puppies with an impeccable blood line. In fact, Rex is featured on Jake's internet home page "Marburger Land German Shepherd" which shows the six month old puppy in various pictures and lists his bloodline

The kennels that Jake and Barbara run is spotless and spacious. Heated and cooled, the dogs receive attention that few kennels can boast. In fact, the smaller dogs such as poodles and Yorkies tend to end up in the house instead of staying in the kennels. Still, those kennels are mighty nice. And they are located close to the house, so that someone is always right on hand. Jake came over from Germany in


'In two weeks I can turn a dog into a good citizen" Jake grins. He doesn't do it with harsh measures, either, but with patience and reward.




All of the Lady Rebels did an outstanding job in representing their school. Because of the weather the meet was called early and the athletes were not able to run the 2400 meter or participate in field events.
