Perhaps we have been walking and driving by them for years? Or, perhaps it was simply our time to see a bear.

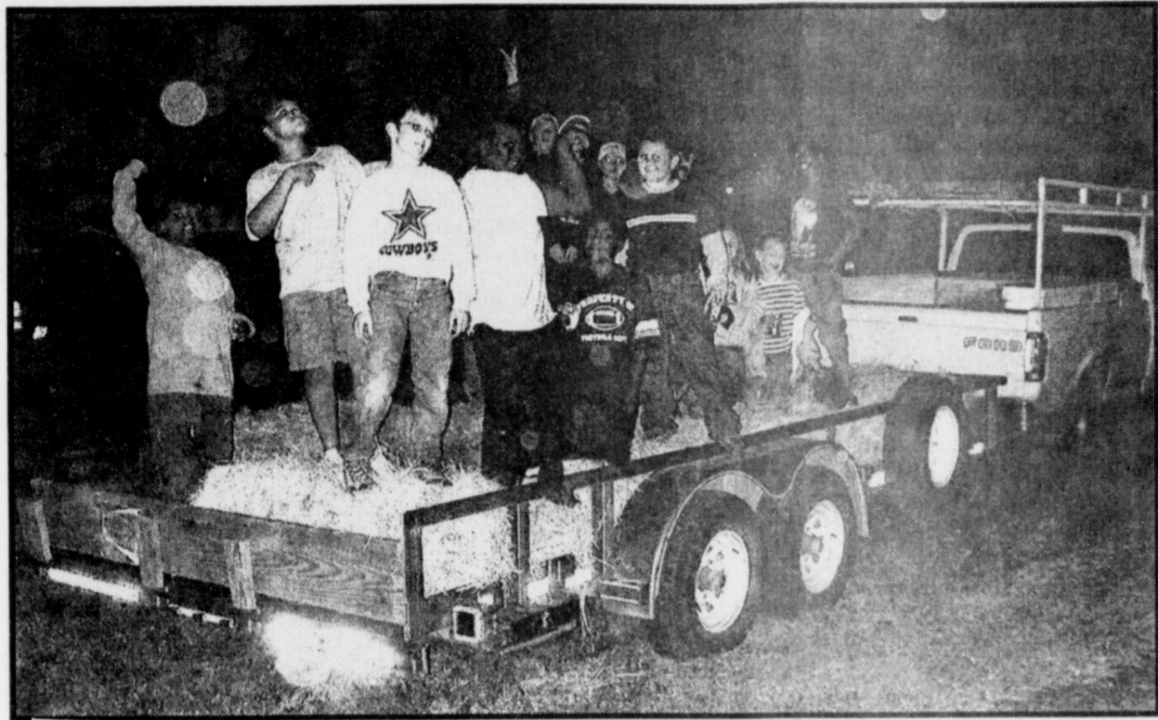
Again, please note the photograph in this issue of the newspaper. I took it, I have the negative to prove it!

