balloons!

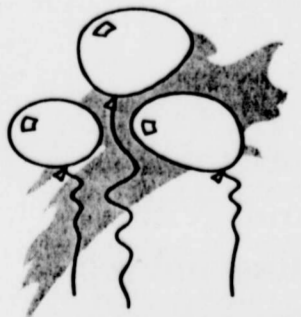
Finally, though, we figured

Talco being an oil town, where
many residents were not perma-

Their only contact with Talco now
is the old school and annual re-

classmates.

The Talco building started
classes in February of 1939 and
continued through 1965 when

across town from the old school
which was on FM71 to the new
Talco School as well as those who

school for Rivercrest. Both times

their school years with in Talco.

Results from the Tuesday,
March 12 Democratic primary in
Red River County are as follows:

For Red River County Judge,
incumbent Powell Peek received
1,931 votes while Michael
Garretson received 798.

In the Red River County Dis-
trict Clerk race, Janice Bivins
Gentry received 1,429 votes over
Wendy Butler Faulkner who re-
ceived 1,381.

The Red River County Com-
missioner Precinct #2 race gave
M.D. Whittle, Jr. 351 votes, while
David Barnett received 240. Steve
Carey received 159 votes and
Jerry D. Thompson received 51.

Red River County Commis-
sioner Precinct #4, Mark Megason
got 545 votes and Mikael Kelsoe
got 308.

For Justice of the Peace, incum-

bent J.R. Lewis received 1,634
votes to Russell Jones' 945 votes.
Weldon Dale Tyler received 235.

In uncontested races, Sheriff
Jerry Neal Conway received
2,238 votes. Glenda Garrison re-
ceived 2,058 for County Treas-
urer; Lorie Taylor Moose re-
ceived 2,054 for County Clerk.

In state-wide races, Ken
Bentsen received 919 votes; Ron
Kirk 686; Victor Morales 594;
Gene Kelly 156; and Ed
Cunningham 130.

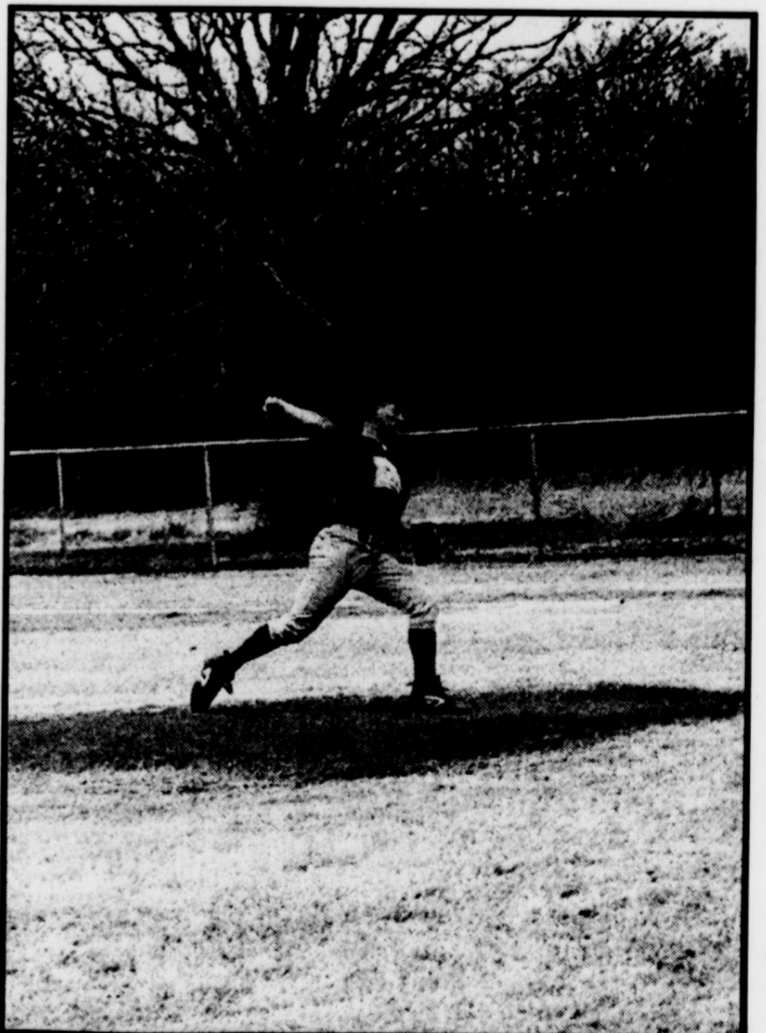
Incumbent U.S. Rep. Max
Sandlin received 1,875 votes for
U.S. Representative. In the gub-
ernatorial race, Dan Morales re-
ceived 1,154 votes while Tony
Sanchez received 983. John Sharp
received 1,835 in the Lieutenant
Governor's race.

Prescriptions for safety.....

Many people have trouble func-
tioning well as patients, even
health professionals who enter the
system. Whether limited knowl-
edge, socioeconomic factors,
emotional or clinical state or cul-
tural background, their level of
health literacy--the ability to read,
understand and act on health care
information--is often dangerously
low.

