



Upon the first day of the week let everyone of you lay by him in store, as God hath prospered him;" "For if there be first a willing mind, it is accepted according to that a man hath, and not according to that he hath not;" "Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity; for God loveth a cheerful giver" (1 Cor. 16:1-2; 2 Cor. 8:12; 9:7; cf., Acts 4:34-37; Rom. 15:26; 1 Cor. 9:6-14; 2 Cor.

These directions are clear. All funds utilized in the work of the church are to be contributed by its members based upon their own inventory of personal finances. This means that bake sales, bingo games and on-the-air pleas for viewer contributions are unauthorized, inappropriate and unacceptable to God. One day He will call to account those who have angered him by "supposing that godliness is a way to financial gain" (1 Tim. 6:5) and "through covetousness...with feigned words make merchandise of you" (2 Peter 2:3; cf., John 2:126).



WHEREAS, to prevent any further vandalism which has occurred in the past; NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF

BOGATA, TEXAS: It shall be unlawful for any child under seventeen (17) years of age to intentionally, unknowingly, recklessly or with criminal negligence be in or remain in or upon the streets or public places or an establishment within the city limits of Bogata, Texas, during the follow-

ing periods: 1. Ending at 6:00 a.m. and beginning at 10:00 p.m. on week nights (Sunday through

Thursday nights). 2. Ending at 6:00 a.m. and beginning at 12:00 a.m. weekends (Saturday and Sunday

LAW ENFORCEMENT PROCEDURE

1. A law enforcement officer may stop and detain persons whom the officer has developed reasonable suspicion to believe have committed a violation of this ordinance. A law enforcement officer shall attempt to ascertain insofar as possible that the persons are not:

A. Returning home without any detour or stop from a law occupation which requires the child to remain out beyond the curfew hours. B. Returning home from an educational,

religious or nonprofit activity which can be verified by the parent, guardian, custodian or

other responsible person C. Engaged in an emergency errand or acting in a case of reasonable necessity and of such urgency that the parent, guardian, custodian, or other responsible person is unable to accompany the child. In such cases, the parent, guardan, custodian or other responsible person should

be able to verify. 2. A. It shall be unlawful for a parent, guardian or custodian to fail to respond to any notification by a law enforcement officer to take custody of a child, unless reasonably hindered

from doing so B. A child shall commit a first offense upon the second violation of this ordinance. For such first offense, and for any subsequent offenses, a child upon conviction shall be fined in the

Municipal Court in the City of Bogata, Texas. C. A parent, guardian or custodian shall commit a first offense upon the second violation by a child. For such first offense, and for any subsequent offenses, a parent, guardian or custodian upon conviction shall be fined in the Municipal-pal Court of the City of Bogata,

D. Jurisdiction for violations of this ore nance shall be in the Municipal Court in City of Bogata, Texas.
