will be on hand with a Cake Walk where delicious home made cakes may be won and the final event of the day will be the Duck Race where some lucky duck will win \$1000 for its owner.

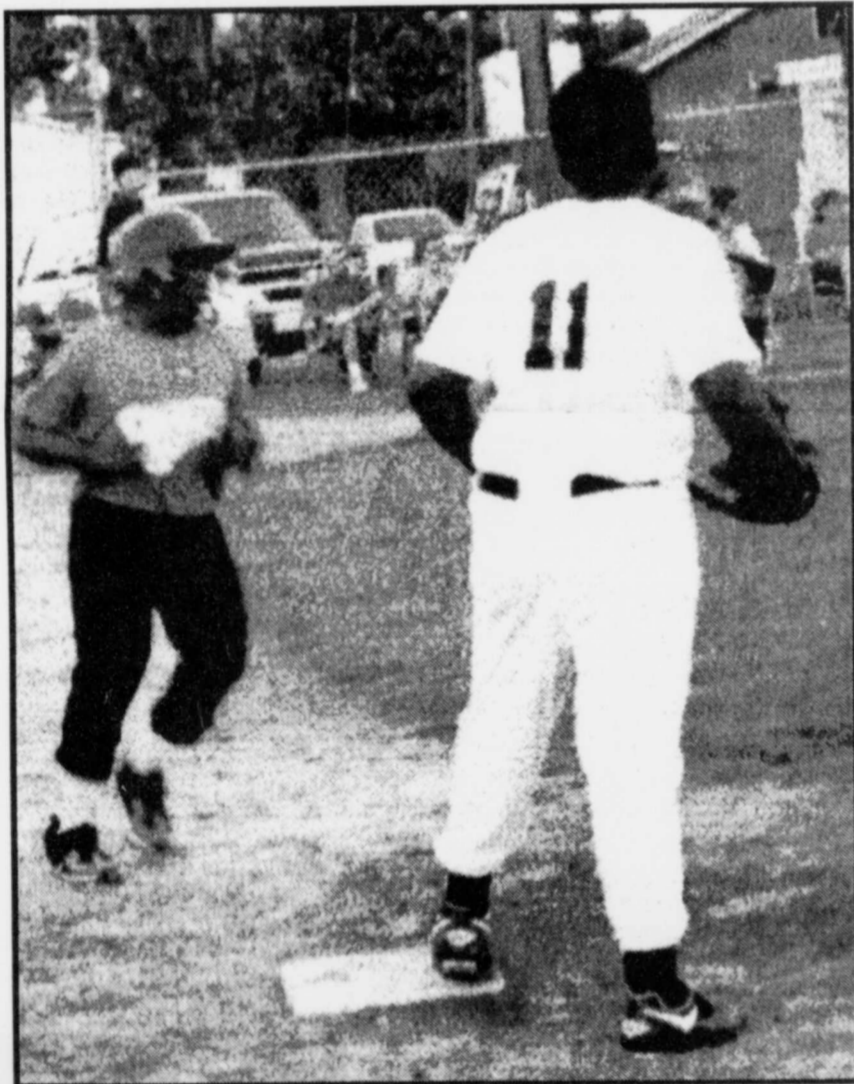

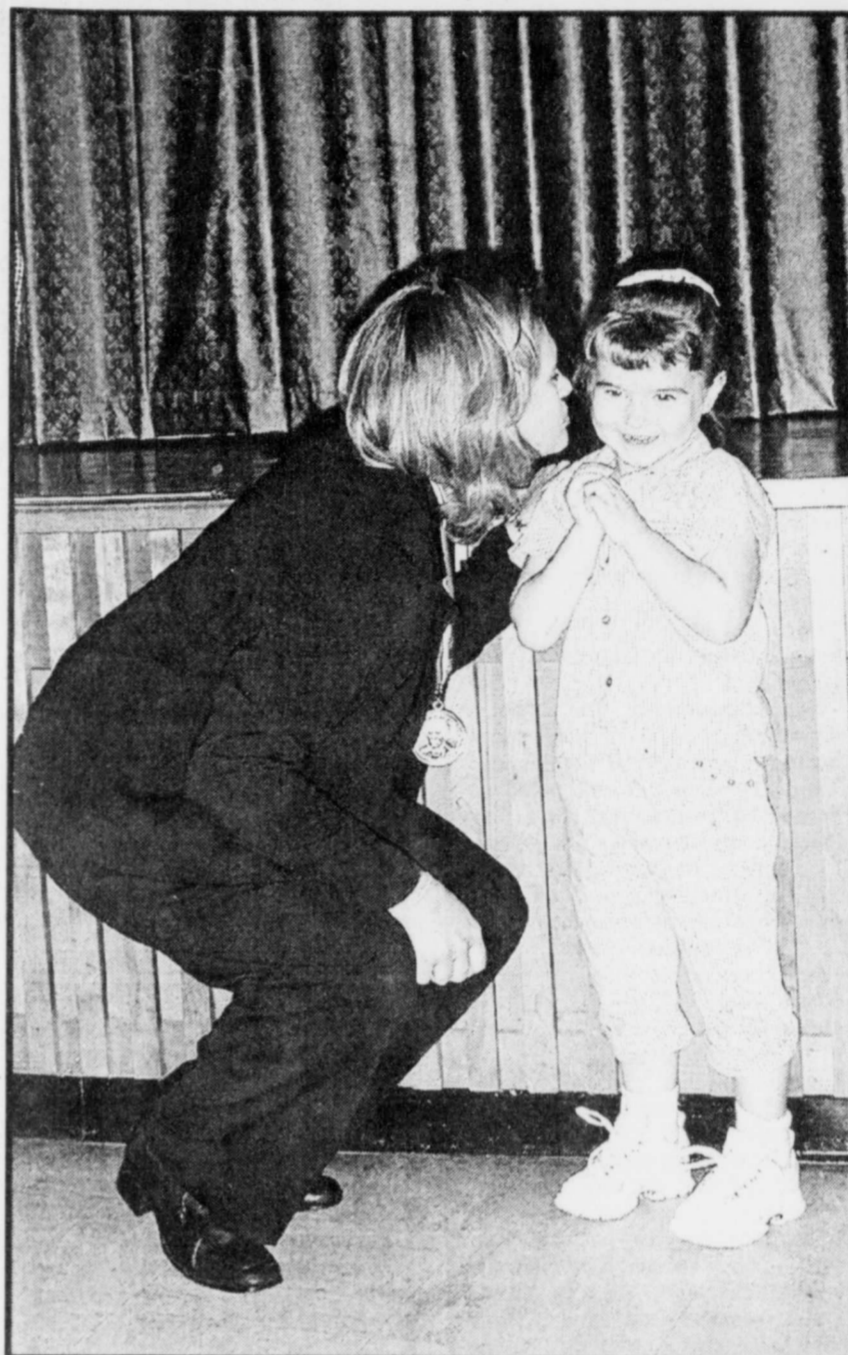

If you enjoy singing the old gospel hymns, Rev. Billy Turpin, pastor, invites you to come and be a part of this homecoming.