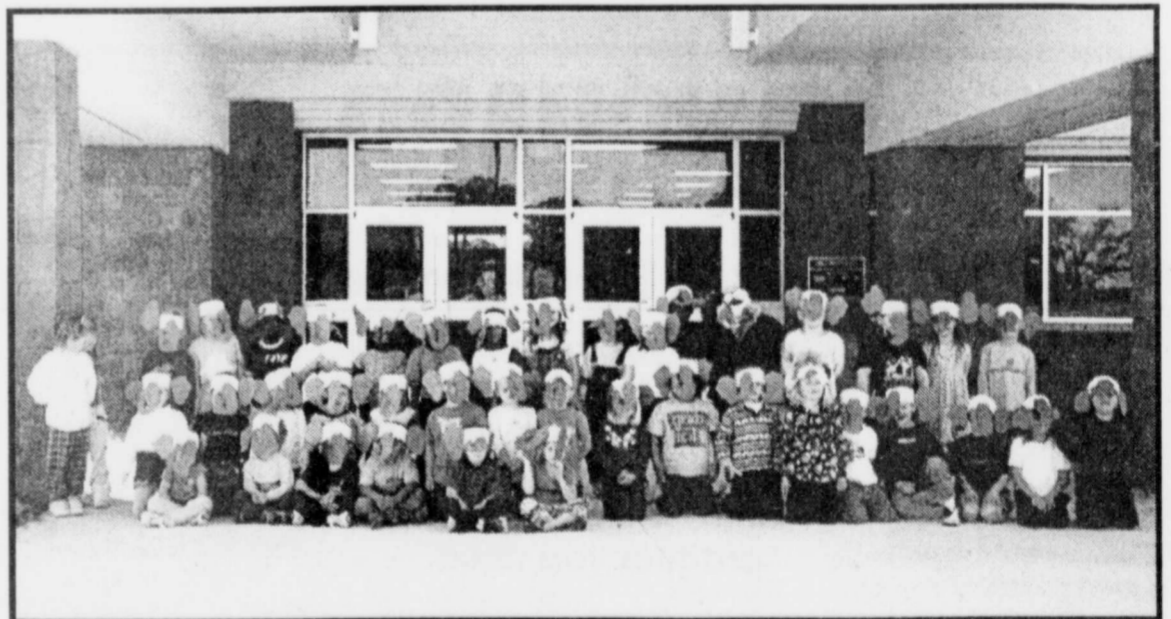

She and husband Art love to travel in their travel trailer and meet various folks in their travels. Since they are both diabetic, eating out can be a chore, so she adapts her recipes to suit them.

They watch their weight and fat content of foods along with their sugars. They also use no salt. She enjoys cooking, gardening and keeping house. They have raised five boys. Two of which are in the military and are seeing combat in the ongoing conflict in Afghanistan. One is in the Army and one is in the Air Force. She worries about them, but knows that this is the price of freedom for our country and they proudly

wave the flag of freedom for the United States. Pat and Art are members of the Bogata Methodist Church and Lions Club members. Pat was honored last year by being named as Lion of the Year. Thanks Pat for the use of your recipes and we hope everyone enjoys them! We will see you in the kitchen!

Tomato Pie

9-inch baked pie shell
2-3 fresh tomatoes-peel, slice & drain
1 cup green onions-chopped
1 teaspoon basil
1 teaspoon chives
1 cup fat-free mayonnaise
1 cup cheddar cheese

Place a layer of tomatoes & onions in pie shell; sprinkle basil & chives over tomatoes & onions. Repeat layers. Mix cheese & mayonnaise. Spread on top of pie. Bake for 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

Apricot Nut Bread

1 cup boiling water
3/4 cup chopped dried apricots
1/4 cup raisins
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 egg-slightly beaten
2 tablespoons margarine-melted
4 tablespoons fructose
1 teaspoon butternut flavoring
1-1/3 cup flour
1/8 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup toasted almonds or nuts of choice

In bowl mix water, apricots, raisins & baking soda. Cool to room temperature. Drain, reserving liquid. Preheat oven to 325 degrees. In another bowl, cream fructose & margarine. Alternately beat in remaining dry ingredients & reserved liquid. Fold in fruit & nuts. Spoon into loaf pan sprayed with non-stick spray. Bake 40-50 minutes. Test using knife in center of bread. If knife comes out clean, bread is done. Remove from pan & cool on wire rack. Can be frozen for later use.

Perfect Brownies

2-1 ounce squares of unsweetened chocolate
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1 cup fructose
3 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup enriched flour
3/4 cup chopped walnuts

Melt chocolate over hot water. Thoroughly cream butter & sugar. Add eggs & beat well. Blend in melted chocolate, vanilla & flour. Mix nuts into batter or sprinkle them over top of batter after batter has been poured into pan. Pour batter into sprayed 8x8x2 inch pan. Bake in slow oven at 325 degrees for 35 minutes. Can be frosted or eaten plain.

