





CHICKEN AND SALSA SOUP-this sounded a little different and would be great on these cool evenings!


CHICKEN STEW-add the spices and vegetables you want for your family's enjoyment!

This week's query is from Wanda Duggins Barkemeyer, 1308 S. Pecos, Coleman, TX 76834. She is researching the Caton family of Red River County. Her grandparents were Thaddeus Warsaw Caton born 1863 and Sarah Gertrude Collins born 1870. They married in 1899 in Mt. Vernon and had several children including Mrs. Barkemeyer's mother, Thaddie Caton Duggins, who was born in 1905 in Ellis County. The Caton family apparently was the family for whom Catonville in Red River County was named. She finds that her great-grandfather was named Henry Caton. Several Catons lived in Red River County in 1870 and Mrs. Barkemeyer believes that they all are part of her family. Her Catons apparently left the county soon after 1870.

So You Believe In God?

Are you a person that believes in God? Are you among the number that believes mankind was specially created in the image of God? Do you really believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, and Savior of the world? Many great minds down through the ages have been firm believers in God. The apostle Paul wrote: For the invisible things of him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even his eternal power and glory, so that they are without excuse" (Romans 1:20).




