

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

During ancient times, the Egyptians, the Arabs and the Chinese prepared confections of fruit and nuts candied in honey

In Europe during the Middle Ages, the high cost of sugar made sugar candy a delicacy available only to the wealthy.

Boiled sugar candies were enjoyed in the 17th century in England and in the American Colonies

Candy is made simply by dissolving sugar in water. The different heating levels determine the types of candy. Hot temperatures make hard candy, medium heat will make soft candy and cool temperature will make chewy candy.

Sweet-making developed rapidly into an industry during the early nine-

teenth century through the discovery of sugar beet juice and the advance of mechanical appliances. Homemade hard candies, such as peppermints and lemon drops become popular in America during that time.

By the mid-1800's. over 300 American factories were producing candy, primarily "penny candy", which was sold loose from glass cases in general stores.

Today, Americans consume 11.8 pounds of sugar candy per capita each year.