Coconut Cream Pie

4 eggs
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 cups skim milk
1-1/2 cup fructose
2 teaspoons coconut extract
3/4 cup coconut

Beat eggs & salt in large bowl until thick & lemon-colored or about 5 minutes. Mix in milk and remaining ingredients. Pour mix-

ture into pastry & bake in preheated oven 425 degrees for 15 minutes. Reduce temperature to 350 degrees and bake until sharp knife inserted comes out clean; usually 20-25 minutes. Cool on wire rack.

Reduced-Fat Pie Pastry

1-1/4 cup all purpose flour
1 teaspoon fructose
1/4 teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons cold margarine-cut into pieces
5-1/2 tablespoons ice water

Combine flour, fructose & salt in mixing bowl; cut in margarine with pastry blender until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Mix in water, 1 tablespoon at a time; mixing lightly with fork after each addition until dough is formed. This can be rolled out for use at this time or can be refrigerated until ready to use.

Cabbage Slaw

1 head Savoy cabbage
1/2 cup drained pineapple tidbits
1/2 cup halved green grapes
1/2 cup slivered almonds
2 tablespoons fat-free mayonnaise

Remove center of cabbage; leaving outer leaves to form an edible bowl. Shred cabbage removed from center. Combine with pineapple, grapes & mayonnaise. Put almonds on top of salad. Serve cole slaw well chilled in cabbage leaves.

Oven Fried Chicken

1/3 cup skimmed milk
2-3 drops hot red pepper sauce
3/4 ounces crushed corn flakes
3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon fresh ground pepper
1 tablespoons + 1 teaspoon canola oil
1 chicken-skin and quarter

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Spray large baking sheet with cooking spray. Mix milk & pepper sauce in bowl. On waxed paper, mix cornflakes, flour, salt & pepper. Dip chicken in milk mixture; then coat with dry mixture. Bake for 30 minutes & then turn chicken & cook for 15-20 minutes more.

Oven Un-Fried Chicken

1 package skinned chicken breast
2 cups Bisquick baking mix
1 teaspoon paprika
1 teaspoon parsley-chopped
1/2 cup Romano or Parmesan cheese salt and pepper

Mix all ingredients together. Add salt & pepper to taste. Place dry ingredients in bowl suitable to dip chicken pieces in; put aside. Thoroughly wash chicken & pat dry. Spray oven-proof dish with non-stick spray. Wet chicken lightly & dip in dry ingredients to cover both sides. Place chicken in oven-proof dish & bake at 425 degrees for 20 minutes on one side until brown. Turn chicken over & bake for another 20-25 minutes or until crispy & brown.

Apricot Nut Bread-use fructose instead of sugar!
Perfect Brownies-you can use cocoa instead of the melted chocolate. 3 level tablespoons of cocoa plus 1 tablespoon oil equal 1 square of chocolate!

Coconut Cream Pie-use skim milk, fructose and the 34% reduced crust recipe included!

Reduced Fat-Free Pastry-try this one next to take a little of the fat out of the recipe!

Cabbage Slaw-use the outer leaf of the cabbage to make the bowl to serve in!

