But, circumstances conspired to create a series of events that led to tragedy.


We cannot control the other driver. We cannot control things that may happen to our vehicle, or weather conditions.

In spite of overwhelming evidence that seat belts save lives, there are still many people who will not wear them. Yes, on rare occasions, a seat belt does more harm than good. But by and large they do the opposite.

The hardest part of this iob is taking photographs of terrible accidents and writing stories about lives cut short.

Knowing that these photos and stories can upset family and friends is another difficult part of the job.

## Letters To Editor

#### Are kids created equal?

Why does there have to be popularity? Why can't every child have a fair chance to do what the popular kids get to do day after day, year after year? I wish someone could find a solution for this because I feel that if every child had a chance you would have kids with more confidence and higher self esteem.

I work with young children sometimes. Last week I was at a meeting with some girls between the ages of nine and eleven. One of the girls came into our meeting a little late.
