I am reminded of a friend whose dad took up machine applique because he couldn't do anything else. Then he had heart surgery and felt so good he wouldn't do the applique work anymore!



Kathy Cheyne was appointed by the Red River County Commissioner's Court in a special meeting last Friday.


The vote was three to two in favor of the appointment with Judge L.D. Williamson casting the tiebreaking Vote.

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Week, October 8-14, firefighters, fire prevention personnel and teachers will direct attention to the need for fire prevention in the home, on the job and in fields and forests.

The annual fire safety observance commemorates the anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire of 1871, but Texans have only to look at the state's record fire siege this year to appreciate the destruction wildfires can cause. The Texas Forest Service estimates that from January through September, fires scorched an estimated 630,000 acres in Texas before being controlled by a combination of local, state and federal firefighting personnel and equipment.

Fire prevention leaders in Texas warn that fire danger has not disappeared from the state. Fire danger remains extreme in the rolling plains, north Texas and the Texas panhandle, and it is rising elsewhere in the state

with each day that passes without significant rainfall. Rain has temporarily lowered fire danger across much of the eastern portion of the state, but drought indices remain in the high to extreme range in most east Texas counties.

Several fire safety precautions have been suggested. Obey local burning ordinances, in some places burning is allowed, clear wide lines to bare soil around brush piles and burn barrels. Only use trash barrels equipped with a screen on top. Avoid burning on windy days or leaving fires unattended. Keep tools and water handy in case your fire should get away. Always expect and plain for the unexpected for Texas weather can bring just that.

Avoid using spark producing equipment around dry grass, dispose of smoking materials property and avoid driving vehicles into dry grass.

Shin splints are most often caused by the stress of exercise. People with flat feet whose feet pronate excessively are particularly susceptible to developing posterior tibial shin splints. 

# Family search ends in reunio

J.O. and Roger Weatherall of Talco She also told him that she was detergrew up knowing they were adopted by their loving parents, John H. and Elsie (Maywall) Weatherall.

Roger, the younger of the boys was adopted at age 8 and knows his biological family, while J.O. was adopted at 11 days old and the Weatherall were the only family he has eve known. J.O. stated that he has never dwelled on his biological parents because of the parents who he loved and loved him so. But, he did say he had often wondered about his birth parents and why they had put him up for adoption.

When J.O. began having some health problems, although minor, his thoughts turned toward genetics. He contacted a lawyer in Longview to help him begin his search and a few weeks ago, they started perrusing files, looking for an account of his birth. They were looking for what his mother had told him about his birth unions and every time would sit and mother's name which was Netherland. thing, what can I do to find him? J.O. and his lawyer were unable to find anything under Weatherall or Netherland. He was later to learn that his birth mother had used her maiden name on his birth certificate. J.O.'s mom, Elsie tried to fill in as many facts as she could but without John Sr., who J.O. says will always be his father in his heart, there were facts she did not know. She remembers everything was handled through a lawyer and a case worker. She said, "We just went down there and picked him up when he was 11 days old and we have stuck with him ever since". J.O. knew he had been born at 4:04 a.m. on March 28, 1949 in Gladewater, Texas to a woman whose name was Netherland. His information ended there. On Friday before Labor Day weekend, after the search in Longview proved unsuccessful, J.O. contacted his attorney to see what steps they needed to take next to try and find his birth family. The lawyer told him he was going to take some work home over the weekend and would contact him when he had some more information That night J.O. and his wife Becky and their sons, Josh and Colton were settling in for the evening when the phone rang. A nervous voice belonging to Karon Wilcher of Carthage, Mississippi said, " I know that you don't know me, but I'm looking for a brother of mine who was given up for adoption. He was born at 4:04 a.m. on March 28, 1949 in Gladewater, Texas. Could you be him?" J.O. recalls a sinking feeling and after a minute said, "Yes, I could be him". Becky who is Internet savvy and very protective of her husband's vulnerability in this issue, got on the speaker phone and began firing ques-tions to Karon. International Soundex Reunion Registry. She didn't know what was public record, or how to find the adoption agency if there was one, or what her adopted brother's name might be. Then last year, she discovered her mother had used her maiden name of sistrunk on the birth certificate. J.O.'s mother had not named him, so the only name was Sistrunk. That is where the search ended. For nights and days Karon sat at her computer searching adoption sites. There are so many and the hardest thing to deal with was thinking, how to you find someone with no name?

Karon turned to God to help her. She prayed, "I'm leaving it up to you, Lord, if it's your will for me to find him I will". "The Lord brought him to me" she said. Also a driving force for Karon was not knowing if her brother was alive, or if he was out there somewhere walking, talking and living a life separate from her family's. She wanted to meet her brother and talk to him. She wanted to let him know he wasn't given up because he wasn't wanted or loved. He was given up because her parents were young and already had two children. They were living with someone else and did not have a home to give him. She wanted him to know if circumstances had been different they would have never given him up and their parents are good people. Giving up their son and not knowing anything about him had been a wound that wouldn't heal. Did her have a good life? Did he have a better life than they could have given him? Was he ok? There were all kinds of questions.

Karon said, "I wondered if he was a bum, a weirdo, or rich and famous. Maybe even a movie star? I just thank the Lord he's just like the rest of us. Just a normal person."

Afte hours on the phone and on the Internet with the Netherland family trying to pull everyone together at one time in Talco, J.O. and Becky decided to go to Carthage. So on Labor Day weekend they loaded up their sons and set off.

They arrived at Melody's hair salon in Carthage a little before 11:00 a.m. They tried to keep a video camerarolling to catch the surprise on her face. What they caught were squeals of delight, tears and a hug between brother and sister that lasted for several minutes. J.O. said, "As I opened the door, she nearly attacked me. J.O. said the reunion was an experience he will never forget and meeting is birth mother and spending time with her has helped heal an unfulfilled emptiness. Elsie shares her son's joy about finding his birth family. She was excited for him when she learned he was looking for his birth family and it just came out of the blue. It was a shock but she said, "I got over the shock and it is pretty exciting to know he has that much family after being raised up with just one brother and his parents. I am glad he has found them, they can't stay off the phone".

Karon would like to meet Elsie to thank her for giving her brother a loving home. She would have liked to meet his dad also. She said, "They both had to be really good people to have raised him to be the great person that he is. I thank them with all my heart.'

Elsie isn't sure she would like to meet J.O.'s biological mother. But, she said, "If I did meet her, I would just thank her for giving him up. She did a good deed. I love J.O. and Roger equally and we gave them all we could. J.O. has stressed that Elsie is his only mom and John is his only dad.

J.O. and Karon admitted saying goodbye after their first meeting was hard and vowed to keep in touch. In fact, they are already making plans for the holidays. Just having everyone together will be the only gifts exchanged.

J.O. is very emotional when he talks about all that has happened to him and his family. It is heart wrenching, awesome and brings feelings never felt which are very good. J.O. a little teary eyed and with a raspy voice says, " All of this has made me appreciate my parents more than ever and to realize what a wonderful life they have given me. Meeting my biological family has given me so many to love. I am happy Karon found me and I will never lose them again. But, my heart will always belong to my parents, Elsie and John Weatherall and my brother, Roger Weatherall and his family.

Becky said, " I am so happy for J.O. and our children who now have such an extended family. When J.O. first made the decision to search for his biological family I agreed to stand by him no matter what we found out. The experience has made me value all of our families so much more."

## Rivercrest CC runners compete in Saltillo October 7


Coach Debbie Williams took her Rivercrest cross country runners to compete at Saltillo on Saturday, October 7, 2000.






