
Strangely, when I wrote the column I really wasn't thinking about people sharing their white sheets with us...but boy, and I glad they did!





This is so he can tell if these eggs from the ones other hens "lay to" the setting hen every day. I used to watch my daddy do this when I was a little girl (longer ago than I like to think about!)

We are always saying, "How things change!" ... and yet .. somethings never change. I believe country living is filled with things that have not changed in many, many years, if ever. I have just hand-pieced quilts for my grandchildren and a lovely group of ladies is quilting them by hand. 




