



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
The Gift

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

> Well, if I didn't have bad luck, I'd have no luck at all, as they say. One night in June, I was on top of the world thinking what a good Christmas we would have. I was working for a roofing company and was out of town on a job when at about 3 a.m., a knock at my motel door awakened me and it was a policeman. I had to wait for almost 30 minutes when my sister finally arrived, only to give me the bad news, that my home in Louisiana had burned down.

> All the way home I drove, expecting to find damage and thinking I would just add on. But when

I arrived, there was nothing left. I did a lot of crying when the kids weren't looking, but I never gave up on God or myself. So from June until December that year we were in and out of motels and staying some with my dad. I answered ads for work, and bought clothes, toys and food but the money only went so far, and I for so many blessings. still had bills even though I was

Finally on Christmas Eve, I couldn't stop the tears anymore and as I was feeling really bad about what I couldn't do for the kids, a knock came at the door. One of the firefighters wives had told their church of our losses and those southern Baptist folks had gotten together and brought all the kids clothes and toys and they even brought us a turkey with all the trimmings.

Well, the tears really rolled then. I thanked them and we had a short visit. After they left, the phone rang and another church had collected household items for me, so I went to pick up those things.

In just a short time, we went from what could have been the worst Christmas to probably the best ever. By the time I got everything in the living room for the kids, the whole room was full of toys and stuff for their Christmas.

The best news of all came later, my dad, the housemover, had gotten to bid on some homes in Minden, LA and we were getting a new home of our own.

I remember praying a lot between June and December of that year, it was also about teaching kids the power of prayer and believing what you prayed of would be done. God blessed us in so many ways and I still thank him
