

Saute pork in skillet and drain off all but 2 tablespoons grease. Saute onions and celery in grease. Add into this a small amount of oyster water from drained oysters if onions and celery get too dry. Add oysters to remaining liquid. Cook 7-10 minutes until oysters begin to curl on edges. Drain in colander. Combine oyster mixture, rice, sausage, parsley and seasonings to taste. Bake at 350 degrees until heated