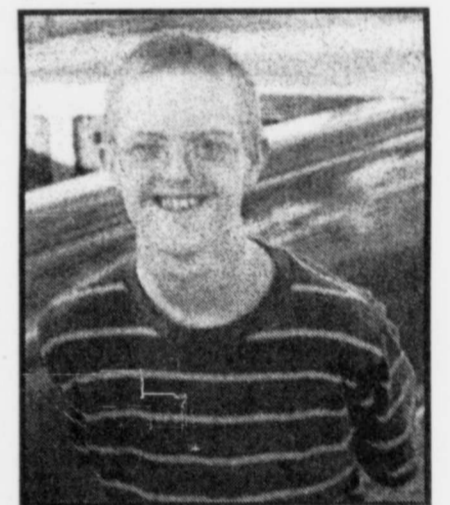

Fresh Garden Vegetable Recipes

<p>Squash Patties</p> <p>1 cup flour 3/4 cup milk 1 teaspoon sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 cup cooking oil 3 cups grated squash 1/2 teaspoon red pepper-optional</p> <p>Beat flour, milk, sugar, salt and oil until smooth; add remaining ingredients. Mix all together and drop by tablespoonful into hot oil. Cook until golden brown.</p> <p>Fried Okra Patties</p> <p>1 tablespoon vegetable oil 1/2 cup flour 1/2 cup meal 2 eggs 1 tablespoon baking powder 2 cups okra-slice thin 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper</p> <p>Mix all ingredients except okra and make a batter. Add okra. Drop by spoonful in hot oil and turn one time. Serve hot.</p> <p>Corn Fritters</p> <p>1 cup flour 1/2 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons sugar 1 egg 1/3 cup milk 1 tablespoon oil 12 ounce can whole kernel corn-drain</p> <p>Sift flour; measure and resift with next three ingredients. Beat egg, add milk and oil; then add flour mixture and beat until smooth. Fold in drained corn. Let stand 5-10 minutes before frying.</p>	<p>Corn Fingers</p> <p>3/4 cup margarine 2 cups flour 4 teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoon salt 2 teaspoons sugar large can cream-style corn 1/4 cup milk</p> <p>Melt margarine in 13x9x2 pan in 425 degree oven. Combine remaining ingredients and mix until blended. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead 6 to 8 times. Roll out to form rectangle about 1-inch thick. Cut in 3x3/4-inch strips and roll in margarine and arrange in pan. Bake 20-25 minutes or until well browned.</p> <p>Eggplant Fritters</p> <p>1 medium eggplant 6 cups water 1 teaspoon salt 1 cup sugar 1 egg 4-6 tablespoons vanilla 2-1/2 cups flour 4 teaspoon baking powder</p> <p>Peel eggplant and dice into small cubes; about 1-inch size. Boil with water until dark green and soft; drain. Place in bowl and add sugar; allow to cool 10-15 minutes. Add egg and mix thoroughly; then add vanilla. Sift in flour and baking powder together into eggplant mixture to make batter. Add more or less flour depending on size of eggplant. Batter should be able to drop from spoon into hot oil without being watery, or too doughy. Fry in deep fryer until golden brown.</p> <p>Fried Cabbage</p> <p>1-1/2 pounds cabbage 3 strips bacon 1/4 cup vinegar 1 teaspoon sugar salt and pepper to taste</p> <p>Shred cabbage medium-fine and set aside. Fry bacon until crisp; drain and break into pieces. Add cabbage to bacon drippings and saute. Stir constantly. Add vinegar, sugar, salt and pepper. Serve immediately with bacon sprinkled on top of cabbage.</p>

The Preacher and Church Growth

If the church is not growing in numbers, it is concluded, the preacher is largely responsible. It is further assumed that such factors as the preacher's appearance, personality, preaching style and tone (as opposed to his message) are responsible for the preacher's success or failure.
Compare this scenario with Biblical truth. According to the New Testament, the preacher's function and God-ordained task is to **preach the truth** (2 Tim. 4:2; 1 Tim. 4:11, 13; Tit. 2:15). Consequently, it is NOT his responsibility to bring in the numbers! We further assume that if the preacher is coming across properly in his preaching, people are going to be converted and if people are not being converted, the preacher has gone haywire in his message and method. Where does such an assumption leave a "preacher of righteousness" (2 Pet. 2:5) like Noah? How does it compare with Jesus' preaching which caused "many" of His disciples to withdraw (John 6:66)? I fear that our job description of the preacher's task and God's definition do not match. Preacher in our day are hired on the basis of their appealing personality and their success in attracting numbers. How shameful that we could have strayed so far afield from divine guidelines!
Paul may have been a penetrating writer, but he apparently was not very commanding in the pulpit in terms of his physical presence (cf., 2 Cor. 10:10; 1 Cor. 1:17; 2:3-5). He would not have fared very well in today's competitive shuffle for dynamic speakers to fill the pulpits of the "big" churches. Nevertheless, he is a proper model for preachers to emulate (1 Cor. 4:16; 11:1; Phil. 3:17; 4:9; 1 Thess. 1:6; 1 Thess. 3:9). He said that he planted i.e., put the truth out there for people to be confronted by (1 Cor. 3:6). GOD was responsible for anyone who responded properly to that message by embracing Christianity. HE gives the increase-not the preacher! consequently, if the truth is being preached in love (Eph. 4:15), and the numbers are not coming in, it's not the preacher's fault!
We must return to the practice of putting Biblical preachers (not cheerleaders, warmed over Dale Carnegies or excited P.R. men) in our pulpits-preachers who will expose people to all God's messages and the leave the increase (or lack of it) to God!