The television show ER por-
trayed this problem last month
when a Spanish-speaking woman
misunderstood the directions for
taking isoniazid. The prescription
label stated to take the medication
"once" daily. But in Spanish
"once" means "eleven". In the
show, the patient died from tak-
ing such an excessive dose. Real-
life examples of patients who have
had difficulty reading and under-
standing medication directions are

plentiful.
But lest you believe that poor
health literacy is an isolated prob-
lem with the elderly, disabled,
uneducated and certain socioeco-
nomic classes, here are some start-
ling facts from the American
Medical Association's Health Lit-
eracy Introduction kit (see http://
www.ismp.org for more informa-
tion). 1) more than 40% of pa-
tients with chronic illnesses are
functioning illiterate; 2) almost a
quarter of all adult Americans read
at or below the fifth grade level
while medical information leaflets
are typically written at a 10th
grade reading level or above; 3)
only half of all patients take their
medication as directed; and 4) low
health literacy skills have in-
creased our annual health care
expenditures by \$73 billion.

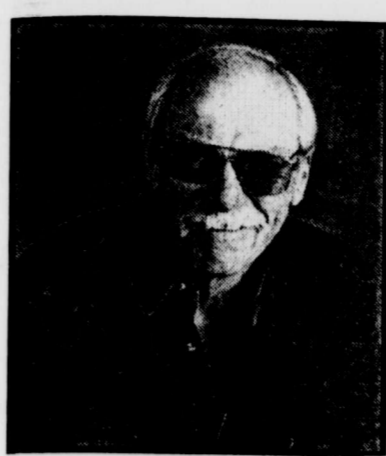

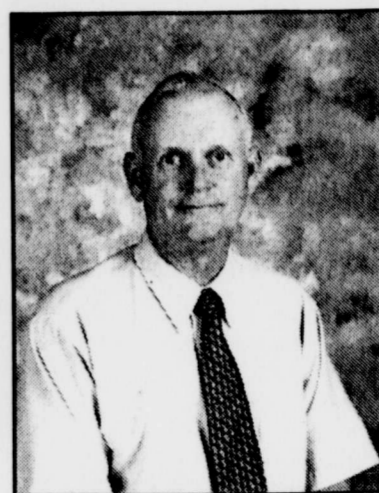

Irish Potato Candy

1/4 cup butter-softened
8 ounces cream cheese
1 teaspoon vanilla
4 cups confectioner's sugar
2-1/2 cups coconut
1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
In a medium bowl, beat butter, cream cheese together until smooth. Add vanilla and sugar and beat until smooth. Using hands if necessary, mix in coconut. Roll into balls or potato shapes and roll in cinnamon. Place on cookie sheet to chill to set. Roll in more cinnamon for darker color.

Irish Soda Bread Cookies

2 cups all-purpose flour
3/4 cup white sugar
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup currants
1/4 cup buttermilk
1 egg
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon caraway seeds
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Combine dry ingredients in mixing bowl. With pastry blender, cut in butter until mixture resembles meal. Stir in currants. Mix in beaten egg. Pour in milk and with a fork make soft dough. On floured board, knead dough lightly 5-6 times. Roll out and cut into squares and triangles. Bake 12-14 minutes.

Zucchini-Oatmeal Cookies

1/2 cup butter
3/4 cup white sugar
1 egg
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1-1/2 cup grated zucchini
1-1/2 cup all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 cup quick cooking oats
1 cup granola
2 cups semi-sweet chocolate chips
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In medium bowl, cream butter and sugar until fluffy. Stir in egg and vanilla and mix well. Stir in zucchini. Sift together flour, baking soda and cinnamon and stir into zucchini mixture. Stir in oats, granola and chocolate chips. Drop by spoonfuls onto prepared cookie sheet and bake 12-15 minutes until done.

Irish Flag Cookies

1 cup butter
1-1/2 cup confectioner's sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
2-1/2 cup all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon cream of tartar
In large bowl, cream together butter and sugar. Beat in egg and vanilla; mix well. In medium bowl stir together dry ingredients and

blend into butter mixture. Divide into thirds and shape into balls. Working with 1/3rd of dough at a time, roll out 1/4 inch thick and cut into rectangles 2 x 3-inches. Place on ungreased cookie sheet and bake in preheated 350 degree oven for 12-15 minutes. Frost.

Irish Flag Frosting

1 cup confectioner's sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 tablespoon water
2 drops orange food coloring
2 drops green food coloring
Blend sugar, salt and vanilla. Add just enough water to make frosting easy to spread. Divide frosting into 2 small bowls. Add orange food coloring to one and green to the other. Mix until each are colored evenly. Frost 1-inch of the left side of each cookie with green and 1-inch of the right side of the cookie with orange frosting. Leave middle inch unfrosted.

