

Dr. Gary VanDeaver receives scholarship from LUSA

Dr. Gary VanDeaver, Superintendent at Rivercrest ISD, has been chosen as one of twentynine superintendents in Texas to receive a scholarship to participate in the Lamar University Superintendent Academy, an advanced leadership training program on Lamar's Beaumont campus. Funded by a grant from the Texas Education Agency, the Academy provides senior level executive training for superintendents recognized as leaders among their peers. The scholarship pays all tuition, fees, training costs, materials and out-of-state travel

associated with the Academy. According to its Executive Director, Dr. Bob Thompson, participation in the Academy is by invitation only. The twenty-nine superintendents were chosen from a list of approximately one-hundred nominees from throughout Texas. To be selected is an honor not only to the superintendent, Thompson said, but also to his or her board and district. Without the support of forward-looking boards, and a quality district, no superintendent could have achieved the level of success and recognition necessary to nominated and selected to the Acad-

At the Academy, VanDeaver will review the latest technology for enhancing student learning, participate in advanced leadership training from some of the nation's foremost trainers of company executives, and get experience in the Decision Support Center, a high tech laboratory for improving the speed and quality of management decision making. Also as a part of the Academy, the superintendents will be taken on a field trip to gather more information on ways to develop more effective schools. VanDeaver will also have the opportunity to work with superintendents from other exemplary districts and to review practices that have helped make those districts successful.

Thompson says the knowledge superintendents glean from work in the Academy is immediately applicable to any district, regardless of size or location. To assist the districts in incorporating these management concepts, the Academy will host a three day summer conference for Academy superintendents and their boards where they will be led through joint leadership training and planning activities. They will also meet with boards and superintendents of similar sized districts to share ideas for increasing student achievement and developing a vision for the future.

The year-long Academy is designed to provide the most professional growth opportunities with the least amount of time away from the district. During the year superintendents meet on five different weekends at Lamar University. The schedule is planned so that half of the training will be on Saturdays or during the summer when school is not in session.







Glory in the Flower

I don't drive out west of Paris times I, like Walter Mitty, envivery often, but when I do I always look out south of the highway to Brockway's Furniture at the empty pasture. I remember what was once there. I spent many happy hours at the circle track that was there and was the center of attention in Paris on each Saturday night. It was a fine quartermile dirt track that drew some of the fastest race cars in this area.

One day as I was coming back from the VA Hospital in Bonham where I had my yearly checkup, I pulled up and stopped at Brockway's Furniture and met Jimmy and Mary Brockway. They were in a very genial mood and we had a very interesting conversation about the old race track. I found out that the track was built in 1955 by Jack Briscoe and Melvin Crow on land that belonged to the Brockways. The track was closed in 1958, but it seemed to me that they were in business longer than that. Jimmy said, "I was a teenager at the time and wanted to drive, but my father would never let me do that."

I got permission to go out into the pasture and see if I could tell where the track had been. Looking from the furniture store I couldn't see any trace of it. I drove part of the oval. I'm not as adept at crawling through barbed wire fences as I once was. I guess I'm out of practice. When I got to the old track I could see very clearly where the banked part of the track had been. As I walked along I could see the entire track except for the southern part, where a bunch of trees had grown. I remembered that on the west side of the straightaway there was a grandstand, restrooms and a concession stand. There was a fence around part of the track where spectators parked.

sioned myself driving on of the stock cars and winning race after race. I always thought that I might have been able to handle one of the cars if I had the track to myself, but never in all that traffic. As I left I had to crawl through that fence again. Before I got in my pickup, I looked back and there was nothing left but weeds and memories.

On the way back to Paris I thought I would like to talk to one of the drivers who raced there. After over 40 years, I'd better not put this off too long. I remembered that one of my favorite drivers was Bill Kerby. At the Reno Post Office I stopped in and asked Bill's daughter, Melissa, a former student of mine at Crockett Middle School, where Bill lived. I found that he lived in Bogata. I called Bill and asked if he had any information or pictures of the track he would share with me. He gladly consented and I made an appointment to visit him at his home.

When I got to Bogata, I found the proper street and found Bill at home and in a very friendly mood. I asked Bill, a former Paris resident, how he wound up in Bogata.
