I was mowing at our neighbor's house the other day. As I whipped around at the end of the gravel drive way I saw a tiny form, wings spread, desperately huddled over something in the middle of the drive. I was pelting her with high-velocity debris, small gravel and I thought it would surely kill her. I stopped to look, and there she was, a little Kill Deer, valiantly covering her two eggs, which were nestled in the drive.

From then on I made sure I didn't mow where the discharge from the mower would hit her or her eggs. But every time I came close she would rise up, spread her wings and prepare to do battle with this threat. A tiny bird, ready to face a full sized tractor and mower.

Then, just a day or two later I watched as a mockingbird swooped down on one of my cats, literally yanking a wad of fur out of her back. The noisy birds have a nest in a tree not far from the house, but have defended it so diligently the cats now give that area a wide berth rather than deal with the shrieking, hair pulling sky-borne creatures.

Then, I went down to mow at the neighbor's again. As I made my first pass through the yard three tiny little brown forms flew up in front

of me. It was a trio of wrens, each not over two inches in length. I got off the mower and chased them down, carefully aking each one into my ha They were perfect little miniature wrens, tiny and just able to fly for short distances. They must have just left the nest. And each one was courageous enough to try and threaten me with it's little beak! I put them carefully in a safe place and kept an eye on them while I finished the yard. Now these little birds all showed defiance and courage. They also showed fear. That fear was apparent, but didn't keep them from trying their best against forces that outweighed them much as an atomic bomb does a firecracker. I know it is instinct, but what a wonderful instinct it is. There must be many times when these feathered warriors lose their battles. But for the Kill Deer, Mockingbirds and wrens I encountered each time their strength of purpose won. Is there a lesson here?


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



Happy 4th of July! We hope everyone has a safe and happy holiday! This is one of the most celebrated holidays of the year with cookouts, picnics, family gatherings and other special summer festivities.

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Since the 4th is celebrated with fireworks, flags, food and fun. . . here are a few facts about our nation's flag that you may not know about.

Congress first authorized the United States Flag on June 14, 1777, the day we currently celebrate Flag Day in America. This date is also significant in that it qualifies our flag as the third oldest of the National Standards of the world, even older that Britain's Union Jack.

The flag was first flown from Fort Stanwix, on the site of the present city of Rome, New York, on August 3, 1777. The flag had a tumultuous beginning. It went through the Battle of Oriskany when it was only three days old on August 6, 1777.

The flag's original design called for a star and a stripe for each state, corresponding to the original thirteen colonies. In 1791, Vermont was admitted to the union, followed by Kentucky in 1792. The number of stars and stripes was accordingly raised to fifteen. As other states joined, it was clear something would have to be done about the ever expanding flag. An act of Congress in 1818 reduced and restricted the number of stripes on the flag to thirteen. A star would be added for each new state.

The individual stars depicting the states represent the power of our Federal Constitution, which reserves the

States their individual sovereignty, except as to rights delegated by them to the Federal Government.

George Washington said of the flag's symbolism, "We take the stars from Heaven, the red from our mother county, separating it by white stripes, thus showing that we have separated from her, and the white stripes shall go down to posterity representing Liberty.

Please take time during this holiday to show your flag the honor and dignity that it deserves and give thanks for your freedom in this United States! We do hope you celebrate this holiday in a safe manner and hope you also enjoy these recipes for your cookout or picnic! See you in the kitchen! Rural phone service to improve

Local telephone services for more than a quarter million Texas phone customers, most of whom live in rural or small communities, will be upgraded under an order signed on Thursday by the Public Utility Commission.

Valor Telecommunications of Texas, L.P. agreed to buy 313,800 phone lines in 197 local exchanges scattered throughout west Texas, east Texas and the Texarkana area, from GTE Southwest. The sale is expected to close on September 1.

In addition to maintaining at least the current level of service for customers, Valor plans to introduce the following improvements to its system when the sale is closed:

*Upgrade central office facilities to improve Custom Local Area Signaling Services such as caller ID, call waiting, three way calling, call forwarding, call return, call blocker and automatic redial.

*Provide CLASS to all exchanges within 18 months.

*Introduce high speed internet access or digital subscriber line service to at least 10 exchanges within 18 months.

*Deploy DSL within 15 months to any exchange with at least 75 DSL requests from Valor subscribers requesting it.
