

Farm loan apps being accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for damages and losses caused by drought and excessive heat that occurred from January 1, 2000 and continuing in all 243 counties of, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency in Mt. Pleasant.

243 counties are included in those in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture, Dan Glickman, eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from drought and excessive heat that occurred January 1, 200 and continu-

Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75%.

Applications will be accepted until August 20, 2001, except Cass, Harrison and Marion, which will be July 2, 2001, but farmers should apply as soon as possible.

FSA officers are open from 8:00 to 4:30 Monday through Friday.

This is one of those columns that is a little "off the wall". . .so to speak. Fried Dill Pickles! Whoever heard of these...not me until a few weeks ago! In Arkansas and Mississippi, they are considered quite a dish!

Well, I began my search for recipes and this is what I came up with. They are really deep-fried dill pickles and you dip them in ranch dressing or other dipping sauces!

Guess what else I found out a bout pickles? Pickle history began sometimes around 2030 BC, when in habitants of Northern India brought cucumber seeds to the Tigris Valley. Soon, the cucumber vines were sprouting throughout Europe. Shortly thereafter, people learned to preserve fruits of their labor by pickling them in a salty brine. By the 17th century, the crunchy pickled cucumber had made its debut in the New World. Early colonists grew so fond of them, that in 1820, Nicholas Appert constructed the first pickle

plant in America. Did you know that America was named after the first pickle peddler. . .Amerigo Vespucci. He was a ships chandler, outfitting vessels scheduled for long explorations with vitamin Cpacked pickled vegetables. . . particularly cucumbers. . . to prevent scurvy among the crew members.

Sam Rayburn Memorial Veterans Center in Bonham has been providing care for the families who were





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

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Who Said So?

Many churches have already initiated plans for their public worship services to include: Women waiting of the Lord's table; Women song leaders; women leading prayers; and even women preachers. When confronted with the fact that the Bible expressly prohibits women assuming such roles they answer that the Bible was written in compliance with the customs of its times. According to them, in Bible times, women were not allowed to do much today, it's okay to have women taking roles of leadership in worship and work of the church.

"Who said so?" Did you know that in Bible times, the pagans had female deities? One among the Babylonians, Ashtoreth, stood on an equal footing with male divinities. "The chief seat of the worship of Istar in Babylonia was Erech, where prostitution was practiced in her name, and she was served with immortal rites by bands of men and women. In Assyria...prophetesses were attached to her temples to whom she delivered oracles." (I.S.B.E., Vol. 1, P.

In Ephesus, there was the Temple of Diana, where the priestesses were divided into three different classes with each class having its own special duties. Corinth had a temple with over 1,000 priestesses. In an article on "Woman", the I.S.B.E. (Vol. 5, P. 3101) says: "That she everywhere participated freely in the religious rites and customs of her people is evident from the fact that women were often priestesses, and were often deified."

No, it was the custom of women in Bible times to take an active role in leadership and service in pagan religions. contrary to the customs of the times, the Bible says: "Let your women keep silence in the churches; for it is not permitted unto them to speak; but they are commanded to be under obedience, as also saith the law. And if then will learn anything, let them ask their husbands at home; for it is a shame for women to speak in the church." 1 Cor. 14:34-35. "I will therefore that men pray everywhere, lifting up holy hands, without wrath and doubting. Let the women learn in silence with all subjection. But I suffer not any woman to teach, nor usurp authority over the men, but to be in silence." 1 Tim.

"By the way, did you know that woman's role is grounded in creation itself (1 Tim. 2:13; 1 Cor. 11:8-9)? This is not a mere cul-





2. The City may request the Lamar County Sheriff and/or any other law enforcement or animal control officer to assist with legal and acceptable methods of impoundment and/or destruction of animals running at large which are considered an immediate threat or danger to any animal or person.

C. When residents or property owners allow dogs to run loose in the vicinity of the utility easement, where water meters are located, and when such loose animals do not have proper identification of rabies vaccination or such proof on file with the City, such animals may be a health and safety threat to City employees or contractors required to read City water meters. If such health and safety threat is not alleviated after proper notification, as detailed in Section 1, the City may curtail water or other City utility e health and safety of

City employees and/or contractors.

D. In addition to enforcement actions detailed above, the Mayor is authorized to order any other legal emergency actions or methods necessary to protect the immediate safety of any person(s) or animal(s).