Blarney Stone-Kissed Cookies

1 cup butter-softened
1 cup white sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
1-3/4 cup all-purpose flour
1/2 cup cocoa
1-1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
36 Hershey's Kisses
Frosting:
3/4 cup confectioner's sugar
3-1/2 teaspoon milk
1/4 teaspoon vanilla
3 drops food coloring
Beat butter, sugar, egg and vanilla in large bowl until blended. Stir dry ingredient together and blend into butter mixture. Beat until well blended. Divide dough into half and place on separate sheets of wax paper. Shape each half into log with squared sides, about 7 inches long and 2-1/4 inches wide. Wrap each log in wax paper and refrigerate for at least 8 hours. Heat oven to 325 degrees and cut logs into 3/8 inch slices. Place onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 15 minutes and cool slightly. Cool cookies and remove wrappers from kisses. Stir the last 4 ingredients together well and add 3-4 drops of food green coloring until drizzle-consistency. Drizzle over top of cookie and immediately top with a chocolate kiss.

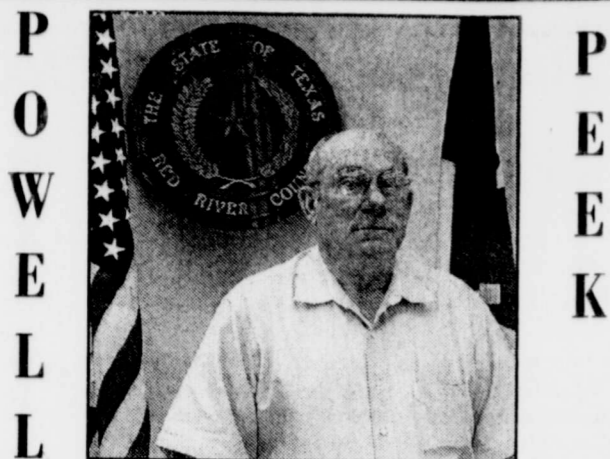

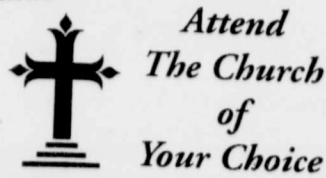
Phi Theta Kappa to induct local students

Evolution or Creation?

Are you a descendant of an ape-like creature that lived millions of years ago? Did your forbears swing through the trees on some remote island a few million years ago? Can you trace your "roots" back to some primordial slime that evolved, by chance an environmental pressure, into the human being you are today?

We see television specials and read textbooks on the "history of man" in which we see mankind move from the swamp on all fours, straighten up, shed his tail, grow hair and learn to move and think. We see this alleged scenario almost daily through such magazines as National Geographic, Time, Natural History and others.

Is this really what happened? Are you the end product of billions of years of evolutionary change? Are you the result of spontaneous generation that took place a long time ago, only to find its culmination in Homo sapiens of today?

Or, did God specially create you "in His image?" Did He, as the Bible indicates, create mankind "male and female" (Matthew 19:4)? Are we, as the psalmist wrote, "fearfully and wonderfully made" (Psalm 139:14)?

What does the evidence say? It is not enough for someone to offer a mere opinion. What we need here is evidence adequate to the situation. Is there any? Indeed there is!

The fundamental law of biology is the Law of Biogenesis. The law (and there are no known exceptions to it in nature) states that all life comes from preceding life of its kind. As Dr. McNair Williams said some years ago in an Oxford University Medical publication: "Modern medicine and surgery are founded on the truth enunciated by Pasteur, that life proceeds only from life, and only from life of the same kind and type." Evolution postulates spontaneous generation, life arising from non-life. Yet all available scientific evidence establishes beyond the shadow of a doubt that spontaneous generation simply does not occur. Experiment after experiment has shown that only life can give rise to life. All the while we are asked to believe that somehow, sometime, somewhere spontaneous generation did occur, and here we are as a result of it.

Evolution postulates an ever-increasing upward trend in complexity. We are told that nature moves upward, from disorder to order, from the simple to the complex, and that this is how evolution has actually occurred. Yet this is in direct contradiction to one of the most basic, most fundamental laws of science, the Law of Entropy. This law (also known as the Second Law of Thermodynamics) states categorically that all systems move toward higher entropy. That is to say, all systems go from order to disorder, from complex to simple. All things are becoming more and more random, not structured. And eventually, if the Universe lasts long enough, the Earth will die a "heat death" because energy is becoming less available for use as time goes by.

If you would like to take an in-depth look at organic evolution versus creation, we invite you to attend a seminar being held at Rivercrest High School Auditorium. The seminar, titled Science and Nature: Two Votes for God is an examination of both organic evolution and special creation. The seminar will be Friday, April 5 from 7 to 9 p.m. and Saturday from 1 until 5 p.m. The lessons on Sunday will be presented at the Talco Church of Christ at 9:45 a.m. and 10:45 a.m.

There is no charge whatsoever for the seminar. In addition, there will be free handout materials on the topics covered, as well as question and answer sessions after most lecture periods. Everyone is invited. The speaker is Dr. Bert Thompson, former professor in the College of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A&M University. Join us as we investigate these important issues.
