Bogata Chief of Police Charlie Clegg "can write you a ticket or play you a song

Charlie Clegg came to Bogata in 1998. He helped create the Police Department for Bogata, a department that aims for value based policies to better serve the community.

Charlie was born in Nashville, Tennessee. His dad served in World War II and his mother worked as a riveter, building air planes.

the family moved to Hendersonville, Tenn. when Charlie was about 12 years old. Hendersonville was about 30 miles out of Nashville, near Old Hickory Lake.

Charlie grew up in this neighborhood, and Boots Randolph lived a short distance away; Johnny Cash lived close by.

Charlie's best friends were Del and Dane Bryants. Their dad was Boudeleoux Bryant, who was added to the Country Music Hall of Fame three years ago. Roy Orbison's little brother, Sam, went to school with Charlie. Boots Randolph, Chet Atkins and Floyd Cramer would do fund raisers for their school.

Charlie's older brother brought drums home, but Charlie was the one who "took to " them. He started playing in "The Black Poodle" next to the Carousel on Printers Alley in Nashville when he was only 14 years old.

Charlie and some friends formed a music group and called themselves "The Homesteaders". The band consisted of Charlie Clegg, drummer; California. She started singing on the

This was all back in about 1966. The Homesteaders played back up music for many singers: Red Foley, Lefty Frizzell, Dottie West, Marty Robbins, Charlie Pride, Slim Whitman. They played the music for Carl Smith when he did "Hey Joe", played for Floyd Tillman when he did "Slow Poke". They played for Hank Snow, Tex Ritter, P. Wee King, and Red Stewart who wrote :Tennessee Waltz" and "Bonaparte's Retreat". Charlie and the other Homesteaders played in Carnegie Hall for the opening of the show "Buck Owens Live At Carnegie hall". The Country Music Awards in 1967 recognized The Homesteaders as one of the Top 10 bands in the USA. Buddy Lee Attractions was their booking agent. They traveled to all 50 states and 28 countries seven or eight times from 1966 to 1974.

Charlie was staff drummer for Tree Publishing Co. of Nashville. Deanna Carter's dad, Fred Carter, Jr., played guitar on their records.

Many answers are given to the above question in the religious world today-but what does the Bible say? To the rich young ruler, Jesus gave an

answer appropriate to that day by directing the Jew to the Jewish Law (Luke 18:18-23). Yet, we are neither Jewish nor subject to Mosaic Law. The Christian Age or New Testament period began after Christ's death (Hebrews 9:15-17). We, therefore, need an answer to the question which pertains to this time period. Three examples should suffice. Peter gave the answer when believing Jews asked what they needed to do: "Repent and be baptized...into the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38). Paul was told to go into the city and await an answer, which Ananias soon provided: "Arise and be baptized and wash away thy sins, calling on His name" (Acts 9:6; 22:16). When Paul himself was asked the same question by a jailer, he responded, "Believe on the Lord Jesus, and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31). How did this answer differ from the previous two?

What Must I Do To Be Saved?

In the first place, Paul and those gathered on Pentecost already believed in Jesus prior to their question. The jailer on the other hand, was a Gentile who needed to be informed of the necessity of obedient faith. Secondly, Paul did not wait for a response of faith from the jailer since the jailer did not know HOW to believe on Jesus. So Paul proceeded to teach him precisely what he needed to do so that he could then display obedient faith (Acts 16:32; Romans 10:17). Paul's instructions obviously included (1) the necessity of repentance, as demonstrated by the jailer's decision to wash their stripes and (2) the necessity of baptism, as demonstrated by the fact that they were immersed "immediately" even though it was still the middle of the night (Acts 16:33). It was not until after baptism that the jailer rejoiced. It was not until after baptism that Luke tells us that the jailer believed (Acts 16:34), further emphasizing the essential-

ity of baptism to the conversion process.

"What must I do to be saved?" The New Testament is clear: faith, repentance and baptism are all essential to salvation (1 Peter 3:21; Galations 3:26-27)





Parents and anyone over 21 needs to be aware that it is illegal to make alcohol available to a minor. Fines of up to \$2,000 and/or 180 days in jail can be assessed and adults open themselves up to tremendous civil and criminal liability.

Under Texas' zero tolerance law, it is unlawful for a minor to purchase, attempt to purchase, possess or consume alcoholic beverages, or misrepresent their age. Minors can face a fine of up to \$500, a mandatory al-

cohol awareness course, community service, and a 30-day suspension of their license. On the second offense, there is again a fine of up to \$500, possible attendance of an alcohol awareness course, 20-40 hours of community service and a 60-day suspension of their driver's license. On their third MIP, a teen could face a fine of \$250-\$2,000, confinement in jail for up to 180 days and automatic suspension of their driver's license if the teen is at least 17 years old. If a