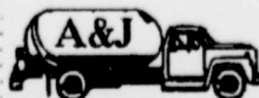

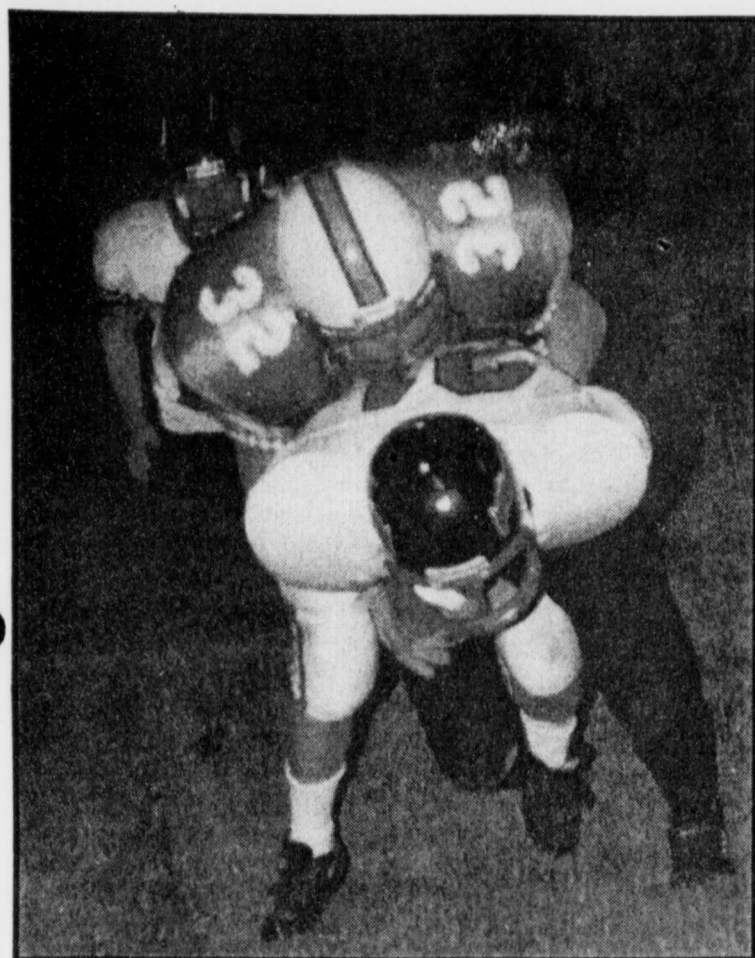

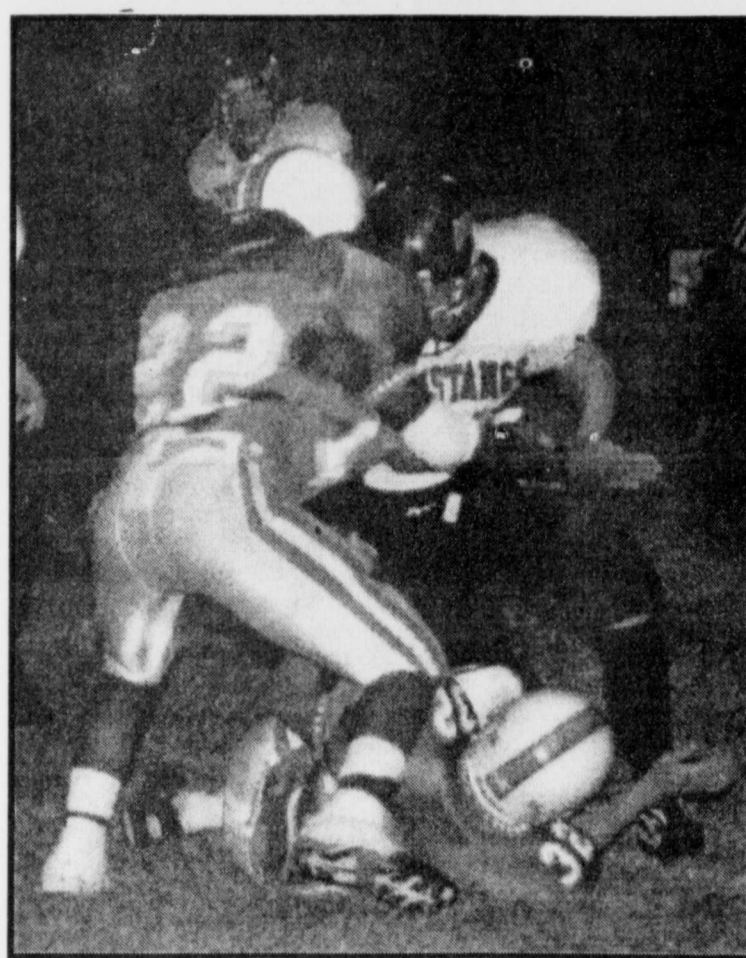
Nathan Carroll to Josh Cabell putting the Rebels up 8-0.
